Miteff Bout Is Next For Alonzo

Louisville—(UPI)—Alonzo Johnson, a young man from Pennsylvania who cut his eye teeth on a ring rope, today was ready to take on Argentine heavyweight Alex Miteff after spoiling Willie Pastrano's comeback hopes by winning a unanimous decision.

Subbing for Miteff, the former barber from Braddock, Pa., stalked the Miami, Fla., boxer for most of the 10 rounds Friday night and rang up an impressive, if close, decision by shrugging off Pastrano's fast punching.

Neither fighter was ever down in the nationally televised bout.

Disappointment
The win by the better-conditioned Johnson, ranked seventh by the NBA, was his 13th straight and ran his record to 18-1. For Pastrano, now ranked eighth by Ring Magazine, it was another disappointment in his comeback attempts.

Johnson, a fixture in gyms at the tender age of 12 but who didn't get serious about swapping leather until his early teens, will meet Miteff in New York's Madison Square Garden, Aug. 14.

The 24-year-old Johnson said that Pastrano was faster than Nino Valdes whom he defeated in Madison Square Garden, May 29.

Maids Meet World's Champs At Camp White On Thursday

Defending women's champions at three levels, world, regional and state will be featured on the Centennial Softball Attraction, one of the summer's sports highlights, slated for next Thursday evening, July 30, at the Veterans Administration domiciliary Memorial stadium, Camp White.

Stratford, Conn., Raybestos Brackettes, 1958 winners of the Women's World Softball tournament, will have top billing in the evening doubleheader. They will meet the popular Rogue Valley Dairy Maids in one conflict and Portland's Erv Lind Florists in the other.

Rogue Valley is the reigning champion among Oregon teams outside of Portland. The Florists took the Pacific northwest mantle last year, qualifying for the world tournament but not making the trip to Stratford. Erv Lind's team rates as one of the best in the country.

Some of the finest ladies softball players in the United States are on the Brackettes and Florist squads. A pitching duel between Bertha Ragan and Louise Mazzuca is anticipated in the fracas between those two teams.

Ragan recorded 24 victories and no losses last year and pitched four victories for the Brackettes in the world tournament. During the 1958 season she had 19 shutouts, five of them no-hitters. Mazzuca, only

Lightweight Challenges Basilio

Muskegon, Mich.—(UPI)—Kenry Lane, one of the nation's top-ranked lightweight contenders, awaited reaction today to his challenge to fight Carmen Basilio, a middleweight, in an old-fashioned battle.

In a radio interview with WMUS sports editor Wes Tebeau Friday night Lane proposed to battle Basilio in a fight to the finish. He suggested a no time limit, no weight limit scrap, provided a \$100,000 guarantee was offered.

Lane suggested Tijuana, Mexico, as a likely site for the old-time fisticuffs session and said fight fans throughout the country would flock to see such a battle.

Basilio, who recently signed to fight for the NBA version of the middleweight crown on the west coast, did not comment immediately on the challenge.

Wins Canadian Pro Tourney

Hull, Quebec—(UPI)—Veteran Stan Leonard won a record seventh Canadian professional golfers association championship Saturday when he equaled the tournament record with a 51-sole score of 204, 12 under par.

The 44-year-old Vancouver pro carded a final round 71 Saturday over the par-72 Rivermead course in Hull, Que., to go with opening rounds of 67 and 66.

Second-place finisher Al Balding of Markham, Ont., was nine strokes behind at 213.

