Torrid LA Dodgers Stretch NL Victory String To Seven

Yes sir, the Dodgers are still in the National league—almost atop it in fact—and it looks like no one is going to knock the Indians out of first place in the American league as long as Tito Francona is around.

It's been 39 years since the Dodgers and Indian were World Series rivals and you could have had your own odds back in April if you thought they would be this year. And yet, here is virtually the halfway point of the campaign and the Dodgers are the hottest team in the NL while the Indians stubbornly cling to first place in the AL.

The Dodgers ran their winning streak to seven games, longest of the year in the NL with a 9-4 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates Sunday while the Indians retained their one-game margin by beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-4 and 1-0.

Don Demeter, Gil Hodges and Charlie Neal supplied the home run power for the Dod-

gers enabling Danny McDevitt to win his seventh game. Francona, Cleveland's "Mr. Clutch," delivered a game-winning single in the seventh inning of the Tribe's opener and then Herb Score's two-hitter and a homer by Jim Baxes completed the doubleheader sweep.

Braves Hold Lead
The Milwaukee Braves held their one-game NL margin as Juan Pizarro beat the Chicago Cubs, 2-1; Johnny Antonelli won his 11th game when he pitched the San Francisco Giants to a 6-0 win over the Philadelphia Phillies; and the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Cincinnati Reds, 9-7 and 11-8 in their NL games.

The Chicago White Sox delighted a Sunday crowd of 42,121 with 9-2 and 4-2 victories over the New York Yankees, the Detroit Tigers defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 7-2, and the Washington Senators climbed out of the AL cellar with a 7-3 decision over the Kansas City Athletics.

The Dodgers routed Bob Friend with a five-run burst

in the fourth inning and went on to score their ninth victory in 10 games and their 12th in 15.

Francona singled after a double by Woodie Held to snap a 4-4 tie and enable Cleveland relief pitcher Jim Perry to win his second decision. Baxes' homer in the seventh inning of the nightcap spoiled a fine pitching performance by Ted Wills and gave Score his eighth triumph. Pizarro Pitches Five-Hitter

Pizarro, yielded five hits and struck out six for the Braves. Eddie Mathews hit his 23rd homer.

Antonelli pitched a seven-hitter and was backed by a brilliant San Francisco defense. Orlando Cepeda paced the 10-hit Giant offense with a homer, double and single.

Lindy McDaniel relieved in both games for the Cardinals who scored seven unearned runs in the first inning of the opener and then clubbed out 15 hits in the nightcap.

Sherman Lollar, Earl Battey, Bubba Phillips and Hal Smith hit homers and Early Wynn won his 11th game of the season and 26th of his career for the White Sox in the first game with New York. Lollar also hit a three-run homer in the first inning of the second game to kayo Don Larsen and provide the big blow in Dick Donovan's fifth win of the season.

Don Mossi pitched a six-hitter and hit a two-run double to raise his record to 6-3 for the Tigers. Charlie Maxwell homered for the Tigers.

Harmon Killebrew and Jim Lemon drove in three runs each to lead the Senators' 10-hit attack on rookie Howard Reed and four Kansas City successors.

National Open Won By Wright

Pittsburgh—(UPI)—Mickey Wright, thoroughly rested after Saturday's grueling 36-hole finals of the Women's Open golf championship, has her eye set on pulling another repeat performance next month in the Ladies PGA at French Lick, Ind.

Mickey won an unprecedented second straight Open crown at nearby Churchill Valley Country Club, firing a record 287. She nosed out Louise Suggs, Sea Island, Ga., pro who had a 289.

In a three-way tie for third were Joyce Ziske, Waterford, Wis.; Ruth Jessen, Seattle, Wash.; and Marlene Bauer Hagge, women's pro at Churchill. All had 72-hole totals of 292.

Hoad Triumphs Over Gonzales

Forest Hills, N. Y.—(UPI)—Lew Hoad's convincing triumph over Pancho Gonzales gave him a wafer-thin edge over Gonzales today in their personal battle for the No. 1 spot in professional tennis.

