## White Sox Win 5-4 Over Yanks

Harry Simpson's grand slam homer off Bob Turley provided the Chicago White Sox with a 5-4 victory over the New York Yankees Saturday and lifted them back into second place in the American league.

Simpson, an ex-Yankee, delivered his game-winning blast in the eighth inning after the White Sox filled the bases with two out on a single and two walks. Simpson then cracked Turley's first pitch to him into the right field stands.

Norm Seibern and Bill Skowron opened the Yankee ninth with homers but Gerry Staley replaced Rudolph Arias and retired the side. The victory was credited to Bob Shaw who started for the White Sox and was nipped for two homers by Hector Lopez.

The loss gave Turley a season record of 618 compared with his 1958 mark of 21-7.

The Detroit Tigers whipped the Baltimore Orioles, 12-2, and the Boston Red Sox beat the Cleveland Indians, 6-4, in the other American league afternoon games.

Gus Zernial, playing first base for the first time for Detroit, drove in five runs with a pair of homers and Al Kaline and Red Wilson also homered to pace the Tigers' 13-hit attack. Paul Foytack yielded 11 hits but went the distance for his sixth victory.

Ted Williams and Jackie Jensen hit successive homers in the fifth inning as Frank Sullivan won his fourth game for the Red Sox and Jim Grant suffered his third loss. It was the fourth of the season for Williams and the 16th for Jensen.

Washington was at Kansas City in a night game.

## Jerry Droscher On Pan Am Club

Corvallis-Oregon State college outfielder Jerry Droscher, Roseburg, has been named to compete with the United States squad in the Pan American games this August.

Droscher, who currently is seeing action with the Drain Black Sox, was selected for the Northern Division all-star team this spring and the District 8 NCAA squad.

He is a two-year letterman for OSC and was Drain's right fielder when the Black Sox captured the National title last year.

Arley Kangas, Washington State catcher and 1959 Northern division batting champion, was the only other Northwest player on the Pan-American squad.

# Warren Spahn Gets 10th Win

Fred Haney still says he's going to quit after this season, and that's his privilege, but 38-year-old Warren Spahn keeps pitching as if he plans to go on forever.

Shooting for a 20-victory season for the 10th time in his career, the western Milwaukee southpaw reached the halfway mark, beating the Chicago Cubs, 11-1, for his 10th triumph of the season Friday.

Spahn, now ahead of his game-winning pace for any year since the Braves came to Milwaukee in 1953, helped his own case by hitting the 22nd home run of his career in the seventh inning. He already holds the National league record for home runs hit by a pitcher.

With 25 victories already under his belt, Spahn now is aiming for the all-time record of 26 by Eppa (Jeptha) Rixey, only other NL left-hander to exceed him in total wins.

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
