The electronics also met good support which sent leaders in this group of more than 2 points. The steels were firm on balance despite the serious deadlock in contract talks which threatens to trigger a nationwide strike next Wednesday.

Contract Awarded For Klamath Bridge

Portland - Bureau of Indian Affairs has awarded a contract for \$28,738 to cover work on a 150-foot reinforced concrete bridge on the Klamath Indian reservation in southern Oregon, the department of the interior has announced.

The bridge is part of a project involving road construction on the Klamath Reservation completing a program of more than 80 miles of new and reconstructed roads being built by the Indian bureau in preparation for final termination of the reservation under the Klamath Termination act. Construction is in accord with the terms of an agreement between the United States and Klamath county.
