Sacs Hang Onto Slim Lead Over Mounties

The Sacramento Solons apparently aren't going to let the lack of a power hitter keep them out of first place in the Pacific Coast league. The Solons, who have recently shown signs of fading out of the pennant picture, displayed some unmistakable earmarks of a flag winner Thursday night. They cooled off the red-hot Salt Lake City Bees, 4-2, as Joe Stanka nailed down his 11th win of the season. He got relief help from Terry Fox, the Sacs' ace bull-penner who has a 7-0 season record. The win kept the Solons a game and a half ahead of the second place Vancouver Mounties, who nipped Seattle 1-0. Other games saw Phoenix take San Diego, 6-1, and Portland defeat Spokane, 3-1.

Still Searching
Sacramento's front office is still searching for a big hitter to bolster the Sacs down the stretch. Meanwhile, they will have to be content with getting by with their good pitching in a league that is void of soft touches. The Sacs took advantage of several breaks Thursday night in winning. A pair of wild pitches and an error by losing pitcher Joe Francis gave them their first two runs. Stanka aided his own cause with a pair of runscoring singles. Fred Besana kept Vancouver close on the heels of Sacramento as he hurled a two-hitter against Seattle. Claude Osteen, the loser, allowed eight hits and struck out 14. The lone tally came in the ninth after Barry Shetrone was hit by a pitch with one out. Marv Breeding walked and Joe Frazier grounded to second, forcing Breeding for the start of a double play attempt. The relay to first was not in time however, and the hustling Shetrone roared all the way home with the clincher.

Tiger, Calhoun To Mix On TV
Syracuse, N. Y. — (UPI) — Tonight's featured boxing show, like so much summer television fare, is a repeat: a return 10-round match between Dick Tiger of Nigeria and Rory Calhoun of White Plains, N. Y.

But if the two promising middleweights put on a show as good as their first encounter six weeks ago in New York, few viewers will complain. The two boxed 10 exciting rounds in Madison Square Garden June 5. The fight, the first in this country for Tiger, ended in a draw when Calhoun made a strong comeback in the later rounds. Tiger, British Empire middleweight titleholder, had the edge over the 24-year-old Calhoun according to a poll of sportswriters covering the fight even on rounds and points while another gave the edge to Calhoun and the third said Tiger won.

Mindful of their tight battle the first time around, the odds-makers rated tonight's War Memorial Auditorium bout a toss-up.

Rhodes Pinch-hits A Giant Victory; Sox In AL Lead

Hey waiter, Dusty Rhodes says he'll take another short order of that World Series melon he tasted back in 1954.

That series' slice merely whetted Dusty's appetite, so here he is again five years later putting in his bid with the Giants for a second helping.

Remember those amazing pinch hits he collected to lead the Giants to the National league pennant in 1954? Well, Rhodes is doing business at the same old stand in an effort to bring the Giants their first pennant since then this year.

Dusty, who was recalled from the minors only a short time back, kept the Giants on top Thursday night when he came through with one of his patented pinch hits in the ninth inning to beat the Phillies, 1-0, in the second game of a two-night doubleheader.

Giants Needed Win
The Giants needed that victory to remain one game ahead of the idle second-place Dodgers because the Phillies had taken the opener, 6-4, behind Robin Roberts.

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli pitched superbly in gaining his 14th victory, giving up only three hits while striking out five.

In the opener, the Phils knocked out former teammate Jack Sanford with a two-run rally in the seventh that broke a 4-4 tie.

The Cubs defeated the Braves for the third straight time, 4-2, and the Reds downed the Cardinals, 7-5. Los Angeles and Pittsburgh were not scheduled.

Chicago Grabs Lead
The White Sox took over the American League lead by one game by splitting a doubleheader with the Red Sox while the Yankees were taking a twin-bill from the Indians. Chicago beat Boston in the opener, 4-3, and Boston won the second game, 5-4.

The Yankees won their opener from the Indians, 7-5, in 10 innings and the nightcap, 4-0. Washington licked Detroit, 5-2, and Kansas City nipped Baltimore, 4-3.

Dave Hillman of the Cubs, who had lost five straight games to the Braves during his career, beat them for the first time with a nine-hit effort. The Cubs collected all their runs on five hits, including Ernie Banks' 27th homer, off Lew Burdette.

Jerry Lynch drove in four runs with a homer and three singles to pace the Reds to their victory over the Cardinals.

Keough Scores
Vic Wertz' third hit of the game, a single, scored Marty Keough from second base with the run that broke a 4-4 tie in the seventh inning and gave the Red Sox their nightcap victory over the White Sox. Sherm Lollar doubled home. Jim Landis with the winning run in the seventh inning of the opener.

Mickey Mantle's 19th homer with one on in the 10th inning gave the Yankees their opening game victory over the Indians after Yogi Berra tied the score with his 11th homer in the ninth. Little Bobby Shantz, promoted to a starting role from the bullpen because Casey Stengel had nobody else, stopped the Tribe on five hits in the nightcap to give the Yanks their first doubleheader sweep since May 30.

The Senators handed the slumping Tigers their fourth straight defeat and 11th loss in their last 13 games. Bill Fischer registered his eighth victory with relief help from Dick Hyde.

Tom Sturdivant hurled four innings of hitless ball in relief of Bud Daley as the Athletics topped the Orioles. Daley, credited with his ninth
