McKay Rites To Be In House Chamber Saturday Morning

Salem - (UPI) - Arrangements for the funeral of ex-Gov. Douglas McKay, 66, who in his long political career rose to secretary of the interior in President Eisenhower's cabinet, were complete today.

The service takes place in the House of Representatives chamber in the Capitol building at 10 a.m. Saturday, McKay died Wednesday.

The Rev. Dr. Paul Newton Poling of the Salem First Presbyterian church, which McKay attended, will preside. Pallbearers listed Public address facilities will be provided for those unable to enter the House Chambers which are expected to be jammed.

Pallbearers for McKay will be Roy S. Keene, Corvallis; Charles Reynolds, La Grande; Everett May, Carmel, Calif.; and Wilmer O. Page, C. F. Chambers and Dr. W. W. Baum, all of Salem.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Donald Marrick of the Clough-Barrick Funeral home here. Interment will be in Bellecrest Memorial park.

The family desires that contributions be made to the Salvation Army rather than sending flowers to the funeral. National Guardsmen will police the funeral. State police will be stationed in the capitol well behind the building to allow only the cars of the governor and members of the McKay family.

Six National Guardsmen will meet the casket when it arrives at the capitol. McKay's body has been lying in state at the funeral home. They will assist in bearing

the casket to the main floor beneath the rostrum of the House of Representatives. Two guardsmen will stand honor guard at the casket. Some 40 seats have been reserved for the family and 15 for the press.

Masons and American Legion representatives will participate in the ceremonies. Gov. Mark Hatfield was designated by President Eisenhower to represent him at the funeral.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Donald Marrick of the Clough-Barrick Funeral home here. Interment will be in Bellecrest Memorial park.

Ex-Convict Kills Two from Ambush

Basset, Va. - (UPI) - An ex-convict released from prison five days ago shot and killed two members of a family from an ambush today and wounded a third.

The gunman was identified as Earl Smith, 30, Ferrum, Va. He waited calmly for his victims on a creek bank near their home, holding a 30-30 deer rifle.

When they appeared, he shot and killed Marvin Whorely and his 8-month-old daughter, Margie Lee E. Whorely's mother, Mrs. Margie Whorely, was wounded.

Smith disappeared into a thick woods carrying the rifle. A posse of state, local and county police began searching for him.

There was no positive motive established immediately for the rampage, but police theorized it was tied in with Smith's convictions for bootlegging liquor.

Market Indecisive; Industrials at Peak

New York - (UPI) - The stock market moved indecisively again today although the industrial average managed to reach a new all-time high.

Gains and losses were pretty evenly divided in the main list with a few issues responding to individual corporate developments.

Magnavox ran up more than 5 at its high on news of a planned stock split. Eaton Manufacturing, which hiked the dividend and voted a stock split, was up more than 5 1/2 at its high.

Auto stocks were mixed despite some excellent earnings reports. Chrysler lost more than a point at its low on realizing of profits. Barber Oil was off more than a point in a mixed oil group. Youngstown was the strong spot in an otherwise mixed steel section.

Coca-Cola was up more than a point at its best on stock split rumors. Electronics were lower on balance. So were the rails and utilities. Revlon was strong on a favorable investment house report.
