Feeding the Family

Honey Punch Quickie

Using only one package of lime-flavored instant soft drink mix, you get about two quarts of cooling refreshing beverage from this recipe; enough for 18 punch glasses, 12 paper cupfills or 10 regular glasses along with some crushed ice.

- 1 package lime-flavored instant soft drink mix
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 quarts hot water
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 6 cloves

Dissolve instant soft drink mix, honey and sugar in hot water. Add spices; cover and let stand five minutes; remove spices. Chill and serve with crushed ice.

Barbecue Reminders

Select foods that go well together as to size, flavor and color on rack or grill.

With the exception of ground meat, remove meat for barbecuing from refrigerator an hour or so before cooking time. Chilled meat requires extra cooking time.

Rub fat over the rack before putting meat on it to prevent meat from sticking.

Trim off excess fat from meat before cooking. Otherwise fat drips into coals causing flames and smoke.

Cut the edges of such meat as steaks, chops or ham slices so they won't "curl" during cooking.

Brush barbecue sauce generously on meat with a pastry brush (many use a paint brush for this) before cooking. A highly seasoned sauce is a "must" for barbecuing.

Sloppy Joe Burgers

Fill 'em up with Sloppy Joes! One of the most popular of the vast hamburger family is this meal in a bun. You'll get a lot of good flavorful eating from one pound of hamburger; enough for six burgers.

- 1 pound ground beef
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
 - 3 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons shortening
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - Pepper
 - 1 can tomato soup, undiluted
 - 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 small bay leaf, crushed
 - 1/2 cup grated American cheese
 - 6 hamburger buns
- Brown beef and chopped vegetables in hot fat. Combine tomato soup with salt, pepper, Worcestershire sauce and bay leaf. Add to meat mixture and cook over low heat until flavors are blended. Just before serving, add grated American cheese and heat through.
- Spoon into buttered toasted buns and serve with crisp lettuce leaves. Some like to broil slices of American cheese on lower part of split bun; then top with hot mixture. In this event, of course, omit the grated cheese from the mixture.

Picnic Check List

Put in ample supplies of paper napkins, paper plates, cups, dishes. Take life easy. For easy handling, pack salads, deviled eggs, pickles and other moist foods in empty ice cream containers or other covered paper or plastic carton.

Vegetables for salad can be cleaned the day before; potatoes for the salad, cooked and refrigerated.

For dessert, serve loaf cake that can be carried right in the pan.

Remember vital items are salt, pepper, paper napkins, mustard, matches, eating tools.

Simplest of all picnic menus for taking places is assorted cold meats and sliced cheese, baked beans, tossed salad, pickles, mustard, crusty sliced

French bread, loaf cake, cup cakes or cookies. Plenty of milk and coffee in thermos bottles.

Poultry Available At Very Low Cost

Smart shoppers will pick out best buys, get through check-out stands quickly.

Our super abundance of poultry of all kinds at very small cost will put broiler-fryers, stewing chicken or turkey on most menus at least once over the holiday. Many will brightly plan at least two poultry meals since cold fried chicken and cold turkey are superlative eating; eliminate cooking.

Put in extra eggs for stuffing, for salad making, for egg salad sandwiches and for bigger breakfasts for all the family; help use up your share of the over-abundance.

Meat. July is peak month for hamburger and hot dog buns. Americans consume more than 10 1/2 billion buns a year: Both hamburger and franks are bargains in good, easy eating. Be sure to have on hand plenty of mayonnaise, mustard, catsup, pickles, India relish, tomatoes and onions for slicing, potato and corn chips. With beverage, melon, the meal's made.

There'll probably be one supper of delicatessen cold cuts and cheese along with an assortment of rye bread and relishes. Fresh fruit, melon or berry pie a la mode.

Melons and Fruit. Watermelon of course and cantaloupes, honeydews, Cranshaws for chilling, enjoying morning, noon, night and between-times. Prices are down, quality high. There's increasing abundance of peaches, plus nectarines, apricots. Astrachans, first of the apples for saucing and green apple pie making are here. Berries in great variety for breakfast and dessert pleasuring.

Vegetables. On every list, there'll be corn on the cob and potatoes for baking and/or for potato salad making. There'll be green onions, radishes, green peppers and celery for relish trays; an assortment of greens for salad making. You'll want tomatoes for slicing, onions for slicing and chopping. There are green beans, beets, broccoli, green and red cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, eggplant, cucumbers, hard and soft squash.

Beverages, Paper Products. Chilled glassed and canned beverages will be tremendously popular. Lemons and lemonade concentrate, of course. You'll need extra milk and ice cream. Put in plenty of paper napkins, plates, cups, etcetera. Have big waste basket handy.

Oregon Traffic Toll Lowest in 50 Months

Salem—The lowest monthly traffic fatality toll in Oregon for 50 months was recorded during June, the State Motor Vehicle Department has reported.

Twenty-two Oregonians and one out-of-stater died on Oregon highways during June. April of 1955 is the last month to show a lower figure.

The June toll brings the six month traffic fatality figure in Oregon to 201.

Demolition Bids to Be Called July 9

Bids for demolishing the northern half of the Western Auto store on South Riverside ave. to make way for the extension of Eighth st. across Bear creek have been called for July 9 by the City of Medford.

Following the demolition, Eighth st. will be extended across the property to a bridge over Bear creek, for which a contract has already been let. The street will be extended eastward to East Main st., along an embankment already constructed, to provide the final touch on the Main st.-Eighth st. couplet.

The city acquired the property June 1, but continued the lease to Western Auto through the first two weeks of July, according to City Manager Robert A. Duff. Rental revenue gained thereby totals \$450, Duff reported.

Cary Grant Sued By N.Y. Columnist

Los Angeles—UPI—Acton Cary Grant was sued for half a million dollars Thursday by a New York Herald Tribune columnist who charged he was slandered by the actor.

Joe Hyams charged in his Superior court suit that after he had written a series of articles about Grant that the actor on or about April 20 made this statement: "The articles about me by Joe Hyams are false. Joe Hyams wrote that I gave him an interview and that I said I had had psychiatric experience."

"I have never had an interview with Hyams on any subject. I haven't even seen Joe in two years. The articles are completely erroneous. I have never undergone any psychiatric treatment, nor have I ever had any experience with psychiatry, and I never told Joe any such thing."

Hyams' suit said Grant's reported statement was "defamatory" and "false in every part of it."
