

Beavers Muff Chance To Tie In Lead in PCL; Sacramento, Vancouver Tied in Top Spot

The Portland Beavers missed a chance to go into a first place tie in the Pacific Coast League Sunday by dropping a pair of games to San Diego, 6-3 and 6-5.

Portland is now two games of the pace with Vancouver and Sacramento in a deadlock for the top spot.

George Freese, slugging Portland third sacker, regained his home-run hitting eye and smacked three out of the park Sunday, one in the first game and two in the second. That gives him 16 for the season.

Jim Greengrass also homered for Portland in the first game, his 17th of the season. **Jansen Effective**

The Portland losing pitchers were Tom Gorman in the opener and Glen McMinn in the second game. Larry Jan-

sen relieved Gorman in the first game and pitched scoreless ball for six innings.

Steve Jankowski, who homered in the first game, drove in the winning run in the second.

Despite injuries all season, Vancouver was back in a first-place tie with Sacramento after downing Salt Lake City 3-2 and 5-4 Sunday. Sacramento split with Seattle, losing 9-1 and winning 2-0.

The Spokane-Phoenix game was rained out.

Pagliariotti Joins Injured
The Mounties played Sunday without regular catcher Joe Pagliariotti, the newest member of Vancouver's ailing corps. The Mounties lost Joe Durham for the season last week when he was injured in an outfield collision. Earlier, Charlie White, a .291 hitting catcher last year, was also

lost for the season. And outfielders Len Tucker and Joe Frazier have had long term injuries.

Barry Shetron hammered a pair of homers while Wes Stock pitched a three hitter to give the Mounties their 3-2 win over Salt Lake in the opening game. Shetron's blows came in the first and third innings off loser Dick Hanlon.

Palica Notches 10th
Erv Palica picked up his 10th victory of the season in the second game after being staked to a five run lead in the first inning. The Bees scored three times in the seventh and Jim Baumer led off the ninth with a homer but the Bees could not close the gap.

Bob Mabe pitched a three hitter for Seattle in the opener against the Solons. Lou Skias belted a two run homer in the first and the Rainiers coasted in from there while collecting 12 hits in all of three Solon hurlers. Joe Stanka, Sacramento's ace, was charged with the loss. He's now 12-7.

Carl Greene gave the Solons their first place tie with a four-hit shutout in the second tilt. Bob Roselli homered for the Sacs in the third and the Solons added another run in the fourth. Dave Stenhouse was the loser, though he and two other Rainier hurlers gave up only two hits in the seven inning contest.

Padres Bounce Back
The Padres, who played the worst ball in the league during the past month and a half, showed their early season form in taking the twin-bill from Portland.

Carl Thomas went the route in the first game giving up seven hits while his mates pushed over all six of their tallies in the first three innings. Steve Jankowski belted a two run homer in the Padres' second. George Freese and Jim Greengrass homered for the Beavers.

Jankowski singled home the winning tally in the nightcap. His blow ended the scheduled seven inning tilt in the bottom of the eighth. Jack Striker, the fifth Padre pitcher, got the win. Freese belted two homers for the Beavers.

Player Selection Made for Star Mix

Boston-UP-I—Manager Casey Stengel today named three new pitchers and three more outfielders to the American League squad for the second All-Star game at Los Angeles Aug. 3.

Stengel was allowed to raise the squad limit from 25 to 28 for the game to be played at the Los Angeles coliseum. Fred Haney, manager of the National League squad, also will have three additional players available for the second game. Under Haney's direction, the National League won 5-4 in the first All-Star game held this year at Pittsburgh July 7.

Stengel, in a statement issued by American League headquarters here, selected pitchers Cal McLish of Cleveland, Billy O'Dell of Baltimore and Camilo Pascual of Washington to replace Jim Bunning of Detroit, his own Yankee hurler Whitey Ford and Billy Pierce of Chicago.

The squad also will include four pitchers named for the first All-Star game—Bud Daley of Kansas City, Rye Duren of New York, Hoyt Wil-

helm of Baltimore and Early Wynn of Chicago.

Join Outfield
Bob Allison of Washington, Roger Maris of Kansas City and Gene Woodling of Baltimore will join the American League outfield, which includes Ted Williams of Boston, now benched with an aching shoulder and neck. This is a recurrence of an early season ailment.

According to the rules of the second All-Star game, the managers were required to retain the same 18 non-pitchers that played in the first game, but could make any changes they chose in the pitching staff for the Los Angeles game and could add three players, regardless of position.

Haney made no changes in his pitching staff for the second game and selected as his three additions righthander Sam Jones of San Francisco, shortstop Johnny Logan of Milwaukee and a handyman Jim Gilliam of Los Angeles. Haney originally chose Gil Hodges of Los Angeles instead of the big Dodger first baseman suffered a severely sprained ankle in a game last Thursday.

Italy, Aussies Advance In Cup Challenge Bid

Milan, Italy - (UP) - The Italian team, newly-crowned champion of the European Zone of Davis Cup tennis competition, is all set to leave for the United States on Wednesday to meet the champion of the American Zone.

Italy clinched its best-of-five final series in the European Zone Sunday when Nicola Pietrangeli and Orlando Sirola won a doubles match from Andres Gimeno and Juan Manuel Couder of Spain, 6-4, 8-6, 6-4.

That triumph gave Italy an unbeatable 3-0 lead and reduced to the status of exhibitions today's concluding pair of singles matches in which Sirola faces Gimeno and Pietrangeli plays Couder.

The Italian team will leave for the United States Wednesday by air, and will meet the American Zone champion at Philadelphia, Aug. 7-9. Australia and Cuba have yet to meet in the final round of American Zone eliminations.

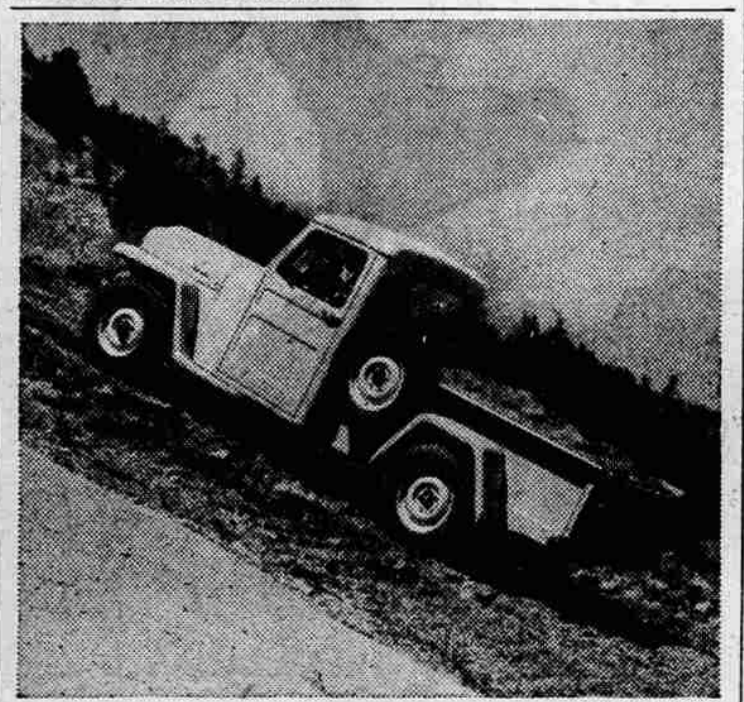
