

# American Movement Aids The Church of England

London—(UPIA movement imported from America is helping to revitalize the Church of England.

This ancient institution, which is the parent body of U.S. Episcopalians and Methodists, has long suffered from a conspicuous lack of popular support.

Of the 40 million people who live in England, 27 million, or two thirds, are non-members of the established church. But only one-

tenths of them attend regular worship services on Easter Sunday, the day of the biggest turnout.

Public apathy is particularly evident in church finances. In a land where living costs are comparable to America, clergymen receive an average pay less than \$2,000 a year. And two-thirds of this stipend comes from endowments accumulated by the church over past, more pious centuries. Even if you count only the Easter communicants as church members, the average

free-will contribution from the man in the pew figures out to less than 35 cents per member per week.

**U.S. Average \$1.20 Weekly**

These figures may sound shocking in America, where more than 30 per cent of the church members attend worship service each Sunday, and where the average financial contribution counting even the nominal members is about \$1.20 a week.

But to English churchmen, they are not surprising. This country has experienced a religious revival since World War II, but its impact has been felt primarily among intellectuals, particularly at the great Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and in the upper economic groups. The majority of working people, far more class conscious here than in America, tend to identify the church with landlords and managers, and they are not easily persuaded that its religion is relevant to their embattled lives.

The church is trying in many different ways to break through this inherited barrier of disaffection. It is learning to speak out boldly on issues of popular concern, from birth control to nuclear tests. It is sending specially-trained industrial chaplains into the factory areas of South London, Sheffield, Bristol and Birmingham, to make friends with workers at their jobs and in their homes. It is appealing to young people through a growing network of youth clubs that sponsor every kind of activity from rock-and-roll music sessions to week-end religious retreats. It is trying to make worship more meaningful by soft-pedaling the uncutious sermon and restoring the sacrament of Holy Communion to the central place at the Sunday morning service.

Stewardship is based on the recognition that a Christian cannot "give" in the ordinary sense of the world, because everything he "owns" already belongs to God. His time, his talents, and the money he earns with them are held in trust from God, and the Christian's duty is to serve as a conscientious steward of these gifts, using them as he thinks God would have them used.

Although English churches took up this concept initially out of a desire to put their finances on a sounder basis, they quickly discovered what American churches had also learned from experience: Stewardship is not a money-raising gimmick, and if it is used as one it will fail. But if it is taught honestly, with single-minded emphasis on the accountability of a faithful steward for all that God has entrusted to him, the financial needs of the church will look after themselves.
