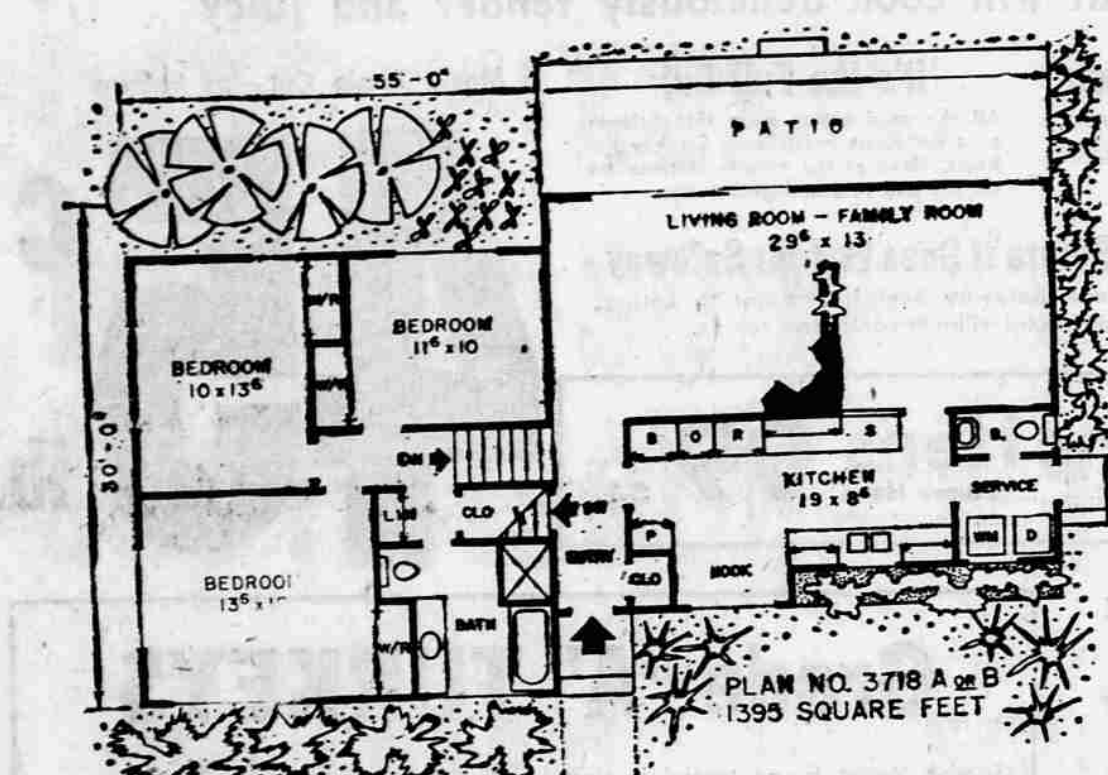




This Week's Home of Distinction

In this modern ranch style home, we are featuring a split-level design which has become very popular in recent years.

Two sets of stairs are located off the center hall entry - one leads up to the bedroom wing and the other goes down to the garage and workshop area.

A large living room which is separated by a fireplace and planter opens onto a rear patio.

The kitchen has a large eating area, a broom and pantry closet plus the latest built-in features. A partial wall behind the range opens the kitchen to the family room.

Both the forced air furnace and water heater have been

located in the 24'x24'-6" (inside dimensions) garage-workshop beneath the bedroom wing.

The house as presented here is Plan No. 3718-A. For those who like this design but cannot build a split-level home due to the contour of their lot, this plan is available with all the living area on the same level and with a detached double garage since the bedroom wing will be eliminated. The water heater and forced air furnace will be located in a closet off the bedroom hall. This one level plan is No. 3718-B.

When ordering this plan, PLEASE SPECIFY whether you prefer exterior "A" (split

level) or "B" (one level).

