State Supreme Court Disbars Sheridan Man
Salem—The Oregon Supreme Court today permanently disbarred Otto W. Heider, a Sheridan attorney, upon recommendation of the Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar.

The board found Heider guilty of 10 different charges, including profiting from and failing to account for funds in an estate, co-mingling of clients' funds, gross negligence in conducting probate proceedings, tampering with evidence, attempted bribery of a juror, materially altering a negotiating document, communicating with an adverse party known to be represented by counsel and deliberate misleading of a trial court.

Rail Issues Feature Active Stock Market

New York—Strength in railroad issues featured a mixed, moderately active stock market today. Profit taking in steels, oils and electronics brought irregularity into the industrial list, which had moved ahead in nine consecutive sessions to new all-time average highs. The railroad average hit a new three-year high. Kansas City Southern was the railroad star, rising more than 4 points at its best level. General Motors lost more than a point but other auto pivots improved fractionally. DuPont was strong in the chemicals, which helped to cushion the industrial average. Chemical stocks were easier as a group.
