Camp White — With attention given at Camp White to come of the problems of age among veterans, notably in the fields of adaptation, activity and recreation, comes a report to Manager Henry Herzog concerning the more scientific aspects undertaken in medical research.

It is this problem of dealing with the aging that concerns the Veterans Administration most now, not so much because of the preponderance of older men under care at the present time, but because in another decade there will be only six million of the 22 million veterans under age 45.

The studies now going forward at various VA centers throughout the country are aimed at better knowledge of physical disease, mental ailments and basic conditions on aging itself.

Here are a few of the basic studies:

An 11 hospital study of drugs used for treatment of high blood pressure.

A 14 hospital study of hardening of the arteries, heart attacks and strokes.

A 16 hospital study of lung functions in older men.

There are 64 groups in 59 different VA hospitals working under direction of the National Cancer Institute on chemotherapy in cancer.

Gland deterioration, changes in brain wave patterns in older men, and the response of older veterans to hormones are under investigation at Martinsburg, W. Va., hospital.

A study of the intercellular cement that holds cell structures together is being made at Downey hospital near Chicago, and at Pittsburgh.

The chemical and clinical aspects of diet are being considered at the West Roxbury, Mass., VA hospital.

At Brooklyn, N.Y., glaucoma, the disease that causes blindness in older people is under investigation.

Salem—(UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday appointed Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge of Silverton to the Capitol Planning Commission.

Dr. Kleinsorge served several years on the State Board of Highway Education, including terms as its president and chairman of the Campus Building committee, before retiring from the board earlier this year.
