We'll Help Use Eggs: Eat Chicken "Over the Fourth"

Now is the time for all good homemakers to come to the aid of the egg producers. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson and Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, have asked us to eat more eggs, to use up our share of the nation's over-abundance of eggs.

That's no hardship, Mr. Benson. We know that the hen does the neatest packaging job known to nature; that she packs each egg with high quality protein, vitamins and minerals. We know that ways of using eggs are beyond numbering and we can't think of a better time to use them to good advantage than right now... for our family's good health, for the sake of the egg producers and the agricultural economy of the country whose birthday we celebrate.

Egg quality is the highest. Prices are the lowest in 18 years. Poultry prices too are the lowest in our memory; all because supply exceeds demand.

We'll Devil Eggs

We've been deviling and stuffing eggs for Fourth of July picnics for 183 years now, and this year we'll fix an extra dozen knowing that everyone of them will be eaten and genuinely enjoyed.

6 hard-cooked eggs, cooled
Salt and pepper
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1 1/2 teaspoons vinegar
3 tablespoons melted butter or mayonnaise
Paprika or parsley

Cut hard-cooked eggs in halves lengthwise. Remove yolks and mash; add other ingredients and whip until smooth and fluffy. Heap into white halves leaving surface roughened and sprinkle with a little paprika or chopped parsley. Twelve halves.

For carrying to picnic grounds, fill egg whites and put halves together; wrap in waxed paper, foil or transparent wrap and chill well.

Variations Many
To the hard-cooked egg yolk mixture, add chopped crisply cooked bacon... or mashed liver sausage... or finely grated cheese in the amount desired.

Anchovy or other fish pastes or mashed sardines may be used in the same way, varying amount of salt, so taste and add salt last. Many like to add minced onion, either freshly minced or the instant variety.

We'll put Hard-Cooked Eggs in Chicken Salad

Hard-cooked eggs have been going into chicken (and potato) salads since hens and eggs first got together. We know perfectly well that we're not only helping the poultry and egg producers but we're giving our families an extra helping of fine nutrition when we put eggs in salads.

Six servings.
2 cups diced cooked chicken or turkey
2 cups diced celery
2 chopped hard-cooked eggs
1 cup mayonnaise or favor-

ed salad dressing
1 teaspoon fine grated onion or instant onion
Salt and pepper
Lemon juice
Salad Greens
Combine chicken or turkey, celery, chopped eggs and salad dressing. Season to taste with salt, pepper, grated onion and lemon juice. Chill and serve on greens.

Festive Variations

Almond. Add one-fourth to one-half cup slivered toasted almonds just before serving.

Avocado. Omit eggs and add one-half cup diced avocado, or serve in avocado halves.

Cranberry. Garnish or serve salad with cranberry sauce on side.

Grape. Add one-half cup seedless white grapes.

Pineapple. Add one-half cup diced fresh or canned pineapple.

Sour Cream Potato Salad for Picnickers

Hard-cooked eggs, sour cream and diced cucumber make this a potato salad for frequent repeating. You'll get at least 15 picnic servings or eight generous main dish servings.

4 cups sliced or diced cooked potatoes
1/2 cup diced cucumber
1 onion minced or table-spoon instant minced onion

3/4 teaspoon celery seed
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

3 hard-cooked eggs
1 1/2 cups sour cream
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup vinegar

2 teaspoons prepared mustard
Combine potatoes, cucumber, onion, celery seed, salt and pepper; blend perfectly. Cut egg whites into small pieces and add to potatoes. Mash egg yolks and combine with sour cream, mayonnaise, vinegar and mustard; blend.

Heat sour cream mixture slightly and pour over potatoes. Chill and serve on salad greens.

Soups for Sipping
When family and/or friends gravitate to terrace, patio or porch, pass a tray of any of the drinking soups, well chilled and served from pottery or plastic mugs, cups or sturdy tumblers. Sipping soups include cream of asparagus, black bean, cream of celery, cream of chicken, consommé, green pea, cream of mushroom, frozen green pea or potato.

Helsinki, Finland—(UP)—Fire raged through a prison in southwest Finland during the night killing at least 17 persons. Eight others were missing.

The fire broke out at Koeylio prison, near Pori, and raged for two hours before it was brought under control. The prison houses about 200 convicts. Most were freed as the flames swept through the building.