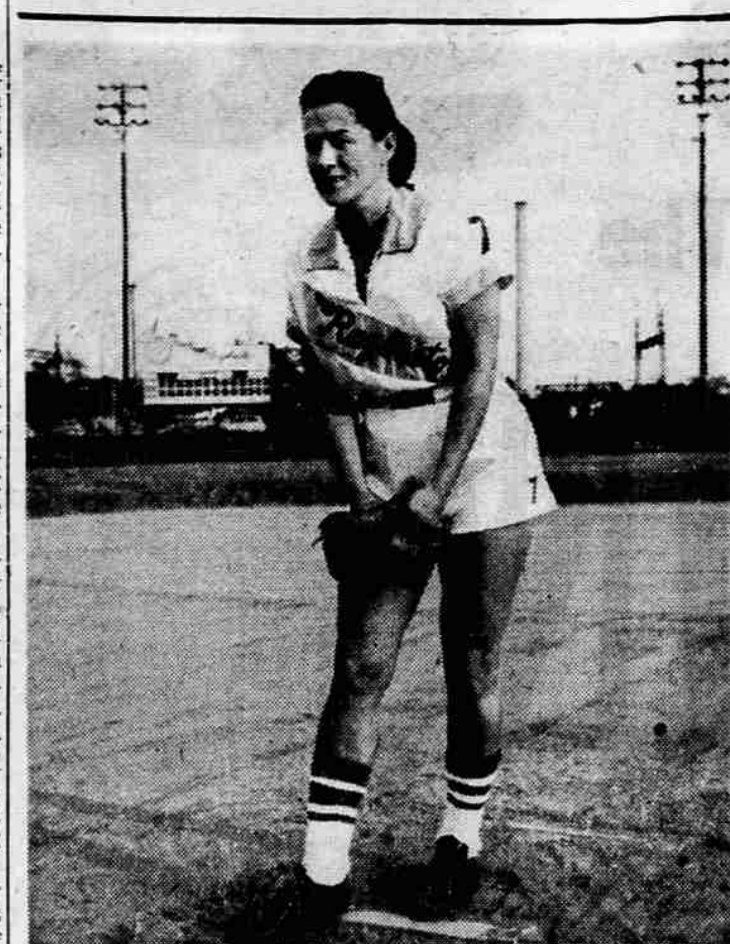

19 now, established herself among the best chuckers in the nation by setting a world tourney record of 26 strikeouts in 16 innings. She won 14 and lost two games last year and was named most valuable pitcher in the regional tournament.

Mickey Macchietto, Raybestos catcher, was named to the world all-star team and Mary Hartman, leftfielder, Brenda Reilly, all-around player, Marie Ottaviano, third base, Beverly Connors, utility infielder, and Joan Joyce, are among other outstanding Brackette players.

Among the Florists, Margaret Dobson, third base, Bev Wadsworth, catcher, and Hap Piper, outfielder, have been named All-Americans, Dobson five times. Liz Locke, outfielder, took the outstanding player award in the 1952 National Softball congress world tournament. Delores Price, another outfielder, has gained a national tournament leading hitter award.

The Brackettes in the 11-year period, 1957 through 1958 compiled a standout record of 378 victories against 76 losses. Raybestos has numerous league and regional titles and in 1956 was world tournament semi-finalists.

Portland's Florist's are no stranger to national laurels. They won the American Softball association world toga in 1944 and the National Softball Congress diadem in 1953. In their world tourney rivalry, they have always placed among the top five teams. Organized in 1937, the Lind club has won every city, state and regional meet in which it has competed.

South African Scores Upset

Haverford, Pa.—(UPI)—Jan Vermaak of South Africa upset top-seeded Alex Olmedo and defending champion Barry McKay beat Ramana than Krishnan of India to move into the finals of the 60th Pennsylvania lawn tennis championship at the Merion cricket club Saturday.

Vermaak won 6-2, 6-4, 6-2 to eliminate Olmedo from his third straight tournament since he won the Wimbledon title.

The Peruvian star lost to Krishnan in the semi-finals of a Sweden tourney on July 11 and dropped a quarter-final match to Abe Segal of South Africa with lackadaisical play in the U.S. clay court championship the week before.

In the women's singles, Rene Schuurman defeated top-seeded Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif., and her fellow player from South Africa, Sandra Reynolds, downed Karen Hantze.

Miss Schuurman defeated the U.S. clay court champion, 4-6, 6-4, 6-3 and Miss Reynolds won out over Miss Hantze, 8-6, 6-1, to set up the first all-foreign women's final in the history of the tournament.

Senate Hearing On Sports Starts Soon

Washington—(UPI)—Baltimore Oriole Manager Paul Richards is the surprise witness called for next week's sports hearing before the Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee.

The list, made public Friday by Chairman Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.), includes

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and Bert Bell, National Football league commissioner. Richards is the author of a magazine article which suggested reforms in some of the personnel practices of major league clubs.

Two proposed sports bills will be aired at the hearings. One is the Kefauver proposal that a major league club would be limited to the number of players it could control. It also requires written statements from college football players that they are willing to abide by the results of the annual NFL player draft.

Mark Set By Swimmer

Osaka, Japan—(UPI)—Frank McKinney set a world record for the 200-meter backstroke and Alan Somers swam the fastest 1,500-meter freestyle race of 1959 Saturday night to give the United States an 18-17 lead over Japan at the halfway mark in a dual swimming meet.

McKinney, 20, a lanky University of Indiana student, won the 200-meter backstroke event in two minutes, 17.8 seconds. He clipped one-tenth of a second off the mark of 2:17.9 he set July 12 during the United States swimming championships at Los Altos, Calif. The listed record of 2:18.4 was set by John Monckton of Australia in 1958.

The crowd gave McKinney an ovation when he finished at the 50-meter outdoor OJI pool. By Somers, 17, a recent graduate of Indianapolis, Ind., Tech High school, really stole the show while the Americans won five of Saturday night's seven events.

Somers, leading all the way, upset Murray Rose of Australia and Japan's Tsuyoshi Yamakana in the 1,500-meter freestyle race. Somers' time of 17 minutes, 44.4 seconds was the fastest produced in the event this year. John Konrads of Australia set the world mark of 17:28.7 last year.

The meet will end with seven more events Sunday night. The Japanese swimmers scored a 41-38 victory over the U.S. stars at Tokyo.

Mexico City—(UPI)—Doctors at the military hospital here said Friday that bantamweight champion Jose Becerra is in perfect health and that his vision is absolutely unimpaired. It was previously believed Becerra had suffered triple vision due to a blow during his title fight with Alphonse Halimi of France.
