Building Burned
For Department Drill
Central Point—A fire in the Camp White area last night served a dual purpose, Central Point firemen reported.

The 60 by 160-foot frame building owned by Cascade Wood Products was burned purposely to make way for new construction by the firm. Burning also provided fire drill for the rural department. Six district vehicles stood by.

Warrant Issued For Man Who Wrote Bad Check
Medford police today sought a Franklyn K. Durden, 29, in connection with an apparent new twist to the "confidence game."

A felony warrant, issued this morning in Jackson county district court, charges Durden with obtaining money under false pretenses and sets bail at \$1,500. Durden's present whereabouts has not been disclosed, but he may have returned to one of several addresses south of the Mason-Dixon line.

Police took action after receiving a complaint from Service, Unlimited employment agency, 125 South Central ave. The complaint concerned a \$203 fictitious check allegedly written by Durden, police said.

Investigators related this account of the incident: Durden approached the agency June 25 seeking employment as a traffic manager. He gave his former occupations as a van line employee, a self-employed trucker, a car salesman and a former captain in the U. S. Air Force.

He made favorable impressions on several prospective employers here. One in fact was checking his references with the intention of hiring him.

With this job lined up, Durden said he would return to his home in Reidsville, Ga., to pick up his family and bring them back to Oregon. To do so, it developed, he would need \$203. He asked to write a check.

An employment agency official accepted Durden's check July 22, the police account continued, endorsed it, had him counter-endorse it and told the bank he would be forced to cash it. He was, and did.

But, the local bank subsequently reported, the check was drawn on a non-existent bank.

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Industrial Shares Hit Record High
New York—(UPI)—Industrial shares struggled to a new record high again today—their fourth session of advance.

A half dozen strong spots provided the lever which lifted the average. They were Goodyear, Allied Chemical, International Paper, General Foods, Union Carbide and Chrysler—all up 1 to 2 points. These gains more than offset losses of 1 or 2 points in Alcoa, Eastman and DuPont.

Elsewhere the industrials balanced off small gains and losses. The market as a whole was highly irregular. The oils lost their snap and most of them receded fractions. Aluminum issues weakened. Coppers strengthened. Some drugs fell sharply. Merck at its low was off 4 and American Home Products off 7 1/2. They recovered some of the losses.

Steel shares slipped back in most instances despite glowing earnings reports still coming in. Rails turned down with Baltimore & Ohio off a point.

Judge Tells of Need for Tax Base
Jackson county residents should give consideration to establishment of a tax base, zoning, home rule and a countywide garbage disposal system, County Judge Earl Miller declared yesterday in a talk to Medford Kiwanians at Rogue Valley Country club.

He was guest speaker at the service club's "county court day" also at the Kiwanis member.

Miller pointed out that the budget is the biggest item that the court is responsible for. He spoke of the large revenue from federal forest lands and warned that sometime, from economic reasons, this money could be reduced. That's why, he said, attention should be given to voting a tax base.

The judge spoke of the growing density of population outside the cities and the problems of sanitation and water getting out of hand in some sections. Sometime in the future zoning will be a necessity, he maintained.
