

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 7259
 AN ORDINANCE declaring the assessment on the property benefited for the cost of laying a Six Inch Water Main on Mary Street from Saling Avenue to Jackson Street and on Jackson Street from Mary Street to McAndrews Street, in the City of Medford, Oregon, and directing the recorder to enter a statement thereof in the Docket of City Liens and publish a notice thereof as required by the Charter.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDINANCE AS FOLLOWS:
SECTION 1. Whereas, the City Council did heretofore by Resolution declare its intention to lay a Six Inch Water Main on Mary Street from Saling Avenue to Jackson Street and on Jackson Street from Mary Street to McAndrews Street, in the City of Medford, Oregon, and to assess the cost thereof on the property fronting on said portion of said street (s) in proportion to the frontage of said property, and did fix a time and place for hearing protests against the laying of said water main on said street (s) and the assessment of the cost thereof as aforesaid,
 AND WHEREAS, Resolution was duly posted and published as required by Section 116 of the Charter of said City,
 AND WHEREAS a meeting of the Council was held at the place and time fixed in said Resolution for the purpose of considering any such protests and of assessing the cost thereof as aforesaid, and said Council, having considered the matter and deeming that said water main was and is of material benefit to said City and that all property to be assessed therefor will be benefited to the extent of the probable amount of the cost of the assessments to be levied against said property, did order said water main laid,
 AND WHEREAS a summary of the cost of the said water main is as follows:

 The cost of said water main to be assessed has been and hereby is declared to be the sum of \$2,302.03.

NOW THEREFORE, it is hereby further determined that the proportionate share of the cost of laying said water main of each parcel of the property fronting on said portion of said street (s) and the amount set opposite the description of each piece or parcel of land below and that each piece or parcel is benefited by the laying of said water main to the full extent of the amount set opposite the description of such piece or parcel and that the respective amounts represent the proportionate share of said water main to said respective parcels of property and are the proportional frontage thereof on said portion of said street (s), and the Council does hereby declare each of the parcels of property as described below to be assessed and each of the same hereby is assessed the amount set opposite each respective description for the cost of laying said water main.

Caribbean Faces Threats of War

Washington—(UPI)—The threat of a shooting war in the Caribbean hung today over a meeting of the Organization of American States on the Dominican Republic's invasion charges against Cuba and Venezuela.

The three countries have placed their armed forces on a war footing. Reports from Cuidad Trujillo, the Dominican capital, quoted high government officials as referring publicly to the possibility of "open belligerence."

Special Meeting Seen
 The OAS was expected to summon a special meeting of the foreign ministers of the 21 American nations to discuss the tense Caribbean situation.

Dominican Ambassador Virgilio Liaz Ordonez told the organization last week that Cuba and Venezuela backed invasions of his country June 14 and June 20. He said 3,000 men were training in Cuba and 25 warplanes had been obtained by Venezuela in preparation for a new invasion.

Cuba and Venezuela heatedly denied the charges. They said that the Dominican Republic planned to bomb San-

The horse suffered small cuts on his right leg and a large lump on his right hip. The car had a damaged hood and right fender. No other injuries were reported and no citations issued, state police said.

Plans can be obtained at the office of the architect, William H. Siebert, Medford. Specifications call for concrete block walls. The floor is to be a concrete slab and the roof of glued laminated beams with a four-inch wood deck and built-up roof. Sash and exterior doors are steel.

The ceremony each year is in memory of five men killed in 1934 violence on the Pacific Coast when the Longshoremen's union was fighting for recognition and establishment.

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Former Legislator Dies in California

Ben C. Sheldon, 82, a member of the Oregon state legislature from Jackson county from 1918 to 1922, died June 28 in Los Angeles. He was a resident of Medford until 1932 and owned a home at 1470 Kings highway.

Mr. Sheldon was a pioneer land developer in the Los Angeles area in the 1920s and 30s. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a member of the Al Malaikah Shrine club, and the Los Angeles Kiwanis club.

He leaves a daughter, Mrs. Barbara Clyde; a son, Dr. David B. Sheldon; two brothers and six grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted July 1.