Complete working drawing of the above plan can be obtained at a cost of \$1.50 for the first set, and \$5 for each additional set. GARDENING TIPS

USE SHALLOW CULTIVATION

Shallow cultivation in a garden is best for vegetables. Home gardeners know that the roots of early planted vegetables are near the surface. It is unwise to unduly disturb or cut off these roots by too deep a cultivation since a hurt root system will reflect on the above-ground part of the plant. Cultivation should be only deep enough to control weeds when close to the plant itself, and for that reason it is a good idea to uncover some of the root crops to find out just how deep the feeder roots are, and then adjust your equipment accordingly.

Andy Duncan, vegetable specialist at Oregon State college, points out that American gardeners could benefit more from all the effort put forth by this country's plant breeders. Unfortunately many insist upon clinging to obsolete varieties. With few exceptions the vegetable varieties grown commercially are well adapted to home garden culture.

A glance at any display of seed packets will reveal an amazing array of ancient varieties that must give seedsmen an expensive "headache" to perpetuate. I'm sure the county agent would have fewer troubleshooting calls to make at home gardens if more gardeners grew the new, high-yielding, disease resistant, well-adapted vegetable varieties.

If cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli or brussels sprouts are to be transplanted in late July or early August, seed should be started only six weeks in advance of transplanting.

WEED CONTROL IN LAWNS

Fighting weeds in the lawn is a continual process and is difficult especially when you are trying to control both broadleaved weeds and crab grasses.

The most common weeds grasses are annual bluegrass and crab grass. Since they are annuals, preventing the formation of seed through repeated clippings or by killing the plants with a weed control chemical before the seeds are formed, these grasses will be less of a problem the next season. Special crab grass sprays are on the market and are generally helpful when directions on the container are

carefully followed.

Perennial grasses, on the other hand, cannot be sprayed out of a lawn but must be either spot sprayed or dug out and the areas reseeded. Broadleaved weeds on the other hand are easily controlled with 2,4-D and mixtures of 2,4,5-T. Repeating these sprays as necessary and timing properly will generally give satisfactory control of broadleaves.

Chickweed and speedwell, however, are hard to control with 2,4-D type sprays but can be suppressed if sprays are repeated. Where the problem is serious a chemical called 2,4,5-TP (Silvex or Kuron) will control chickweed while speedwell is best controlled with a chemical called Endothal. While neither 2,4,5-TP or Endothal are generally available in small packages for the home gardeners these materials can be obtained through commercial sources for spray materials.

Proper identification of weeds is beneficial in knowing what chemicals to apply. Anyone who has a problem and would like to bring some samples of the weeds into the extension office, we would be glad to identify the weeds for them. Samples of weeds are best obtained by digging the entire weed, root and all, and keeping it fresh in a plastic bag until the identification has been made.

PROPER CUTTING OF ROSE BLOOMS

If flowers are cut during first of bloom, cut with very short stems only. After first season you may cut longer stems for indoor decorating.

But, allow at least two leaves (each rose leaf has from three to seven leaflets), or two leaf buds between cut and main stem so new flowering stems can develop.

Rose blooms cut just before petals start to unfold last longer than those cut after fully opened. Also, they will keep better if cut in late afternoon.

If the flowers are not cut, remove them after petals fall by cutting above the topmost leaf. After all flowers of a cluster have withered, cut off entire stem just above top leaf.

EARWIGS A PROBLEM

Earwigs are becoming more evident around the home and garden.

When this pest occurs in large numbers it often causes considerable damage to flow-

ers, vegetables, fruits and ornamental plants. They are also an objectionable pest when they get inside the home and in spite of their fierce looking pinners they are a harmless insect as far as biting or pinching people is concerned. There is no truth to the old superstition this insect crawls into the ears of sleeping people.

Earwigs can be successfully controlled by repeated use of poison baits or by the use of DDT, or Malathion sprays or dusts. Persistence and heavy applications are needed to keep this pest in check during this time of year.

People who have been having trouble might be interested in stopping by the extension office and picking up Circular 655, "Control of the European Earwig."

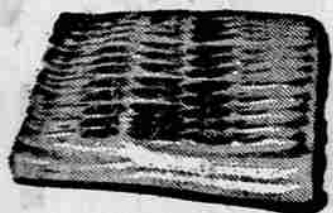
