Medford Dog Wins Trophy In Field Trial

"Flash," a Labrador retriever owned by and handled by Weldon Kline of Medford, won a first-place silver trophy at the annual field trial of the Medford and Klamath Falls retriever clubs held July 11 and 12 on Upper Klamath Lake.

Flash, entered in the Open All-age stakes, beat out his half-brother "Jake," who recently won the amateur national title at Park Rapids, Minn. Jake, properly known as Bracken's High Flyer and owned by George Duke of Fossil, had to settle for third place in the local trial.

Second place in the open stakes went to "Zeke," owned by Hal Shidler.

Forty-two dogs competed in the trial. First place in the derby stakes (for dogs under two years) went to Whirlybird, owned by Paul Skinner. Blackie, owned by Lee Carter took first in the qualifying stakes.

Silver trophies were awarded first through fourth place winners and ribbons accompanied judges' awards of merit. Everett McGraw, Medford, was field trial chairman for the event.

Judges of the derby stakes were Dr. Gene Meyerding and Jim Wever. Qualifying judges were Hal Shidler and Gene Hunt. Ken Denman and Bob Trotman were open stakes judges.

Hunters Advised To Read Rules

Portland — Some Oregon hunters are going to be left out on a limb if they don't take time to read the rules before filing applications for the unit and controlled season deer and elk hunts.

John McKean, chief of the game division of the game commission, reports that many hunters are filing their applications on the wrong application form.

To clarify any misunderstanding, McKean said that two application forms are in use this year, one for filing applications for the free permits and the other for special tags where an additional charge is made.

A new ruling passed by the legislature provides that hunters possess the general season

big game tags — deer or elk — before filing application for any free elk or deer permit. These free permits include all of the unit and special elk seasons and the unit deer seasons.

For the convenience of the hunter, applications for the free permits are issued with the general season big game tags. The application forms and the general season big game tags are contained in the same book. To be valid, both the application and the tag must bear the same number.
