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Rights Supporters Try to Get Bill Considered Today

Washington (UPI)—Civil rights supporters, wary of more southern delaying tactics, tried again today to get the Senate Judiciary Committee to consider their mild civil rights bill.
The backers were confident they had enough strength to assure approval if the issue could be brought to a vote. But they feared that Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), a staunch civil rights foe, would force more delays by his parliamentary maneuvering.
The committee put off action on the bill when supporters first brought it up last week. However, the stage was set for a possible showdown today when all other business was sidetracked.
Other congressional news:
Interest: Chairman William McC. Martin of the Federal Reserve Board explained to the Senate-House Economic Committee President Eisenhower's objections to a compromise plan to raise the interest rate on government bonds. Democratic congressional leaders rejected Eisenhower's appeal for elimination of the ceiling. The President in turn opposed part of the compromise which would have asked the Federal Reserve Board to buy government bonds.
Small Business: Senate small business chairman John Sparkman (D-Ala.) of the committee that the Defense Department "cut out" was giving "small firms a better chance to bid" defense contracts. He told the Senate that small companies obtained only a fraction of military orders because the

McElroy Says Reds May Have Beaten U.S. In Missiles

Washington (UPI)—Defense Secretary Neil H. McElroy says Russia already may have beaten the United States in the race to get the first intercontinental ballistic missiles into the hands of combat units.
McElroy said Sunday night, however, that the number of operational Soviet ICBMs is "at the most, only a very few less than 10." He said this was not too important because of over-all U. S. retaliatory power.
He said strategists believe the U. S. combination of manned bombers, missiles (including submarine-launched types), aircraft carriers and fighter bombers "could more than match whatever the Russians will have in ICBM capability."
McElroy's remarks were made in a filmed television interview with Sen. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.). The secretary was in the West surveying continental air defenses and missile progress.
The Defense Department recently announced that operational "bugs" will delay delivery of ICBMs to U. S. combat units until at least September. Originally, it had been hoped the Atlas would be ready this month.
The Atlas was fired successfully last week after a series of failures but at least two or three more tests are scheduled.
Asked whether the over-all missile situation is improving, McElroy said "We think we are at least maintaining our relative position to discourage any attack by the Russians."
Rep. Chet Holifield (D-Calif.) said on a separate radio program that the United States is not adequately prepared to strike back and cause "any appreciable damage" to an aggressor nation.
He also said the Strategic Air Command does not have "in the air at all times the percentage" of big hydrogen bombers "that has been announced." He blamed this on the "present budget balancing policy."

Plywood Plant in Eugene Burns

Eugene (UPI)—Fire destroyed the Campbell-McLean plywood mill Sunday night and damaged the nearby Lane Plywood mill warehouse.
The fire set off a gigantic traffic jam that kept police and water and electric board crews from entering the area to work. Thousands of cars jammed the roads around the mill at the northwest edge of Eugene, most of them curious onlookers, according to police.
Many persons attending a baseball game near the fire left the stands to watch the flames, but no evacuation of the ball park was ordered.
The fire also destroyed part of the Lane Plywood company warehouse across the railroad tracks.

Neuberger 'Pleased' To Co-Sponsor Bill

Washington (UPI)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said today he was "highly pleased" to co-sponsor a Senate resolution which favors equipping of American Naval mothball ships as a "White Fleet" carrying surplus foods and medical personnel and supplies to disaster-stricken and underprivileged areas of the world.
Neuberger said he has long been interested in such an idea.
There could be no finer message of hope in a world troubled with tensions of war, sickness and death than to have a fleet of vessels delivering medicines and foods where a similar fleet might have delivered bombs and bullets," Neuberger said.
The Senate concurrent resolution urging the President to establish a "White Fleet" from the Navy's mothball reserve was introduced by Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.).

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New Inflation Move Pushes Stocks Up

New York (UPI)—Stocks rose to a new record high today on a new inflation push generated by congressional moves to force the Federal Reserve system to buy long-term government bonds as an expedient to keep interest rates down.
Traders bought the steels, electronics, some of the drugs and chemicals. The oils received help from the first half report of Standard of Jersey which showed sales at a record high and net income up 27 per cent from the first half of 1958.
Rails and utilities registered only small gains in their averages.
Schenley opened at a gain of 2 1/4 points which it extended by a point later. Emerson Radio to the weak feature, fell 2 1/4 points before meeting modest support.
A. M. Byers ran up 7 points in the steels and held about half of it while other steels gained 1 to more than 3 points. Motors firmed with the exception of Chrysler.
Chemicals were strong with Union Carbide and DuPont up 2 points or more. Owens Illinois Glass ran up nearly 4 points to a new high to help lift the industrial average.
