

### Handicap Rating Gives Boat Race Lead to Kialoa

Los Angeles—UPI—Kialoa, the 50-foot yawl out of Newport Harbor, Calif., held its lead in the handicap ratings entering the fifth day of sailing today in the 2,225-mile trans-Pacific yacht race from Los Angeles to Honolulu.

At last report by radio Tuesday the 161-foot schooner Goodwill retained its lead of the 41-yacht fleet, but still was down in the handicap ratings.

The Kialoa wasn't a contender among the leaders of the fleet but its handicap place it ahead in the adjusted ratings based on size and classification of each ship.

The Goodwill, owned by Ralph Larrabee and sailing out of Newport Harbor, was 1,625 miles from its destination at roll call Tuesday, about one-fourth of the distance. It led by 42 miles its nearest contender, Sally Blair Ames' 75-foot schooner Constellation, followed by Baldwin M. Baldwin's 72-foot yawl Escapade, E. L. Doheny's 75-foot Kamalii and Ira P. Fulmor's 60-foot yawl Criterion.

In women's action at the Columbia-Edgewater golf course, favorite Shirley Engelhorn, Caldwell, Idaho, left the field behind with 150. The Oregon and Idaho champion shot a 78 Tuesday to go with Monday's 72.

Eight strokes off the lead at 158 was Elaine Porritt, Eugene. Knotted at 160 were Mrs. Pat Lesser Harbottle, Tacoma, and Mrs. Richard Borst, Portland.

## Western Open At Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh—UPI—Pittsburgh is set today to host its second All-Star event of the week—the \$25,000 Western Open golf tournament, which opens Thursday on the 6,232-yard Pittsburgh Field club course.

But unlike the All-Star baseball game held here Tuesday, a quartet of golf's brightest stars will be absent from the event.

Masters champion Art Wall, 1959's leading money winner from Pocono Manor, Pa., heads the group of absentees. U. S. ## Alphonse Halimi Defends Bantamweight Ring Toga

Los Angeles—UPI—Durable Alphonse Halimi of France tonight puts up his bantamweight crown as the prize for challenger Jose Becerra's best shots in their 15-round title bout.

The championship fight is being telecast nationally but is blacked out in southern California which was expected to provide most of the 16,000 or more fans expected in the new Sports Arena.

The 7 p.m. (p.d.t.) bout is the dedicatory event in the six million dollar structure on which workmen are still applying the finishing touches.

Becerra is the second Mexican to try to lift Halimi's title. Raul Raton Macias made the first attempt Nov. 6, 1957, here in Los Angeles. Becerra was on the same card and suffered a crushing defeat-knocked out in four rounds by Dwight Hawkins, a defeat he later reversed.

Halimi, the 27-year-old French-Algerian of Jewish ancestry, probably will try to put on the same type of fight against Becerra that he did against Macias with the hope for the same victorious result. The bull-shouldered champion shoots for points with a powerful body attack and after he has weakened his opponent sufficiently either continues on for a decision or then tries for a knockout.

Becerra, 23, on the other hand, is a strong puncher when he is fresh. He will be shooting for a quick knockout and his ability to go 15 rounds is untested, never having gone that route.

## Fighters Continue To Drill Lightly

Portland—UPI—With heavy drills behind them, both World Welterweight Champion Don Jordan and challenger Denny Moyer today continued to tune up for their Friday night title fight at Portland Meadows.

Some roadwork and light bag punching were on the training slate for both fighters as they concluded sparring sessions Tuesday.

Each scrapper expressed confidence that he would win, but neither would predict a knockout victory for himself Tuesday as they met with the press.

Consider Request

Today the Portland Boxing Commission was scheduled to meet for a discussion of Jordan's request for "outside" officials.

Predictions were for fair weather for the nationally-televised title scrap and a crowd of about 10,000 persons was expected at the Portland Meadows.

Special bus service from downtown Portland to Portland Meadows has been announced by Rose City Transit company. A company spokesman said buses will leave S.W. 6th and Yamhill every 15 minutes beginning at 4:30 p.m. Fight time will be 6 p.m. with a 5:30 p.m. four round preliminary and a pair of four-rounders and an eight-round scrap after the title bout.

## Ring Bout Won By Phil Moyer

Richmond, Calif.—UPI—Portland's Phil Moyer was awarded the technical knockout over Tony Dominguez of Oakland after six rounds Tuesday night in the Richmond auditorium main event here.

The ring physician ordered the middleweight scrap stopped after the sixth when Dominguez was unable to continue because of a badly-cut right eye.

Moyer, employing snappy left jabs and a wicked body attack, was well ahead on points when the bout was stopped. He repeatedly rocked Dominguez' head with rapid combinations.
