Wilbur Leroy Walden, 73, who with his wife, Ruth, operated the Walden Florist shop at 848 West McAndrews rd., and who came to Medford in 1896, died in the Ashland hospital Saturday.

Funeral services will be conducted at 3 p.m. Tuesday in Chapel Mortuary with the Rev. William C. Piper, pastor of the First Christian church officiating. The Medford lodge Knights of Pythias, will also participate in the services. Committal services in Siskiyou Memorial park will be private.

Honorary pall bearers will be Roland Beach, Carl Fichtner, and Baker Yarborough. Mr. Walden, the son of Oliver L. and Lavenna Rice Walden, was born in Jewel county, Kansas, on Nov. 12, 1885. He came to Oregon 63 years ago. He was a carpenter by trade, but from 1919 to 1942 he operated a grocery and a cider business which supplied cider throughout the western states. In 1942 he went back to carpentry which he continued until he retired three years ago.

Duplicate of American Home To Be Shown in Russia Exhibit

New York (UPI) - With all the pomp of a coronation, Edwin Vennard, managing editor of Edison Electric Institute, awarded a "Live Better Electric" medalion to a little house at Roosevelt Field on Long Island, New York.

Celebrities were present. John J. Tuohy, president of Long Island Lighting Co., and Herbert L. Sackin, president of All-State Properties, Inc., the builder were among them.

The American Bankers' association appraised the house and land at \$14,490 and said that more than half the families in America could afford one just like it - or better. Why such a fuss? Why all this fuss over a six-room house? This is a duplicate of the American home exhibition in Moscow. It, too, will receive a medalion.

This is the kind of home Russian Ambassador Mikhail Menshikov said costs \$25,000 to \$30,000 and is beyond the reach of most Americans. He was wrong.

It got the electrical award because of excellence in lighting, wiring, and appliances. Its equipment includes just about everything electrical one can think of - range, refrigerator, water heater, garbage disposal, freezer, dish washer, dryer, oven in the wall, electric vent fan, and special lighting features. The builder says actual homes of this kind can be purchased at Commack, L. I., for \$14,490, including land. In other parts of the nation, he says, the house would sell for \$11,000 to \$13,000, exclusive of lot.

He also pointed out that government statistics show workman today can easily purchase such a home and pay for it out of his \$6,092 to \$6,803 average annual salary with \$96 monthly payments. The builder calls the Long Island house and the one in Russia "Splitniks." They aren't split levels but ranch type, all on one floor. The "Splitnik" designation comes from the fact that the home is

Can't Afford It!
And a Russian couldn't afford such a house. American steel executives who visited Russia last year reported that the general superintendent of a big steel company receives the equivalent of \$500 a month. He could handle the payments. But the general run of workers average just about half that sum, including bonuses. Their \$58 a week just

Market Weakness Blamed on Strike

New York - (UPI) - Stocks favored the downside for the third straight session today.

Brokers attributed the market's over-all weakness to uncertainties over the length and effects of the steel strike. Ralls suffered the sharpest decline in the averages on a percentage basis. Losses of a point or more appeared in some of the leaders.

Steels showed losses running to a point in most of the leaders. A few specialty steels, which are continuing to operate during the strike, scored sharp gains. Simonds Saw & Steel ran up more than 4 at its high, and Keystone Steel was up more than 2 at its best.

Autos were lower. The oils lost fractions to more than a point in a few pivots. Dupont and Union Carbide led the chemicals lower as a group. Tires were under pressure.

Some of the electronics met good support which sent Texas Instruments up around 2 and Litton and IBM up more than a point each. The drugs were higher on balance.

Astronauts Pledge To Share Profits Of Space Flight

Washington (UPI) - The seven American astronauts have signed an "all-for-one, one-for-all" agreement to share equally in the financial returns of the first one to travel in space.

The seven men are military test pilots now in training at a National Aeronautics and Space Administration base in Virginia. Sometime in 1961, one of them may become the first American ever to take a flight in space.

Valuable Story
No one knows which of the seven men will be the first Project Mercury Spaceman. But it is certain that whoever takes the first ride aboard the bell-shaped satellite will have a valuable story to tell if he returns to earth.

The government will have first call on the pioneer space traveler's recollections. It also has already announced that "all information reported by Mercury astronauts in the course of their official duties which is not classified to protect the national security will be promptly made available to the public by NASA."

But beyond the "official" information, the first successful astronaut will have a personal story of considerable value. To avoid any later problems, the seven astronauts agreed early in their training to divide equally the proceeds from the sale of the first spaceman's personal story.

This "all for one, one for all" compact applies even if one or more of the candidates is compelled to drop out because of illness. If a candidate voluntarily drops out of the training program, however, he no longer will share the profits.
