## 16 Dead, 118 Hurt Official Toll in Okinawa Tragedy

Naha, Okinawa—(UPI)—Local authorities announced today an official casualty list of 16 dead and 118 injured in the crash of a disabled U. S. jet fighter into a crowded housing area.

Okinawa Police Commissioner Elzo Omine said that the injured included 105 school children, five infants and eight adults. Nineteen of the injured were in critical condition.

**10 Children Dead**  
The U. S. military command here also announced an official death toll of 16, including 10 children, but said that 112 had been injured.

The plane, an F-100 Super Sabre, caught fire while passing over the town of Ishikawa Tuesday. Its pilot, Capt. John O. Schmitt of Chalmers, Ind., headed toward a non-populated area before bailing out. But his pilotless plane veered to the right, caromed off the Miyamori primary school and then plowed into a group of houses nearby.

Eyewitnesses said the burning jet spewed flame over a 10-block area. An estimated 50 houses were destroyed and 200 persons left homeless.

**Pilot 'Stunned, Dazed'**  
Captain Schmitt was unavailable for comment today. But an Air Force spokesman described him as "stunned and dazed" after learning of the destruction his crippled plane had caused.

A policeman said the number of children killed "might have been even greater but for the alertness of one student in the primary school.

Seeing the flaming plane streaking toward the school, he shouted "air raid!" The others had participated in drills for such an eventuality. They fell on the floor and covered their faces.

## State Police Check Accidents Yesterday

A three-car read-end collision occurred near construction on Highway 99 just south of Rogue River yesterday, state police reported.

Three cars had started moving ahead at the direction of the flagman, then had to stop again. A car driven by Lizzie Balford Sumner, 69, of Norco, Calif., was unable to stop and struck the rear end of a car driven by Ronald Ray Russell, 17, also of Norco, Calif. The force of the collision forced the Russell car into the rear end of a car driven by Richard Arthur Treiss, 21, of Los Angeles, Calif., state police said.

Only minor damage resulted to the three cars. No injuries were reported and no citations issued, state police said.

A second accident occurred yesterday at about 7:50 p.m. on the South Stage rd., just south of the Rogue River academy, state police reported. A car driven by Stanley Hale Holt, 27, of route 1, box 33, Jacksonville was unable to make a curve and went off into a field at the east side of the highway. Holt was charged by police with being drunk on a public highway.

## TV Set, Electric Dryer, Lightning Fatal To Children

Death struck children Tuesday beside a television set, in a baseball sandlot and in the whirling drum of an electric dryer.

Two young brothers were electrocuted as they tinkered with the aerial of their TV set in the basement of their home at Bien Burnie, Md.

The victims were Daniel Doyle, 9, and his 7-year-old brother, Michael. They were the adopted children of Chief Petty Officer Warren Doyle and his wife, Vita.

The parents found the boys sprawled on the floor in front of the set when they returned from the commissary at Ft. Meade.

Police said the boys either ignored or failed to notice a note on the set warning that it should be unplugged before the aerial was handled. They said a damp concrete floor and steel frames of nearby beds apparently acted as conductors.

In Indianapolis, a bolt of lightning struck down Gary Klinger, 10, as he crouched at third base during a little league baseball game.

The bolt ripped off his clothing and dug a seven-inch hole where he stood. It also knocked down Gary's playmate, Robert Lockhart, 11, and Robert's father, Estel.

The elder Lockhart revived his son with artificial respiration.

**Wanted Ride in Drum**  
Jerome Anthony Brown, 7, apparently climbed into an electric dryer at a self service laundry in Oklahoma City, Okla., because he wanted to ride in the drum, police said.

A neighbor saw the boy walking toward the laundry in his pajamas about 6 a.m. Tuesday. At 8 a.m. two housewives noticed the dryer vibrating and called a mechanic. The mechanic found the Negro boy's charred, mangled body.

The boy's mother, Mrs. Dorothy Brown, charged that her son—a mentally retarded child—was the victim of a cruel prank by other children.

But police homicide inspector E. B. Meals said there was no evidence that the boy was forced into the dryer.

## Senate Debates Foreign Aid Bill

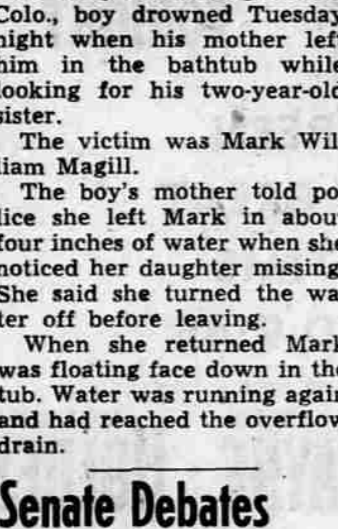
Washington—(UPI)—The Senate came to work early today after staying overtime Tuesday night in a drive to reach a final vote on its \$4,164,820,000 foreign aid bill before the long July 4 holiday week end.

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, meanwhile, worked on a compromise substitute for a provision in the bill which would permit the Development Loan Fund to borrow from the Treasury \$1 billion a year for five years.

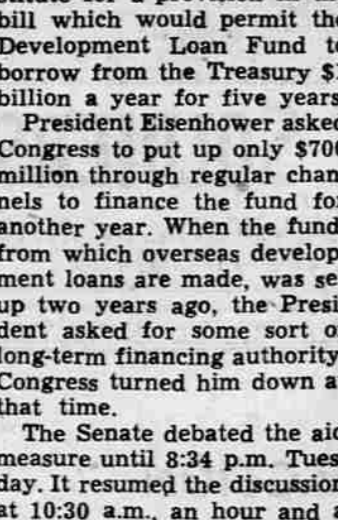
President Eisenhower asked Congress to put up only \$700 million through regular channels to finance the fund for another year. When the fund, from which overseas development loans are made, was set up two years ago, the President asked for some sort of long-term financing authority. Congress turned him down at that time.

The Senate debated the aid measure until 8:34 p.m. Tuesday. It resumed the discussion at 10:30 a.m. an hour and a half earlier than usual.
