

# Kozlov To Conclude Midwest Tour By Trade Fair Visit

Chicago — (UP) — Soviet First Deputy Premier Frol R. Kozlov wound up a three-day sampling of life in the mid-western United States today with a visit to the International Trade Fair.

Fair officials said they hoped a tour of the exhibits, containing products from all parts of the world, would be an eye-opener for the Russian official.

The trade fair's motto is "World peace through world trade." Richard Revnes, managing director of the fair, said fair officials wanted Kozlov "to see the interchange of experience and ideas which his creating better understanding among nations."

### Heads for Pittsburgh

Kozlov and his party were to leave by plane for Pittsburgh after spending 30 or 45 minutes viewing the two miles of exhibits.

## Georgia Prisoners Due Scanty Diet Because of Strike

Reidsville, Ga. — (UP) — A state prison hunger strike by inmates who demanded fried eggs for breakfast was broken up today when 225 ring leaders were hauled off in handcuffs to other prison camps.

State Corrections Director John M. Forrester said the men responsible for the demonstration would be placed on bread and water.

"I think this has cracked it," Forrester said. "We've got the ring leaders and after they were removed you could hear a pin drop."

Strike Expected  
The inmates of the huge state prison began their hunger strike Thursday but prison authorities had been expecting it for almost two weeks and were ready to move in swiftly to put it down.

Forrester said the men will be dispersed among 16 other state institutions and 85 county work camps. They will get bread and water diets except for one full meal every five days.

A "hard-core" of 140 prisoners went to the rock quarry prison for incorrigibles at Buford, where in recent years numbers of inmates have slashed their heel tendons to avoid the hard labor.

Started Thursday  
The hunger strike started Thursday at breakfast and some 1,000 inmates, mostly white, had joined the hunger strike at supper time Thursday night. The prison has 2,696 inmates.

Forrester said Warden P. R. Balkcom this morning told the men personally that those who wanted to eat to proceed into the dining areas. All but 225 answered the warden's call.

## 'Copter Crashes On Klamath Lake

Klamath Falls — (UP) — An Air Force helicopter with Col. Jack W. Williams, commanding officer of Kingsley Field, aboard, crashed on the shore of Upper Klamath Lake about noon Thursday.

None of the five occupants aboard was injured, except for scratches.

The Air Force said the 'copter was on a routine flight to inspect the recreation area being developed on the lake for Air Force personnel.

The 'copter did not burn. Personnel aboard were Col. Williams, co-pilot; 1st Lt. Michael Langford, pilot; Maj. William Hicks, Maj. John Scarboro, and Maj. Eugene Hollway.

The Russian official got a look at widely different aspects of life in Mid-America Thursday. He toured rich corn belt county 55 miles southwest of Chicago, then had a night out at an exclusive North Shore country club and music festival.

He pulled his ear lobes, scratched his nose and lightly applauded most of the number by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at the Ravinia Music Festival but leaped to his feet and led a standing ovation when pianist Byron Janis concluded the program with Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto.

Kozlov, who heard Van Cliburn play the number during his triumphant Moscow appearances, diplomatically refused to say how he thought Cliburn and Janis compared.

Faces Picketed  
The Russians, who faced 100 placard-waving pickets early in the day at City Hall, were picketed again at Ravinia and the swank Indian Hill Country club at Wilmette.

A single picket at the entrance to the music festival grounds carried a sign reading: "Keep Kozlov and company from infiltrating."

At the country club, three American Legionnaires picketed with signs reading: "Why isn't Mr. Kozlov behind bars?" and "Kozlov — Your embassy says Russia will murder a third of all Americans when they conquer us."

## Chessman Declares No Compromise in Fight for Freedom

San Quentin, Calif. — (UP) — Convict-author Caryl Chessman, who has lived in the shadow of the gas chamber for 11 years, said today he wanted no compromise in his fight for freedom — "I go to hell or Hollywood."

"Hollywood" in Chessman's case is Los Angeles where he was sentenced to death June 25, 1948, as the infamous "red light bandit" who pretended he was a policeman to terrorize lover's late couples. He was convicted of 17 counts of kidnap, rape and robbery. Wants New Trial

He wants to go back to Los Angeles for a new trial. He insists that, while he may have been a habitual criminal, he was not the red light bandit.

"Now there is no compromise," the 38-year-old convict with the 136 IQ said in an interview.

"I'm too old to serve more time in prison, going to the

"yard" to live like a vegetable. I want a new trial and a finding of not guilty.

"Nor will I ever make application to the governor for commutation. It is an implication of guilt. I'm going to keep doing my damndest until convinced I haven't a chance. Then I'll walk into the gas chamber and tell the executioner to come and get me."

Chessman has written four books in prison, including the best-selling autobiography "Cell 2455, Death Row." By his own reckoning, he has written the equivalent of 45 full-length novels in legal briefs, appeals and research papers in staving off execution.

### Earnings Gone

He has earned more than \$100,000 from his writings but, he said, legal and other expenses have drained it away to the point where he's broke now.

This week the California Supreme Court rejected the latest Chessman appeal. In a maximum of 60 days the Los Angeles court that originally sentenced him to death will set a new date for execution.

Meanwhile, Chessman is preparing a petition for a rehearing by the state Supreme Court. He is frankly skeptical of his chances there.

"My only hope lies in appeals to the federal courts, especially the U.S. Supreme Court where they can be decided on the merits of the case, not on legends favorable or unfavorable," he said.

### APPENDECTOMIES CUT

New York (UP) — Appendectomies declined 50 per cent between 1941 and 1956, according to the Archives of Surgery. Though there is no scientific explanation for the decline, some medical authorities attribute the drop partly to improved eating habits and the increased use of antibiotics.

### SOUTH OF THE BORDER

New York (UP) — Mexican fishermen docked a record shrimp catch of 31,400 metric tons last year, 26 per cent more than in the previous record year of 1956, according to the Mexican Bureau of Fisheries. The Bureau noted that shrimp imports last year totaled nearly \$40 million — another record.
