

Yankees Take 7-0 Victory Over Senators and Split

Bob Turley allowed only one hit—a lead-off single by pinch-hitter Julio Becquer in the ninth inning—as he pitched the New York Yankees to a 7-0 victory over the Washington Senators and a split in their holiday double-header Saturday. The Senators won the opener, 10-6.

It was the closest Turley had come to pitching a no-hitter since 1954 when he lost a similar bid in the ninth inning while hurling for the Baltimore Orioles against the Cleveland Indians.

help from his teammates, who blasted three Washington pitchers for 13 hits, including four by Tony Kubek.

Grelle Tops Burleson In AAU Mile

Eugene, Ore., July 4—(UPI)—NCAA champion Jim Grelle won the mile race in the Oregon AAU track and field championships here Saturday afternoon defeating University of Oregon miler Dyrrol Burleson by a hair. Grelle's time was 4:06.7. Burleson, a freshman, came in at 4:07.2.

In earlier events, an Oregon AAU high jump record was shattered by Wayne Moss of Oregon State college at 6 feet, 9 and 5/8 inches.

Dallas Long, a shot put challenger from the University of Southern California, upset record holder Parry O'Brien with a throw of 62 feet, 5 and 3/4 inches. O'Brien's throw was 62 feet, 2 and 1/2 inches. The world's record, set by O'Brien is 63 feet, 2 inches.

In the high hurdles, Dave Edstrom of Oregon tied the AAU record of 14 and 3-10ths seconds.

The 100 yards dash record in the Oregon AAU was tied by Harry Jerome of the Vancouver Olympic club in 9 and 5-10ths seconds.

In the mile race, Grelle and Burleson stayed behind the field at the start and slowly came from behind in the first three quarters. The three-quarter mark was three minutes and eight seconds with Jack Larson of Washington leading. At that point, Burleson took over the lead until Grelle kicked and shot ahead for the race.

Jurges Red Sox Manager

Baltimore—(UPI)—Bill Jurges formally took over as manager of the Boston Red Sox yesterday confident that "Ted Williams and a little extra hustle" will prove they're not an eight-place team.

The 51-year-old ex-Chicago Cub shortstop great, who succeeded Mike Higgins Friday, promised at his first press conference that the Red Sox would vacate the American League cellar before the end of the season.

Like all managers of the Red Sox, Jurges was queried about his relations with temperamental slugger Ted Williams. Williams has been in a slump all season and many experts think that he finally is washed up.

"Oh, Ted's okay, he'll be slugging away soon," said Jurges. "I'm lucky to have him on my side."

Jurges, who has signed a contract through the 1960 season, arrived in Baltimore in time to see the Red Sox last night but did not go to the park. The Sox lost, 6-1.

Higgins, American League manager of the year in 1955 was the first manager ever fired by Red Sox club owner Tom Yawkey in mid-season.
