No Change Due in Overgrazing Policy

Portland—UPI—The local administrator for the Bureau of Land Management denies that the transfer of Virgil T. Heath to another job might mean abandonment of a program to eliminate overgrazing on public lands in eastern Oregon.

Heath, state supervisor here for BLM since 1955, has been named coordinating officer in Salt Lake City for Utah, Idaho, Arizona and Nevada effective Aug. 10.

James F. Doyle, BLM area administrator, said the transfer will lead to "no change in the policy of the bureau and the department to conserve and improve the range values."

J. C. (Jack) Binford, speaking for the Isaac Walton League, charged Heath's transfer was "an attempt to remove a conscientious public servant from a policy making position."

Wagoneers Dine on Sourdough Cakes Vale—UPI—Oregon's wagon train headed west today after a breakfast of sourdough pancakes and a restful night under "guard" by local Boy Scouts.

The modern day pioneers were up at 5 a.m. Today they were to roll on to Jamison, about 18 miles from here on the John Day highway.

Memories of pioneer days were recalled here Wednesday as some 200 cattle "stampeded" on the street, as this eastern Oregon city paid honor to the men and women who have traveled from Independence, Mo., since April 19.

The Rev. Vincent Egan, a cowboy priest, joined the wagon train members in paying tribute to John D. Henderson, who died on the Oregon Trail in 1852 a mile southeast of here.

Neuberger Suggests Douglas McKay Dam Washington—UPI—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger suggested today that Green Peter dam on the south fork of the Santiam river in Oregon be named Douglas McKay dam in tribute to the former Oregon governor and interior secretary who died Wednesday.

"Douglas McKay was one of the 42 original members of the Willamette Basin Project Committee, which has been instrumental in securing federal authorization and construction of such projects as Cougar, Hills Creek, Detroit and Green Peter dams," Neuberger said.

He said Green Peter was "not a particularly historic or traditional name and could easily be spared."
