All-American Barbecue Sauce for Meats, Beans
For fresh air stimulated appetites, an excellent baked bean dish to feed 4 or 14 or 24 is easily made with canned beans. The new flavor note is a dollop of the same barbecue sauce which makes such a hit on broiler-fryers, hamburgers or frankfurters; a blend of mustard, unsulphured molasses, vinegar and seasonings. No cooking required. Make a generous supply. It will store indefinitely without refrigeration.

1/4 cup prepared mustard
1/4 cup unsulphured molasses
3 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons Worcester-shire sauce

1 teaspoon Tabasco
Put mustard and then molasses in a one cup measure. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Pour into jar and cover tightly. Store at room temperature or in refrigerator.

Party Baked Beans
For 12 party servings, empty 3 one-pound cans baked beans into skillet or casserole. Stir in one-half cup All American Barbecue Sauce (recipe above). Simmer in skillet on top of range 20 minutes; or cover and bake in skillet or casserole in hot oven, 425 degrees, 30 to 40 minutes. Top with tomato slices and onion rings.

Cape Canaveral, Fla.—The Defense department, on the present status of the Jupiter missile:

Small Worlds Around Us

Can't Measure Mother-Love in the Animal World
We have invented and perfected countless machines and instruments that accurately measure weights, quantities, even distances in miles or light-years to distant planets. We have gadgets that assay amounts so small they hardly can be seen under a microscope.

When it comes to measuring emotions, however, we have not done so well. We can't come close to saying how much a mother monkey thinks of her offspring. We admit the higher animals appear to display parental care and affection but we are reluctant to credit an animal with possessing a very high degree of mother-love. With typical human ego we associate this emotion to man alone.

Powerful Emotion
This love of offspring is one of the most powerful of human emotions and it does extend pretty deeply into the lives of all warm-blooded animals. In creatures like the monkey-folk, porpoise, whale, elephant and many others, mother-love is a factor to be reckoned with; an important emotion, one that actually brings about death by grief if the offspring is destroyed.

And, too, this mother-love

in animals must continue up to a certain definite point and suddenly cease. Then we say "the animal is weaned." From there on there is no personal care. The young bird, calf, colt or porpoise is on its own to survive or perish as the fates dictate.

Peculiar Instinct
It is a peculiar instinct indeed, that reaches a certain climax and then subsides, only to be rekindled when another baby is born. In some of the higher animals, the porpoise for one, the young, never over two in number, remain constantly with the mother for a long time, during which time they are taught the things they must know.

The mother gives every evidence of a deep love for the baby; will often actually die if deprived of the little one. Such mother-love closely parallels that which humans believe is solely theirs.

Where there is no love what-so-ever, such as in the strata of life composed of the insects, reptiles and fish there is absolutely no mother-love displayed, even in the mildest form; it's every bug, fish or frog for itself. Perhaps it's fortunate that this is so, for it would be impossible for the mother of several thousand offspring, in the case of fish or sand-fles, to have enough mother-love to extend to the almost countless progeny.
