

Single Gets White Sox Win Over Baltimore Orioles

Harry Simpson's pinch single in the 17th inning gave the Chicago White Sox a 3-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles Saturday and enabled Al Lopez' crew to cling to their half-game lead in the American league pennant race.

Baltimore starter Billy O'Dell carried a 2-1 lead into their ninth inning but a home run by Sherm Lollar sent the

game into extra innings. Jerry Walker held the White Sox scoreless from the 10th through the 14th but Billy Loe, who relieved him in the 15th, gave up the winning run on singles by Jim Landis and Lollar, an intentional pass, a force at the plate and Simpson's single.

Turk Lown relieved starter Bob Shaw in the 12th and blanked the Orioles the rest

of the way to gain his seventh victory.

Cal McLish of the Indians won his eighth straight game and 13th of the season by limiting the Senators to seven hits in an 8-1 victory. The only run McLish gave up was Jim Lemon's 22nd home run in the seventh inning.

Jim Piersall collected three of Cleveland's 13 hits, including a homer, to drive in three runs while Minnie Minoso also contributed three hits. Bill Fischer started for Washington, lasted only four innings and was charged with his fifth loss against eight victories.

Yogi Berra's 12th homer with one man on in the ninth inning led the Yankees to a 9-8 triumph over the Tigers. The lead changed hands six times before reliever Duke Maas finally was credited with his ninth victory.

The Yankees committed five errors, three by third baseman Hector Lopez, but got some unexpected long ball punch from Bobby Richardson and Fritz Brickell, each of whom hit his first major league homer. Detroit chased Yankee starter Whitey Ford with a four-run uprising in the second inning and Paul Foytack, who started for the Tigers, lasted only four innings.

Boston was at Kansas City in a night game.

Need for Hospital To Be Presented
Ashland—The need for a new hospital in Ashland will be presented to the hospital advisory committee of the state board of health Aug. 4, Arnold Bauder, chairman of the Ashland hospital committee, has announced.

The committee will also seek Hill-Burton funds to help build the new hospital.

The hospital advisory committee hears all requests for federal funds and it submits its recommendation to the state board of health, which allocates Hill-Burton funds available for hospital construction in Oregon.

The local committee has been meeting to discuss local needs and has conferred with architects on the cost of modernization of the present hospital as well as the cost of constructing a new one.

Forty-Niner Said Unfit
Moraga, Calif. — (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners received their first jolt of the season Saturday with the announcement that Hillard Hill, drafted from the University of Southern California, would be unable to play this year because of a hernia.

The six-foot, three-inch, 198-pound star flunked his physical examination Saturday but 28 other rookies and 16 veterans made it through with flying colors.

The Forty Niners had drafted Hill as a "redshirt" in the winter of 1958. He made honorable mention on the UPI's all-star football team last year. The Forty Niners will put him on the reserve list.

Coach Howard (Red) Hickey, who has taken over the reins from Frank Albert, said the club would start working out on a twice-a-day basis today. Hickey added he was heartened over the fact that he had seven rookie linemen on hand who scale over 250 pounds.

Jack Hays, another rookie from Trinity of Texas, was scheduled to check in today. He is having car trouble.

Jim Tatum Given Burial
Chapel Hill, N. C. — (UPI) — Jim Tatum was laid to rest Saturday practically within punting distance of where he was preparing to lead North Carolina's football team to one of its biggest years.

Many of Tatum's friends, still stunned by his untimely death at the age of 45 last Thursday, were in the funeral procession which filed down a flowery path to pay their last respects.

The North Carolina coach died of a virus ailment.

Among the leading sports figures present were Coach Bear Bryant of Alabama, Coach Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma and North Carolina's grand old man of athletics, Robert Fetzer.

The Rev. Charles Hubbard, classmate of Tatum when the two were students at North Carolina, offered a brief graveside prayer. Nearby were Tatum's oldest daughter, Rebecca, 14, and his son, James Jr., 13. The youngest child, Edna Reid, 7, did not attend the funeral.

Tatum's wife remains in the hospital with a virus infection and was unable to attend her husband's funeral.

Ole Fols Runs Out Easy Track Victory

Del Mar, Calif. — (UPI) — Niel S. McCarthy's Ole Fols, carrying top weight of 124 pounds, Saturday raced to an easy victory in the \$15,000 Ocean-side Handicap for three-year-olds at Del Mar.

Ole Fols, winner of the Debonair and Will Rogers Stakes at Hollywood Park, won by better than two lengths in the

good time of 1:09 1/5 although ridden out at the finish of the six furlongs race by Jockey Ismael Valenzuela.

Gainsworth, an English-bred colt like Ole Fols, was first out of the gate but by the time the field had gone a quarter the favored Ole Fols was in front and saving ground on the rail.

A crowd of 14,000 racing fans installed Ole Fols the odds-on favorite and the son of Tudor Minstrel justified his choice with his easy win. Ole Fols returned \$3.40, \$2.60 and \$2.40 across the board. Gainsworth paid \$3.20 and \$2.80 for place and show and Scorpions Thumb returned \$3.40 for show.

