Each Monday at 4 p.m. lectures on the Oregon Centennial are being given in the Britt Student center lounge. Dr. Arthur S. Taylor, chairman of the social science division, began the series this week with special guest, Jack Sutton, southern Oregon author and historian, featured on the program.

Included among future Centennial speakers are Dr. Roy W. McNeil, professor of geography; Dr. Margaret McDevitt, visiting professor of art from the Salem public schools; Dr. Herbert Cecil, assistant professor of music; Professor Angus Bowmer, drama department and founder-producer of the Oregon Shakespearean Festival; and Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, SOC president.

Fellers also disclosed plans for the Thursday 4 o'clock faculty hour. Martin J. Elle, acting director of guidance, led the discussion at the first meeting. Mrs. Marjorie Priger, curriculum consultant for the D. C. Heath company, will speak June 25.

Pendleton Bank Gets Bomb Scare

Pendleton—(UPI)—A downtown bank, the First Federal Savings and Loan Association, and several adjoining businesses here were emptied Wednesday afternoon by a telephoned bomb threat that turned out to be a hoax.

Police said the call was received by Dorothy Hartnett, who works at the bank. She said a voice described as that of a youngster attempting to disguise himself told her a bomb was in the bank and would go off "in just 15 minutes."

As a precautionary measure, police ordered the bank and several other buildings evacuated. A search was made, no explosives found, and the employees were back at their jobs in about one hour.
