The drugs had some good gainers and oils were easier on balance. Some of the tires met fairly good support. The big features of this market were the specialties, some of which ran up as much as 3 or 4 points. Caterpillar Tractor ran up 4 at its high and touched a new top for the year. International Harvester was up around 1 and at a new high.
