Stock Market Gives Vote of Confidence

New York (UPI)-The stock market today gave the nation's economy a booming vote of confidence by rising to new all-time average highs. The raft of good earnings reports and investor confidence in the basic strength of the economy were the key factors behind the upswing, which brought the two-day gain in stock values to more than \$3,500,000,000.

All major groups participated in the advance, with some of the best gains appearing in steels, motors, electronics, drugs, and some of the nonferrous metals. Record second quarter and first half earnings for Ford helped to set the tone for the market. Ford ran up around 2 at its best.

Of the stocks in the industrial average, good gains appeared in General Foods, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Alcoa, Eastman Kodak, and U.S. Steel.

The charges were filed by Dr. Raul Gomez Quintero identified only as "a private citizen." Gomez asked the court to notify the cabinet of the nature of his charges which, under the recently modified social code signed into law by Urrutia himself, could lead to the death penalty.

Fire Danger in State

Hot, dry weather stepped up the fire danger through most of Oregon today, with continued torrid temperatures forecast by the Portland Weather Bureau.
