Trading Falls Off On Stock Market

New York—Trading on the stock market today fell off to the lightest level in more than a year.

Prices registered an irregular decline but most of them held in a narrow range. Oils, recent favorites, were hit harder than other groups and some of the chemicals fell rather sharply. The autos held in a narrow area.

Steels were mixed with National at a new high. Carpenter off 2 and A. M. Byers up more than a point.

Rails were little changed. Utilities firmed.

DuPont was the strong spot in the chemicals and Allied Chemical, off 3/4 points at its low, the weakest. Aluminum firmed.

In the oil departments Cities Service lost 2 points and declines of a point or more appeared in Amerasia, Royal Dutch, Texas Gulf Producing, and Standard of Jersey. Skelly rose a point and small gains were set by Plymouth Oil and Texaco.

Reviewer Describes Cast of Third Play As Unexceptionable

Ashland—"Measure for Measure" is a play based on human frailties, on human weaknesses, on human vanities and temptations.

So, of course, are many plays. But this one has neither the ennobling catharsis of true tragedy, nor the light-heartedness of comedy. It lacks, too, the straight-forward exposition of historical drama.

Thus it is difficult to classify, and, indeed, it is one of the odder works of its writer, a fellow named William Shakespeare. A reference work says that Coleridge characterized it as "the most painful" of Shakespeare's plays, and adds that "it certainly has always been the least popular."

Competent Company
Why this should be, however, was not apparent to this reviewer after watching last night's production of MM at the Shakespearean Festival. The company, one of the most competent and mature and accomplished it has been our pleasure to watch in 10 years of attending the Festival, took this odd play and made of it a thing both understandable and, in places, moving.

The director, Richard Sandoe, handled the interplay of the characters skillfully, bringing out the complexities of the production with clarity and sense.

The characters are not, in the main, admirable people. Even the noble duke, played with force and dignity and humor by David O'Brien, shows weakness in his sloughing off the responsibilities of his office on Angelo, in favor of playing hide and seek with his subjects and his deputies.

And Angelo, given the authority of life and death, betrays himself in lust for power and for beautiful Isabella. Philip Hanson brings this ugly man to life in a way in which only a sensitive and veteran actor could bring off successfully. His scene with Isabella, there to plead for her brother's life, is one of the high spots in the play, as Angelo fights against himself and his desires, and loses. Hanson makes this struggle, which could be ludicrous, both believable and, in a repellent sort of way, touching. His tricks with his hands, rubbing them together, pressing them against his thighs, bring reality to a scene which would be laughable with a less able protagonist.

Blameless Character
Isabella, the novice nun who rushes from the nunnery to plead for the life of her erring brother, is the only wholly blameless character among the major roles. In the capable person of Margaret Vafiadis, she becomes a real woman, unspoiled, innocent, shocked beyond measure at the revealed sins of her brother and at the turpitude of the man she asks to spare his life. Mrs. Vafiadis has that indefinable quality sometimes called "presence." She has a glow, a grace, a sureness of foot and gesture which bespeak both high intelligence and long apprenticeship. She is, in a word, superb. And to say that once in a while she is a loss while the center of action proceeds elsewhere on the stage is to mitigate nothing of her power when the action centers upon her.

These three are the major roles in the play. The secondary parts are nowhere less than skillfully done. Deserving of special mention among them are the role of Escalus, handled with sureness and dignity by Dion Chesse; Claudio, the erring and repentant brother, done with competence by George Vafi-

Alternating Use of District Water Told

Grants Pass—Neal Shaffer, manager of the Grants Pass Irrigation district, today said it appears likely that water in the two pump-fed canals of the district will have to be alternated beginning about the last week in August.

This means, he explained, that about one-third of the water-using acres in the district will be dry periodically from late August until the end of the season.

This has not been necessary in recent years, he said, but the dearth of water this year probably will make it necessary.
