Two Senators Release Figures Of Staff Payrolls

Washington—UPI—Sen. Gordon Allott (R-Colo.) made public his senate staff payrolls Saturday. It disclosed that he is using 85.1 per cent, or \$88,652, of the total his office is allowed for help.

Allott released the statistics in the wake of senate action ordering publication of such figures on a quarterly basis. He said the senate decision was "wholesome and proper" and that he had only awaited such a rule change before acting on his own.

Allott is not using an available \$15,522. His salary list follows:

The Dalles—UPI—A 6-year-old boy, one of nine persons injured Friday afternoon in a two-car collision at an intersection here, died Saturday in a hospital. Driver of one of the cars was charged with negligent homicide.

The dead youngster was Brian Barney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marion Barney, of The Dalles. It was the first traffic fatality here since 1955.

The boy, his mother, and brother, Greg, 4, were en route with four children to celebrate Greg's birthday with a picnic in Sorosis Park when the accident occurred. Mrs. Barney was driver of their car.

Driver of the second auto was Melburn D. Moore, 26, The Dalles. The Wasco county district attorney's office filed a charge of negligent homicide against him.

Three of the children remained in the hospital but all were described in good condition. They were Glenn Jones, 6; Steven Brown, 5, and his brother Edward, 4.

Treated at the hospital and released were Mrs. Barney; Greg; Nancy Jones, 4; Moore, and his passenger, Jack Vipperman, 21, The Dalles.

Damage Suit Filed In Airplane Crash

Mason City, Iowa—UPI—A \$1,500,000 damage suit has been filed in district court against a flying service by the estate of Richard Valens, one of three nationally-known rock 'n' rollers killed in a plane crash near here Feb. 3.

Valens, also known as Richard Valenzuela, and singers Buddy Holly and J. P. Richardson were flying to Fargo, N.D., following an appearance at Clear Lake, near here.

Eisenhower-Congress Conflict Bursts Into Political Fireworks

Washington—UPI—The smoldering conflict between President Eisenhower and the Democrat-controlled Congress over what's best for the country burst into political fireworks last week.

Eisenhower stamped "veto" on wheat and tobacco price support bills. Congress rejected the President's appeals to raise the gasoline tax and abolish the long-term government bonds. It approved a \$1,375,400,000 housing bill which Eisenhower may veto.

Moving through the legislative pipeline are other measures—the chief executive opposes a tax cut, an increased medical research budget, a states rights bill. The Senate stung the President just a week ago by rejecting his nominee for commerce secretary, Lewis L. Strauss.

Proposals Modified
Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson has tried to make some major legislation and spending programs "veto proof" by modifying original proposals to meet Eisenhower's complaints. For this a few liberal Democrats and organizations accused him of surrendering to the President's economy demands.

Johnson replied, "we'll seek the best and do the possible." Congress and the White House were not completely at odds. The lawmakers granted Eisenhower's request to boost the emergency national debt

limit to a peacetime record \$295 billion for one year. They increased the permanent ceiling to \$285 billion instead of the \$288 billion the President asked.

Eisenhower said he vetoed the wheat and tobacco bills because they were "backward instead of forward" steps which would not ease farm troubles.

May Cost GOP Votes
Democrats felt the vetoes would cost the GOP votes in the 1960 congressional and presidential elections, especially in the Midwest wheat belt. Some Republicans agreed privately.

The Senate refused to hike the federal gas tax despite two warnings by Eisenhower that the 41,000-mile interstate super-highway network virtually would cease without the new funds.

Other congressional news:
Federal-State Statutes
States Rights: The House approved an administration-opposed states rights bill under which the courts could not rule that a federal law nullified a similar state statute unless there was a direct conflict or Congress agreed.

Nuclear War: A parade of scientists painted a grim picture of the toll of an H-bomb war. They told a congressional atomic subcommittee 48,900,000 Americans would be killed and another 28,000,000 maimed. Radiation, famine, disease and natural catastrophes would continue for perhaps 1,000 years. But, they predicted, mankind would survive.

Budget: The Senate approved a \$4,056,746,581 money bill for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education, and Welfare. It was the first Senate appropriation this year which carried more money than the President asked.

Payrolls: The Senate in a surprise move voted to open to public inspection the payroll records of its employees. The move was the result of public furor over disclosures of congressional nepotism.

Rackets: Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) accused teamsters President James R. Hoffa of failure to keep his promise to oust crooked union officials. Hoffa, appearing at one of the last sessions of the Senate Rackets committee, replied that he was not going to be "stamped" into firing anyone until he investigated each case thoroughly.

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Driver Forced To Quit Wagon Train
Montpelier, Ida.—UPI—An attack of tick fever caused another loss to the Oregon Centennial wagon train here Friday.

Weaver Clark, driver of the Hillsboro wagon, was rushed to the Montpelier county hospital by his grandson, Robert Fineous, after suffering a relapse of the fever. Hospital attendants said he would be hospitalized for several days.

Clark contracted the fever through the Little Colorado Desert in western Wyoming last week.

Clark was first treated for the disease at Kemmerer, Wyo., and returned to the caravan.

He said the arduous drive over the rough, steep Sublette cut-off taken by the wagons Thursday was "too much for me and I became overly tired."

Saturday the caravan of Conestogas paraded past the hospital in tribute to "Pop" Clark, who is to catch up with the wagon somewhere on Highway 30, the Old Oregon Trail, through Idaho, when he recovers.

The wagons are camping at Bear Lake county fairgrounds for the week end.

Union Urged To Refuse To Outfit Foreign Hulls
Mobile, Ala.—UPI—Mayor John J. Grogan of Hoboken, N. J., urged members of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers Saturday to refuse to outfit foreign-built ship hulls.

Grogan, international president of the union, spoke to union employees of the Alabama Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. here at the close of a gulf coast tour. He denounced a proposal under which ship hulls would be constructed in the Dominican Republic and the West Indies and brought to this country for outfitting.

"We will let them rot before we'll outfit them," he said.

Grogan, who was defeated by about 6,000 votes in an attempt to get the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator in New Jersey last year, declared he would "have the support of the entire Democratic organization," in 1961 to battle Republican Sen. Clifford P. Case.
