

Girl Scouts To Attend Roundup

Four senior Girl Scouts from the Rogue Valley Council have been chosen to attend the world wide Girl Scout Roundup. The girls are Carolyn Finch, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Finch, Medford, Donna Coonrod, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Coonrod, Montague, Calif., Roberta Stephenson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Stephenson, Grants Pass, and Diane Lewis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Lewis, Medford.

Roundup will be July 3 to 12 but the girls will leave for Colorado Springs Colo., site for the Roundup, on June 29.

The Roundup is said to be the largest gathering of teenage girls ever held in the United States. Dressed in western hats and Bermuda shorts, the Girl Scouts, 14 through 17 years of age, will come from all states, U.S. territories, and approximately 20 other nations.

Adults who will accompany the girls are Miss Marilyn Olson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Olson, Medford, and Miss Ruth Kilbourn, executive director of the Rogue Valley Girl Scout council, also from Medford.

Approximately 10,000 Girl Scouts are expected to attend the Roundup and will live in some 6,000 tents put up by the teen-age girls.

In addition to the campers there will be 1,500 men and women to serve voluntarily as troop leaders, drivers, food sorters and various other camp staff jobs.

Both the girls and adults will wear a Girl Scout uniform specifically designed for the event. It will include white shirt, dark green Bermuda shorts, and matching knee-length socks topped with a western straw hat.

Special events at the Roundup include a ceremonial campfire on July 3, the opening night; the first flag raising of the new American flag the following day, Colorado Centennial day in observance of their "Rush to the Rockies" activities, July 8; and a farewell campfire July 12.

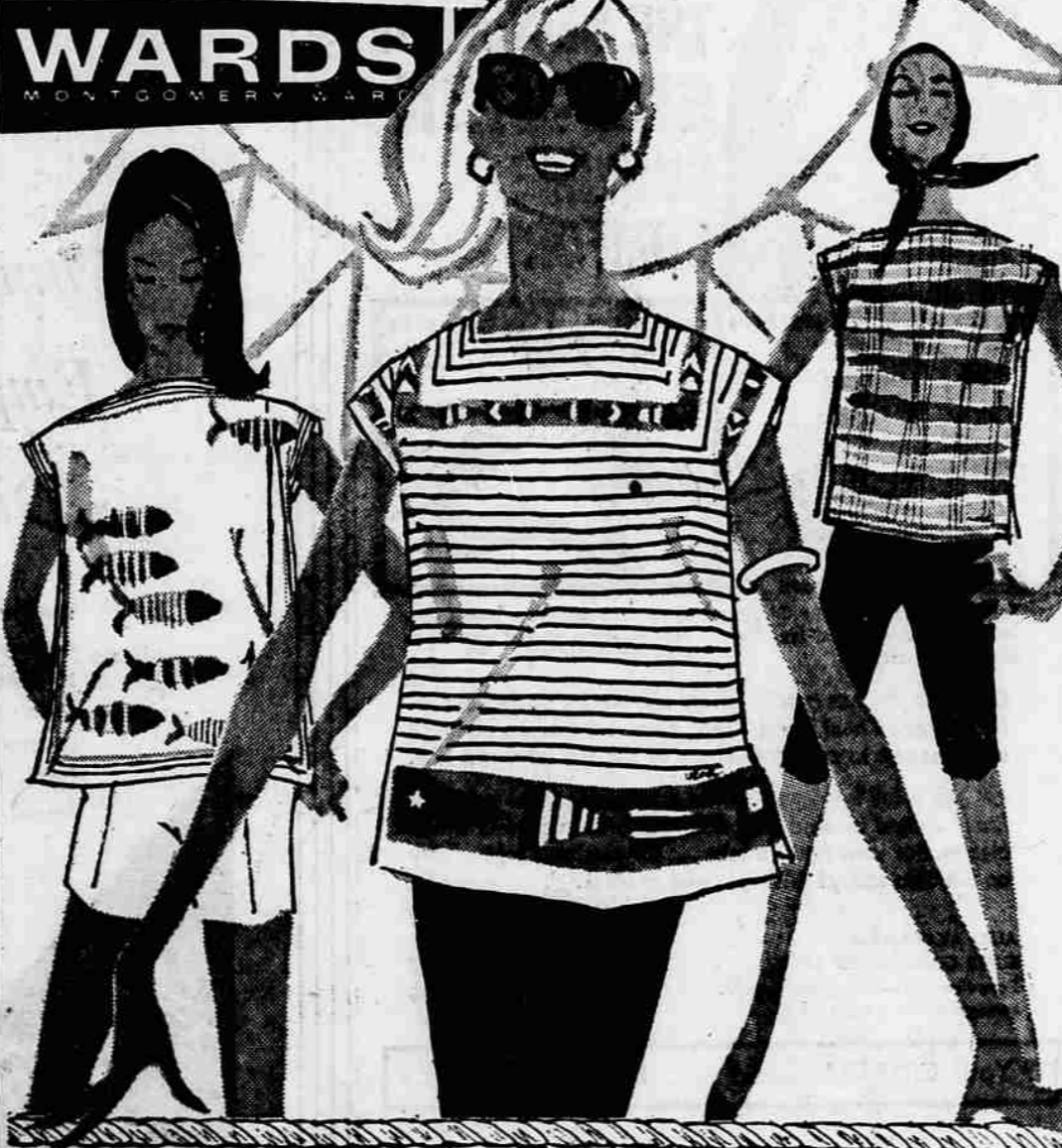