Muirfield, Scotland—(UPI)—Defending titlist Peter Thomson was a 4 to 1 favorite to win his fifth British Open golf championship which began today with the smallest field in 38 years and possibly the weakest American contingent of all time.

Among the 15 U. S. players entered in the field of 258, only veteran Willie Goggin of San Jose, Calif., and Bob Watson of Ardley-on-Hudson, N. Y., were given even a slight chance to survive the two qualifying rounds that will cut the field to 100 by Wednesday.

Solons Nab Twinbill Against Portlanders

The Sacramento Solons have to qualify as just about the most feeble hitting first place team in baseball.

As a unit they are lucky if they're hitting .250. But up till now, the facts are that they just don't need a cart full of hits and runs.

Sunday they copped a pair from the Portland Beavers, the newest challengers to the Solons' lofty position. The Sacs disposed of the Beavers 2-1 in the first game and won the second, 1-0. On the strength of those three runs, manager Bob Elliott's men are now three and a half games ahead of the pack.

In the battle for last place in the PCL, Seattle and Phoenix split a twin bill, the Giants grabbing the opener, 7-2, and the Rainiers the second, in eight innings, 5-4. San Diego dropped Vancouver, 6-1, in the only other contest played Sunday. The scheduled tussle between Salt Lake and Spokane was postponed because of wet grounds.

Stanka Wins Tenth
Joe Stanka, the ace of the most worthy Solon mound staff, hurled the victory in the first game. The only Portland run came without benefit of a hit in the second inning. Nini Tornay walked, stole second, went to third on an error and scored on Jim Greengrass' sacrifice fly.

The Solons won it in the fourth when Eddie Kazak hit a sacrifice fly to score Mike Krnsnich with the second run of the inning. Stanka is now 10-4. He gave up five hits, as did loser Marty Kutyna, who is now 6-5.

Winston Salem Brown tossed a two-hitter in the second game to best Duane Pillette who suffered his first setback of the season.

Dick Phillips doubled home Brown with the game's only tally in the fifth inning. Brown is now 7-9 and Pillette 3-1.

Venturi Grabs Chicago Laurels

Chicago—(UPI)—A veteran's know-how and bad weather practice paid off with \$9,000 today for San Francisco's Ken Venturi.

Venturi slashed through winds reaching 30 miles per hour in gusts for a last round 66, four under par, in the Chicago Open to overcome a five stroke lead held by 23-year-old Johnny Pott, Shreveport, La., in the final 18 holes and take the title with 273, seven under par for the 72 holes. Pott, posted his second straight two over par.

It was the second straight year that Venturi has won the Chicago Open. His total this year was one stroke higher than the 272 with which he won in 1958.

Semi-Final Spot Aim Of Olmedo

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—U. S. Davis Cup stars Alex Olmedo and Barry MacKay today sought semi-final berths in men's singles in the Wimbledon tennis championships, a goal that no American has attained since 1956.

The top-seeded Olmedo, a Peruvian who resides in Los Angeles, was favored over sixth-seeded Luis Ayala of Chile in an all-South American quarter-final.

But the fifth-seeded MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, was an underdog against second-seeded southpaw Neale Fraser of Australia in their match.

Two American girls, fourth-seeded Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., and seventh-seeded Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif., have advanced to the quarter-final round of women's singles.

Aaron Top Selection On All-Star

New York—(UPI)—Major leaguers voted for merit and ruled out sentiment when they made Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves a unanimous choice for the 1959 All-Star game and passed up Ted Williams, Stan Musial and Mickey Mantle.

Commissioner Ford C. Frick, in announcing the vote of the players, managers and coaches for the eight starting positions on each team, said Aaron was the first unanimous selection in the voting history of the All-Star game.

Frick stressed that not even Babe Ruth had been accorded that honor.

The selection of Aaron, third baseman Ed Mathews and catcher Del Crandall on the National league team gave the Braves the biggest representation of any club.