The Oceanside Handicap drew a field of nine three-year-olds and had a gross value of \$16,275. Ole Fols earned \$8650 for his victory as he continued his stake-winning season which saw him starring at Santa Anita last winter where he beat Tony Lee as well as at Hollywood Park.

Speed Bond Posted For Dragsters

Keen competition is expected at today's drag races at the Camp White drag strip, sponsored by the Southern Oregon Timing association, as a \$125 bond has been posted for the strip record of 144.46 miles per hour.

The Ashland dragster team of Lou Wolff and Wayne Wiley are reported to have installed new rings and added other improvement to their Ford flat-head powered machine.

Medford's Noel Black yesterday was completing the assembly of his new engine, "Blackbird 200," an Oldsmobile engine of more than 400 cubic inches displacement. With this engine, of more than 400 horsepower and capable of running at 7,000 r.p.m., Black's dragster is expected to be a definite threat to the track record.

New Cars Expected
The Wheelers this week have been working on their Buick V-8 engine and yesterday it was installed in their competition coupe, "Zombie."

Several new cars, said especially for the drag strip, are expected to be seen in action this morning.

SOTA officials announced that there is a special class for matic transmissions, and a total of six sports car classes. In all, there will be competition in one 25 classes in today's races.

Entrants were again cautioned about being required to have safety shields around their bell housings. And the only vehicles not required to have this safety feature are stock cars and sport vehicles with engine displacement less than 2,700 cubic centimeters.

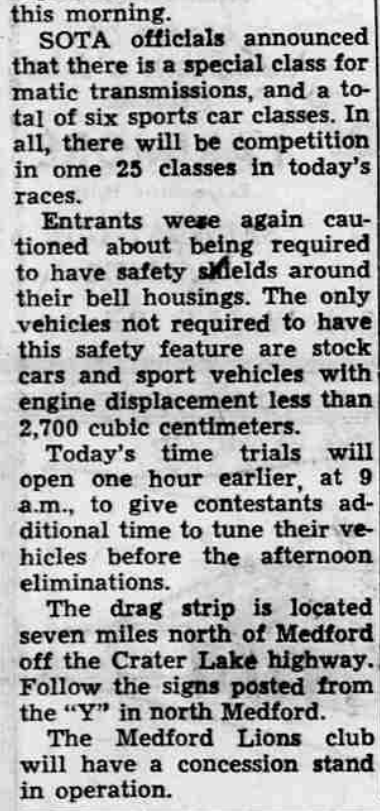
Today's time trials will open one hour earlier, at 9 a.m., to give contestants additional time to tune their vehicles before the afternoon eliminations.

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Braves Right Themselves And Blank Pirates By 3-0

The Milwaukee Braves, showing signs of righting themselves after a near-disastrous slump, blanked the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-0, Saturday on a four-hitter that brought Lew Burdette his 13th victory.

It was the Braves' second straight shutout over the Pirates. Hank Aaron, playing the infield for the first time in four years because manager-Fred Haney wanted to get more punch in his line-up, started Milwaukee on its way to victory with a fourth-inning single.

Joe Adcock also singled, sending Aaron to third from where he scored when Wes Covington bounced into a double play. Johnny Logan hit his 11th homer in the fifth off loser Vern Law and Del Crandall's sacrifice fly produced the final run in the seventh.

The Philadelphia Phillies ran their winning streak to five games with a 6-3 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds. Don Cardwell was the winner although forced from the game in the eighth after being hit on the hand by a Tom Acker pitch.

Loser Joe Nuxhall struck out 11 batters during the six innings he pitched. Gene Freese drove in two runs in the first inning and the Phils bunched three hits for two more runs in the third. Before leaving the game, Cardwell gave up only four hits and one run. That run was a homer by pinch-hitter Johnny

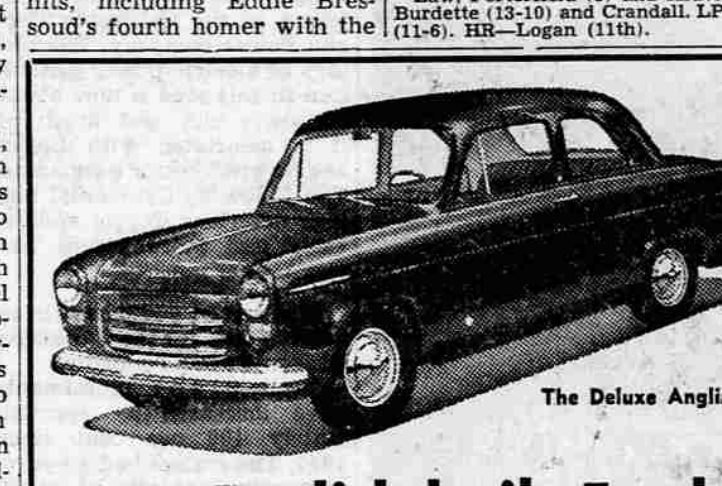
bases empty in the third inning. Powers in the sixth. Ray Semproch gave up the Reds' last two runs.
