In those 7-4 affairs, Spokane defeated Vancouver, Salt Lake took Phoenix and Portland beat Seattle. In the nonconforming contest, San Diego thrashed Sacramento 6-1.

The Solons managed to maintain their two-game lead over Vancouver, but the rest of the league moved in a little closer. There are now only five and a half games separating the first six teams.

MADDOX DEBUT
Terry Maddox, ex-Medford high baseballer and University of Oregon All-American, recently made an auspicious debut for the Eugene Emeralds of the professional Northwest league.

A story in the Eugene Register-Guard stated, "... Maddox dramatically and single-handedly batted in all four runs... Saturday night in his first game in a Eugene uniform and carried the Emeralds by the 'Yakima Bears'..."

Maddox was signed by the Emeralds a week after being released by the Salem Senators. He had rejoined Salem after finishing a tour of Army duty at the Presidio, San Francisco. The ex-Medford pitcher and outfielder, playing in left field for the Ems, socked a three-run homer and singled in another marker.

NO SURPRISE
Pitcher Derald Wooton had the eyes of his Grants Pass teammates popping Sunday when he made his bow as a Merchants' moundman. That he did was no surprise to Medford baseball followers who watched Wooton pitch in high school here and in semi-pro ball for the Medford Cheney Studs of the former Southern Oregon league.

In 1956, in between seasons with Los Angeles (Brooklyn) Dodger farm clubs, Wooton was the leading chucker in the fast SO loop. He obtained unconditional release from the Dodgers in 1958.

According to Bill Palmroth in the Grants Pass Daily Courier, the Merchants may have just a ball game to Ashland last Sunday, but "they certainly found themselves a pitcher in Wooton." Palmroth, who is on the Merchant squad as well as being sports scribe for the Courier, said that "Wooton looks to have a lot of life in his fast ball yet" and that he blends in a sharp breaking slider.

Ernie Tyler, ex-Medford high baseball pitcher, was to leave here today for Portland to enter the Air Force. After tests and physical exam in Portland, he is to be sent to San Antonio, Tex., for 11 weeks of basic training. Tyler anticipates a four-year tour of duty. He said that he would try to make flight school after his basic training is over.

A 1957 Medford grad, Tyler attended Southern Oregon college for a year and has worked for Safety stores.

Trackmen Run Here Saturday

An all-comers track and field meet at the Medford High stadium this Saturday will be the first of three this month under sponsorship of the Oregon Olympic Development program and the City of Medford parks and recreation department.

The July 11 session and one on July 18 will be warm-ups for a championship meet on July 25.

Saturday's meet will be in two sections. Juniors will vie from 10 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. and high school and open divisions from 5 to 7 p.m.

AAU Members
Junior classes for boys and girls has 10 and under, 11-12, 13-14 and 15-16 age groups. The high school class is for 17-18 years of age boys and the open or senior group includes college age men, although younger athletes may participate.

Participants must be AAU members. AAU cards may be obtained for nominal dues at the meet registration table. Entrants are asked to arrive a half to one hour ahead of their events in order to register and warm up properly. With a couple of exceptions entry is unlimited. No runner can take part in both the half-mile and mile. He must pick one or the other. Also, an event will not be held up for an athlete of participating in another contest.

Ashland city recreation department is holding a meet at 7:15 p.m. Friday at Southern Oregon college oval and will have another on July 24.
