Talks Scheduled In Aluminum Case

New York—The United Steelworkers of America (USW) scheduled contract talks with the Big Three aluminum producers today under new threat of a strike which would shut down the nation's production of a second basic metal at midnight Friday.

In the two-week old steel strike, Federal Mediation Chief Joseph F. Finnegan reported "no substantial change of position by either party in any respect" after a two-hour joint meeting Monday, the first since the strike began. No further joint meeting was scheduled.

The copper industry also was under strike threat, from the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union, which has been continuing talks under contracts extended since June 30.

Steel companies continued meanwhile to show record sales and profits in newly released six month reports. The strike-threatened Aluminum Co. of America, (Alcoa) also showed a sharp increase in sales and earnings for the half-year period.

The giant United States Steel Corp. was to release today a financial report expected to show record or near-record sales and earnings.

No citations were issued by police who are still investigating the incident.

Montana To Take Part in Conference

Salem—Gov. Mark Hatfield has received word from Gov. J. Hugo Aronson of Montana which indicates that state's willingness to participate in discussions of the proposed power intertie between the Columbia Basin and California.

The study of the inter-tie possibility, whereby surplus power might be made available to California during periods of low consumption in the Columbia Basin, was initiated by Hatfield last March.

At that time, Oregon, Washington and California agreed to cooperate in an investigation to determine the feasibility of such a proposal. Montana and Idaho have since been invited to participate.

Representatives of the four states met July 23 with Bonneville Power administration officials and representatives of public and private power organizations.

Bonneville and the U.S. bureau of reclamation have been directed to conduct a similar study for a report to Congress.

Gunnar Wants to Know Senator's Income

Eugene—Republican State Chairman Peter M. Gunnar said today Sen. Richard L. Neuberger should tell how much he earns from free-lance writing.

Gunnar told a meeting of finance workers here that Neuberger should say how much private income he realizes from free-lance writing "because the senator himself has asked that all U.S. senators reveal the amount of their outside income."

California Teacher Faces Loss of Job For 'Kinsey' Work

Los Angeles—A 38-year-old high school teacher who conducted a "little Kinsey" survey on sex relations among his teenage students today faced the possible loss of his teaching credentials.

Three blushing 17-year-old girls testified at the start of the hearing Monday that they thought questions asked by Cook in his physiology course were "disgusting, outrageous and of little value." The class was comprised of about 30 boys and girls, aged 15 to 17.

One of the girls said she was "too embarrassed" to answer questions before the crowd of spectators which jammed the hearing. The room was cleared before she was asked to continue testimony.

High Winds Fan Pendleton Fires

Pendleton—High winds and drying weather conditions combined Monday to fan at least five separate fires in Eastern Oregon out of control for hours.

The largest of the blazes broke out shortly after noon at the Dick and Bill Purchase ranch near Cayuse about 10 miles east of Pendleton.

The fire swept up from the Umatilla River banks and into about 300 to 350 acres of riparian wheat. Ranchers and commercial firms dispatched trucks and men as the fire rushed across a road, through a pea field and into another wheat field where it was finally brought under control.

Pendleton Grain Growers dispatched several trucks to help fight the fire and were aided by fire fighters of the Umatilla Indian service. Officials reported that two old unoccupied ranch houses were destroyed.

A smaller fire at the north city limits of Pendleton threatened a private home for while Monday. Starting in grass near Riverside, the blaze burned a garage and tool shed before the Pendleton fire department and volunteers could extinguish it.
