Barneburg Hill Park Suggested by City Parks Commission

Reserving part of the city-owned reservoir site on Barneburg hill for future park development was recommended Wednesday night by members of Medford's parks and recreation commission.

Other subjects discussed by the four commission members present included the recently donated locomotive corporation logging locomotive, Union street park development, the renovation program for Prescott park atop Roxy Ann butte, plans for the West Jackson st. park and swimming pool site and progress in the city's summer recreation program.

Recommendation
The recommendation for the Barneburg hill property was in response to a request from the Medford water commission, which acquired the 13-acre site for eventual construction of an 11-million gallon reservoir. The reservoir is expected to take up only about four of the 13 acres.

The rest, according to City Water Superintendent Robert L. Lee, could be used for park purposes or could be sold for homesites. The property is bounded by Argonne ave., Shannon rd., Nieto way and Black Oak dr.

Private developers of the surrounding property are interested in some improvements to these streets in 1959-60, according to Lee, and are asking that the city pay half the improvement assessments. If park development was approved, Lee told the parks and recreation commission recently, the water commission would propose to pay half the city's assessment costs if the city itself would pay the other half.

Funds Not Available
No funds are available for this in the city parks and recreation department's 1959-60 budget. The parks and recreation commission's recommendation last night places three questions before the city council: a policy question, whether the area should be reserved for park development; and two fiscal questions, whether the city would agree to pay part of the assessments and where the funds would come from.

Lee has "conservatively"

estimated one-half the total improvement costs at \$16,250. He has estimated that half the total cost for the improvements proposed in 1959-60 alone would be \$7,500. This would make the 1959-60 cost to the water department and to the city itself about \$3,750 each.

City Parks and Recreation Director Robert L. Haworth reported that the Medco logging locomotive, currently on a siding at Medco's Medford plant, would be "mothballed" pending its removal to the West Jackson st. park area. He said Southern Pacific railroad has agreed to the use of its tracks to bring the gift iron horse as close to the park as possible.

Films Shown
Features of last night's meeting were two films of the excursion trip June 27 when the locomotive brought a trainload of local dignitaries down from Butte Falls. One, in black and white, was taken by a staff member of KVAL-TV, Eugene. The second was a color film taken by Kenn Knackstedt, Medford professional photographer.

Development of the Union street neighborhood park is now in the path-installation stage, Haworth reported. He said city equipment would assist in this work.

Haworth reported that several civic organizations are anxious to start renovation projects in Prescott park. He stated that the possibility of improving the park's water supply to provide water for other spots as well as the two picnic areas was being studied. Eugene Garner reported that Jackson county crews have spent about \$400 in materials alone in spraying poison oak in the area. He said the results appeared gratifying.

Slight changes in preliminary plans for the West Jackson st. park layout were discussed by Haworth. He explained that it would be more a playground than a true park. Mrs. Edith Eden, acting as chairman of the meeting, complimented Marrs R. Gibbons of Builders Supply company for erecting a fence and planting trees to screen his adjacent brickyard and provide an attractive view from the park.

Residents Reminded Not To Waste Water

A summer reminder that waste of water is prohibited has been mailed to all city water users by the Medford Water commission.

The pamphlet advises users to turn off their lawn sprinklers and other non-essential water when a fire siren sounds, to help provide more water at better pressure.

Users also should not use open hoses, without sprinklers, the notice states, because they put pressure on other customers.

Water running down sidewalks, streets or gutters as a result of sprinkling is prohibited, as is use of water through hose for sprinkling streets, the pamphlet reminds residents.

Senate Committee Ignores Plea for No Public Works

Washington—UPI—President Eisenhower faced a new challenge to his budgetary policies today which he might slap down with another veto.

The challenge developed when the Senate Appropriations Committee ignored the President's new starts on public works edict by voting late Wednesday a \$1,256,332,300 money bill. It carried cash for more than 100 new dams, flood control projects and the like.

New Starts Doubled

The committee doubled the number of new starts voted Senate did not follow the by the House. Moreover, the House's compensating reductions in Eisenhower's requests to finance the new projects. Therefore, the Senate bill is \$80,159,300 larger than the President's proposal.

Following are the Senate Committee's changes in House-approved construction work by the Army Engineers on flood control and navigation projects. The Senate committee's figure is listed first:

California - Sacramento river ship channel, \$7,500,000, \$6,500,000; San Jacinto river and Bautista creek, \$225,000, (new); Santa Cruz Harbor, \$400,000, (new).

In addition, the committee made the following changes in the Reclamation Bureau's regular construction projects:

Gila Project Voted
Arizona-Gila Project, \$3,449,000, \$1,139,000; Colorado front work and levee system, \$450,000, (new).

California - Central Valley Project, \$44,565,000, \$42,150,000.

Idaho - Burns Creek Dam and power plant \$500,000, (new).

Nevada - Washoe Project, \$1,000,000, (new).

Washington - Chief Joseph Dam, Greater Wenatchee Division, \$500,000, \$724,000.

The following changes in the Reclamation Bureau's Missouri Basin project were approved by the Senate committee:

Montana - East Bench unit, \$1,000,000; Yellowstone Dam, \$3,000,000, (new).