California French is distinctive, quite different, lightly spiced with paprika.

Exotic Herbs in blended with a master chef's touch from 16 ingredients.

Blue Cheese combines flavor of fine French dressing with nippy taste of aged cheese.

American French is spicy yet slightly sweet; makes a creamy textured dressing especially good with fruits and cheese. We did not use this on broilers.

Newest arrival on salad dressing mix scene is Cheese-Garlic; a flavorful, aromatic blend of blue cheese with touch of garlic.

For salad dressings, follow easy directions on package, needing only vinegar, water and oil.

Grilled Broilers
1 envelope California French salad dressing mix
6 tablespoons salad oil
3 tablespoons lemon juice
2 broiler-fryers, split
Combine salad dressing mix, oil and lemon juice. Brush broiler-fryer halves with seasoned oil mixture and set on grill with skin sides away from heat.

Washington—(UP)—A federal court jury resumes deliberations today in the Mack-Whiteside conspiracy trial after failing to reach a verdict Wednesday night.

Former Federal Communications Commissioner Richard A. Mack and his boyhood friend, Miami attorney Thurman A. Whiteside, have been on trial for three months. They were charged with conspiring to throw the FCC's award of Miami TV Channel 10 to Public Service Television, Inc., a subsidiary of National Airlines.

Whiteside was alleged to have influenced Mack's vote in favor of Public Service by making loans and gifts of money to him.

Eisenhowers Go To Mountain Retreat

Washington—(UP)—President and Mrs. Eisenhower slip off to their retreat in the Maryland mountains today to continue celebration of their 43rd wedding anniversary with an old-fashioned house party for old friends.

The couple was expected to leave this afternoon for Camp David, Md., in the Catoctin mountains where they will be able to escape the muggy Washington heat over the long July 4 week end.

Eisenhower, then a first lieutenant, married Mamie Geneva Doud in her frame house in Denver 43 years ago Wednesday.

Los Angeles (UP)—Andrew H. Hewett, 56, wrote a suicide note Wednesday, then killed himself by breathing the exhaust from his auto which he piped into the car through a hose. His note read: "Goodbye suckers."

Mentally Retarded Boy Admits Slaying

New York—(UP)—A physically and mentally retarded 14-year-old boy was arrested Wednesday night in the sex killing of a six-year-old boy whose parents had carried him to freedom from revolt-torn Hungary three years ago.

The body of little Zoltan Toth was found Wednesday in an empty tenement building near his home, his skull split by a blow from an iron pipe, later found in the yard of the building. The medical examiner said he had been sexually assaulted before he was slain.

A neighbor boy, Kenneth DeVoe, was booked on a charge of juvenile delinquency with a specification of homicide. His clothes were bloodstained when he was picked up by police, and he was said to have admitted the slaying.

Tillamook Group Studies Proposals

Tillamook—(UP)—A spokesman for the Tillamook County Creamery association said Wednesday that the association's board of directors is taking a compromise proposal in the wage dispute with the Teamsters union to farmer-owners in a series of meetings.

The strike has been under way since May 1. Tuesday night in Salem, creamery and union officials promised to look into a compromise offer after a four-hour meeting with Gov. Mark Hatfield in his office in the capitol.

The association said the first meeting was Wednesday night and the last meeting with producers is expected to be Monday night. Then, he said, the union and the association will talk over the results.

College-on-Credit Plan Told by Bank

A college-on-credit plan has been announced by the First National Bank of Oregon.

The plan, to be known as the "Firstbank College Education plan," will enable responsible parents or sponsors to buy a college education for their son or daughter on a monthly installment basis.

Parents may contract for an unsecured personal loan for a period up to six years.

Thornton Appoints Committeeman

Salem—(UP)—Arthur G. Higgs, assistant attorney general in charge of the Portland branch office of the state justice department, Wednesday was appointed by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton to serve on the legislative interim committee on criminal law.

Higgs assisted Thornton during the Portland vice investigation and has served as chief trial attorney with the Interstate Commerce Commission. He was a deputy district attorney in Multnomah county who has been with the justice department for 10 years. His home is in Beaverton.

New York (UP)—A 63-year-old Bronx woman was found dead in bed Wednesday with a plastic bag over her head. Police identified the woman as Mrs. Dorothy Krauser and listed the death as an apparent suicide.
