

Federal Mediator Renews Effort To End Steel Strike

Pittsburgh—UPI—Federal Mediation Chief Joseph F. Finnegan tried again today to end the deadlocked five-day steel walkout in separate meetings with the United Steelworkers and representatives of the 12 major steel companies.

The head of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service conducted fruitless talks with the two groups last Thursday, the day after 500,000 steel workers walked off the job.

While Finnegan met in the conference room with the two sides, the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. went into two western Pennsylvania courtrooms to seek an injunction against what it terms "illegal picketing" by steel workers at three of its plants.

Seeks to Restrain Pickets
J. & L. seeks to restrain pickets at two plants in Pittsburgh and one of Aliquippa, Pa., from denying free passage to some 1,000 supervisory personnel engaged in maintenance work at the three plants.

The union locals have adopted a "once you go out, you stay out" policy, keeping the supervisors virtual prisoners in the plant since the beginning of the strike last Wednesday.

A political note has also crept into the strike news. Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.) said Sunday in the nation's capital that a continuing strike would hurt GOP chances in the 1960 election.

Javits and Rep. Chester Bowles (D-Conn.) called on the President to take a more active part in trying to terminate the walkout.

Urges Fact-Finding Board
Javits said "the sooner the President appoints a fact-finding board" in the strike "the sooner we will get some conclusion." Bowles, asserting that the industry should hike wages and cut prices, said that steel prices had risen faster than wages and that labor costs had actually decreased, due to increased per-man output.

Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) also said Sunday that his Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee would reopen hearings soon on alleged price-fixing by the steel industry. In the past, Kefauver charged, steel companies have boosted steel prices more than twice the amount needed to pay increased wages.

Outlook Bleak
The outlook for an early settlement remained bleak, however. The industry negotiating team, headed by R. Conrad Cooper of U. S. Steel, remains adamant in its position that the union agree to a one-year wage freeze as a guarantee against an inflationary wage spiral. Management also wants to curb the union's voice in local working conditions.

The union, meanwhile, insists that the steel industry's increased profits would enable it to grant a real wage increase plus more fringe benefits without contributing to inflation with a steel price hike.

Persons Injured In Week End Traffic Accidents

Thomas Erwin Bray, 44, of route 1, box 28, Eagle Point, was reported in fair condition at Sacred Heart hospital following a one-car accident near Agate rd. Saturday night, hospital attendants reported.

Bray suffered a compound fracture of his right arm when the car he was driving turned over on the Nick Young rd., one mile east of Agate rd., Saturday night, state police said. His wife, Iona Bray, 44, a passenger in the car, was reported uninjured. Bray was taken to Sacred Heart hospital by Medford Ambulance Service.

Bray told state police that he was driving east on Nick Young rd. when an unknown car forced him off the road and into loose gravel. He lost control of the vehicle, he said, and the car rolled over.

W. E. Dawson, 68, of Prospect, was reported in fair condition this morning at Rogue Valley hospital following a one-car accident Sunday night.

State police said Dawson received head injuries when his car drove off the road, just south of Trail and hit a telephone pole.

Richard Henry Smith, 49, of Yreka, Calif., was released from Ashland General hospital Sunday following treatment for head cuts received Saturday night.

State police said Smith was travelling north on Highway 99 in the Siskiyou when he apparently struck a deer.

Another traffic accident occurred Saturday night when Jerry Wayne Krous, 20, of route 3, box 75, Medford, drove off the Griffin Creek rd., approximately 1 1/2 miles beyond the Griffin Creek school. No injuries were reported. Major damage to the car was a broken windshield, state police said.

Krous said he lost control of the car when cigarette ashes dribbled down the front of his shirt. The car drove into a shallow ditch, rolled out of the ditch, crossed the highway and knocked out some mail and paper boxes.

Mountain Town Runs Out of Food

Taipei—UPI—More than 16,000 persons in a mountain encircled town 15 miles northwest of Taipei have been cut off from the outside world by typhoon Billie since Wednesday and have now run out of food.

The plight of Chinting was not known until its magistrate got through to Taipei Friday night after traveling over 60 miles of nearly impassable mountain roads.

He said the only highway leading to the town was washed out by the typhoon's driving rains and the entire population, which includes 4,000 coal miners, ran out of food before he left Thursday morning.

He said many houses were badly damaged. Police said Saturday villagers near the marooned town have been organized into rescue teams and were trying to bring food to the townspeople over primitive trails.

Youths Out for 'Big Time' Held For Two Slayings

Quaker, Mo.—UPI—A youth out for "a big time" with another boy has admitted he shot and killed a middle-aged grocer and beat to death a girl.

Sheriff Thomas B. Allen said the boys, Johnny Ross Crump, 19, and his companion, John E. Davis, 14, both of Huzzah, Mo., were being held without charge in the county jail at Potosi, Mo.

Allen said the boys told him they "wanted to have a big time" Saturday night so they went to a tavern near their homes and drank six bottles of beer.

They then drove to the tiny community of Quaker where they entered the grocery store of George Leonard Barr, 57, and ordered a sandwich.

Allen said Crump told him he shot Barr in the back of the head with a 12-gauge shotgun as he was preparing the food.

They went to Barr's home near the store, police said, and demanded the keys to the grocer's car from his wife, Vallie, 52.

Crump told Allen he shot Mrs. Barr twice when she made a dash for the car. Although shot twice, she managed to stagger outside.

The youth then attacked Barr's daughter, Ella Joe, 16, and a houseguest, Bonnie Lou Ship, 17, Belgrade, Mo., with the shotgun. Allen said Crump beat them on the head so severely the gun was damaged.

Miss Ship was killed by the assault. Ella Joe, severely beaten, and her mother were in critical condition at a Bonne Terre, Mo., hospital.

Crump and Davis then fled on foot but were caught within minutes.

Youngster Clawed By Circus Leopard

Richland, Wash.—UPI—Kenneth Baird, 7, Richland, was in good condition Saturday after being clawed by a leopard at a circus here.

Railroads Granted 5 Per Cent Hike In Coach Fares

Washington—UPI—The Interstate Commerce Commission today authorized 10 railroads to increase their interstate coach fares by 5 per cent on selected routes in the West.

The ICC said the increases now may be made on one day's notice. The authorization applies to both one-way and round-trip fares.

The commission said increased fares will apply only to points served by the 10 western railroads where competition is not keen.

Substantial Losses Claimed
Generally speaking, no increases will be made on through travel between Kansas City and Chicago, Los Angeles and Kansas City and Fort Worth and Houston.

The railroads said that they had suffered substantial losses in the past few years on western runs. The commission said the boosts will yield an increase in revenue to which these railroads are "justly entitled."

The railroads affected are the Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Rock Island, St. Louis Southwestern, Illinois Central, Missouri-Kansas-Texas, Northwestern Pacific, Western Pacific, the San Diego & Arizona Eastern, and the Texas-New Orleans.
