

# 30 Netters Signed To Contend In Rogue Valley Tournament

A field of some 30 players will contend Saturday and Sunday in the men's, women's and junior men's divisions of the Rogue Valley Invitational Tennis tournament at Ashland.

Gary Hval of Oregon lost a third-round match to Warren Simmons of Syracuse, 1-up, although he was two strokes under par. Simmons later lost a quarter-final match, 2 and 1, to Ted Weiss of Yale.

Seattle's Ed Pearsall was eliminated in the third round by Jack Lucetti of San Jose State, 2 and 1. Lucetti later upset Del Beman of Maryland, 3 and 2, to enter the semi-finals.

John Anhorn has been announced as the probable Central Point pitcher for the 8 p.m. ruckus.

Saturday's game will be a non-leaguer. Medford has southern division Area 4 contention on Sunday afternoon at Grants Pass. The Studs also will be busy on Sunday with an afternoon tangle (non-counting) at Roseburg.

Medford Coach John Kovenz, who is also Medford high head diamond mentor, has an eye to the future in trying Dean on the hill. The coach would like to be sure of a good solid righthand pitcher for the 1960 prep season. Dean, a regular first baseman, is big and strong and with the Black Tornado having considerable infield depth it will be a big boost in the defense of the District 6 title if he shows he can take a turn on the mound.
