

Al Olmedo, MacKay Go Against Aussies

Wimbledon, England—(UPI)—The men's semifinals in the Wimbledon Tennis championships today pitted American Davis Cupper Alex Olmedo and Barry MacKay against Australian opponents in what was billed as a preview of this year's challenge round matches.

Trout Limits Upped on Three SO Reservoirs

Portland—(UPI)—The State Game Commission Tuesday raised trout bag limits on three southeast Oregon reservoirs because a water shortage has threatened the fish with death.

The bag limit was boosted to 30 fish a day, 60 in possession, at Beulah reservoir north of Yontub; Warm Springs reservoir north of Ontario, and Chickahominy reservoir west of Burns.

The commission said the Beulah reservoir was expected to go dry by Sept. 15; Warm Springs is expected to be down to a 1,000-acre puddle in which only the large-mouth bass will have a chance to survive, and Chickahominy may get too low and too warm to sustain fish. The commission said the water shortage is due to a drought in southeast Oregon plus needs of irrigators and ranchers.

Bag limit on McKay reservoir near Pendleton also was boosted to 30 a day, 60 in possession. The reservoir will be treated chemically this fall.

Roy Emerson, MacKay, the Dayton, Ohio, giant who upset second-seeded Neale Fraser in the quarter-finals, ran into another Aussie southpaw in the person of red-haired Rod Laver.

Fraser, Emerson and Laver are expected to make up Australia's Davis Cup team which will meet the U.S. in the challenge round at Forest Hills, N. Y., next month if the Aussies survive the preliminaries.

Olmedo, top-seeded for this latest Wimbledon show, was an odds on choice to demolish Emerson and then become the first South American to win the famed challenge trophy in Friday's final.

Fifth-seeded MacKay, who is on leave from the U. S. Air Force, also was favored. MacKay became the first Yank; to reach the semifinals in three years and now he would like to become the first U. S. winner of the men's crown since Tony Trabert walked off with the huge trophy in 1955.

Uncle Sam's strong aggregation also sewed up two berths in the women's semifinals Tuesday when Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., downed Ann Haydon of England, 1-6, 6-4, 7-5, and Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif., trounced Yola Ramirez of Mexico, 6-3, 6-2.

In Thursday's semifinals, Miss Hard will oppose Sandra Reynolds of South Africa and Miss Moore will play Maria Bueno of Brazil.

Miss Hard emerged as the women's title favorite when Miss Reynolds upset second-seeded Angela Mortimer of England, 7-5, 8-6, in the quarter-finals. Miss Bueno advanced with a 6-3, 6-3 triumph over Edda Buding.

Miss Hard also is shooting for two other titles in this two-week long tournament. She teamed with Jeanne Arth of St. Paul, Minn., to defeat Ann Shilcock of Britain and Susan Partridge of Australia, 6-0, 6-1, Tuesday in the quarter-finals of the women's doubles.

In today's mixed doubles competition, Miss Hard and Laver faced Janet Hopps of Seattle, Wash., and Ian Vermaak of South Africa. Another match pitted Miss Moore and Bob Howe of Australia against Joyce Fulton and R. Taylor of Britain.

Baseball Will Have Emphasis On Playgrounds

Playgrounds throughout Medford will open next week with emphasis on baseball for all boys between the ages of 8 and 12 years.

The grounds will be located at Hawthorne park, Hoover, Jackson, Jefferson, Washington and Wilson grade schools. The boys are asked to attend the park nearest their home.

The handsome champion sought to avoid publicity until Thursday when he plans to hold a morning news conference in nearby Fort Lauderdale. He said the main purpose of his trip was to rest and relax.

But so far he has had difficulty escaping the hordes of fans and newsmen who want to question him or shake that magic right hand which won him the title.

Johansson, sporting a jaunty red cap and plaid shirt, went on a shopping tour here Tuesday with his fiancée Birgit Lundgren and members of his family. The group is spending a few days at the nearby ocean-front home of Swedish-born industrialist Gustav von Reis.

The champion ended his day with a short afternoon cruise near Fort Lauderdale, aboard a friend's yacht. He also was presented an honorary sheriff's badge but declined an invitation to attend the Tuesday night boxing program at Miami Beach Auditorium.

Johansson indicated he will leave this week end for his native Sweden.

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
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
