Industrials Falter; Rails Jump Ahead

New York—(UPI)—Industrial stocks faltered today but railroad issues highballed ahead to assume market leadership. The industrials ran into profit taking after eight straight sessions of advance had carried that average to a new all-time high and had added more than \$12,600,000, 000 to market values.

But the rails saved the day by picking up the slack. Despite the selling for profits, the industrial list was generally mixed with some issues managing to ring up fairly sharp gains.

Addressograph rose around 3 white gains of around 2 or more appeared in Crane, Maytag and Victor Chemical. Western Maryland, New York Central, Norfolk & Western and Louisville & Nashville all rose around a point or more in the rails.
