Steel Strike Fears Send Market Lower

New York - (UPI) - Fears that a long steel strike may have an adverse effect on corporate earnings this year sent stocks lower today.

Steels, aircraft and railroads led the downside with individual losses running past 3 points. Some of the stocks outside the groups used to compile the averages countered with gains of a point or more.

DuPont and Union Carbide were easier but Olin Mathieson rose a point and Thiokol was up around 2 at its high.

The rails, which already are feeling the effects of the steel strike, were under constant pressure. Losses running to around a point or more appeared in Baltimore and Ohio, Chesapeake and Ohio, New York Central, Norfolk and Western, and Western Maryland.

Wheeling Steel lost more than 2 at its low and U.S. Steel around 2 at its worst.

Russia Strong, Khrushchev Says

Katowice, Poland - (UPI) - Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said today the Soviet Union is stronger than the West but will never start a war - "never, never, never."

He also said in a speech that Josef Stalin was right in signing his 1939 non-aggression pact with Adolf Hitler of Nazi Germany.

Khrushchev said Stalin was correct "in this specific case" because Britain and France were trying to turn the impending war against the Soviet Union and Stalin had to buy time to prepare.

In a one-hour pep talk on the class struggle to some 300 coal miners from 31 countries, Khrushchev boasted the Soviet Union was stronger than the West but - "I pledge solemnly we will never launch any war against anybody else, never, never, never."
