

Hoop Artist Can't Work Hula Hoop

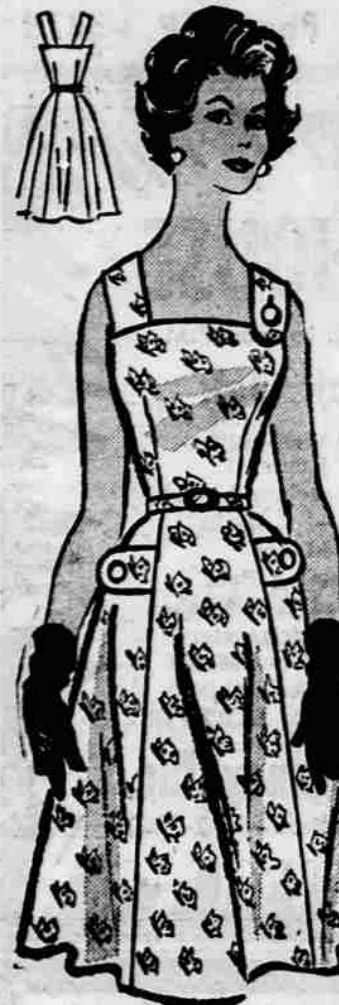

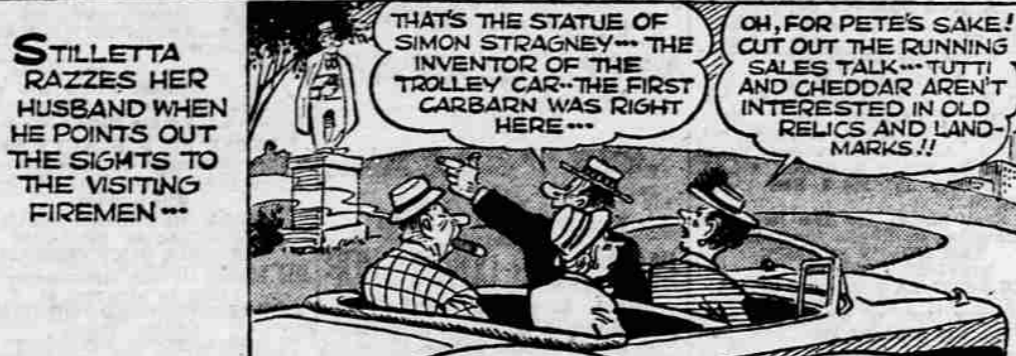
