

Kennedy Flying to Oregon To Start Primary Campaign

Washington - Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) flies to Oregon this week end to start his campaign for victory in next May's Presidential primary and learn the answers to two vital questions.

Has his coup in capturing the woman selected to manage rival Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey's (D-Minn.) Oregon campaign knocked Humphrey out of the running?

How much of a threat will Adlai E. Stevenson be if his backers go ahead with their plan to enter him against his wishes in the Oregon race?

Kennedy will address a Democratic dinner in Portland Saturday night, then stay over to keynote the state AFL-CIO convention in Seaside on Monday.

He will be introduced to the Democratic gathering by Rep. Edith Green (D) of Portland, a lady with important connections in liberal and labor groups, a close political ally of Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), and one of the seconders of Stevenson's nomination in 1956.

Neither Morse, who last week refused the favorite son role in the Oregon primary, nor Mrs. Green has an announced choice for the Democratic nomination.

Dramatic Battlefront

However, Mrs. Sylvia Nemer—a Portland political leader described by Mrs. Green as "my close personal and political friend"—has accepted the job of running Kennedy's Oregon campaign.

The decision of the handsome, red-haired Mrs. Nemer to sign up with Kennedy climaxed one of the most dramatic behind-the-scenes battles waged so far in the fight for the 1960 Democratic nomination.

An emissary from the Humphrey camp went out to Oregon in May to secure Mrs. Nemer's services as his Oregon campaign director. Mrs. Nemer had been recommended to Humphrey by friends who had been impressed by her successful management of the Stevenson campaign against Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) in the 1956 Oregon primary. Experiment With Juveniles Noted

New York—(Science Service) - As an experiment, a new way of handling serious juvenile delinquents is to be tried out in Provo, Utah, financed by a grant from the Ford Foundation here.

When a boy gets into trouble with the law, it is a mistake to pack him off to a reformatory or other "correctional" institution, David Hunter of the Foundation indicated.

Authorities are coming to recognize that such punishment does not cure delinquency, he said. In fact, some reformatories serve as training centers for penitentiaries.

In this new experiment, the youthful offenders will be kept at home and kept in school. But for two hours daily, five days a week, they will meet as a group in rehabilitation sessions. There an attempt will be made to change the delinquent's standards and his attitudes. In addition, he will be helped with athletics, vocational training and, where necessary, remedial school work. An effort will be made to help the boy overcome the pressures that fostered his trouble with the law in the first place.

As part of the research financed by the Foundation, a follow-up comparison will be made of the behavior of boys who participated in the program and those who had instead traditional probation or correctional procedures.

"fair play" and practical considerations both require him to stay out of the primaries. Kennedy and Humphrey backers are putting heavy pressure on Stevenson to dissuade Porter from going through with his plan.

Both Senators need — and feel they can win — support from former Stevenson backers. They want him to say more strongly than he has so far that his friends should cease their efforts on his behalf.

Stevenson's law partner and political spokesman, William M. Blair Jr., promised them last week he would urge Stevenson to make another statement on his political status. Blair, however, does not want him to say anything that would prevent him from being drafted by the convention.

Small Worlds Around Us

Was Mother Nature Confused When She Made the Sea Robin?

There must have been some little confusion in Mother Nature's mind when she created the Sea Robin. Apparently she couldn't decide whether she wanted this fish to fly, walk, swim or crawl.

In consequence, the Sea Robin still doesn't know which to do and fails partly in all activities. Had this character been a human instead of a fish it would have probably worn a purple tie and "pink shoe laces."

The Sea Robins are small fish, seldom over a foot in length, but large or small they are all silly looking. All the various varieties have exceedingly large heads, on top of which is a heavy, bony shield or plate. The eyes are jet-black and fierce looking.

Tapering Body

The body tapers sharply, having a very high, spiny dorsal fin. The pectoral fins are greatly enlarged and wing-like, giving the creature a bird-like appearance. In some species the body color is red and very warty. The red color may have been the reason for naming the fish after a robin.

Underneath the triangular-shaped body there are three finger-like appendages, making it possible for this unusual fish to literally "walk" along the ocean floor by reaching forward with these hooked rays, then pulling itself along in an awkward manner. But it can spread its wings and "fly," or come to the surface, spread the wings and float.

Some species of the Sea Robin named were apparently named after birds. There is even one called the Red Winged Robin that possesses a square ended tail. Another is called the Striped Robin. This one is a bright orange

Microbes Sought To Refine Oil

Baton Rouge, La.—(Science Service)—Attempts to use microscopic organisms to refine oil are being made at Louisiana State university here. If the research is successful, it could lead to radical changes in certain oil processing methods.

The research is being directed by Dr. Raymond J. Strawinski, who several years ago devised an inexpensive method of locating oil deposits with the aid of microbes.

Just as the human body acts as a catalyst to change the chemical structure of foods, he reported, certain microorganisms should exist that can change hydrocarbon-like structures to purify petroleum fractions. It is hoped that the catalytic life processes of some organisms might act on certain chemical structures in oil to change or remove them.

Esso Standard Oil company has granted Dr. Strawinski more than \$27,000 for his microbe research. The grant will finance two years of study by Dr. Strawinski and two Ph. D. candidates at LSU.

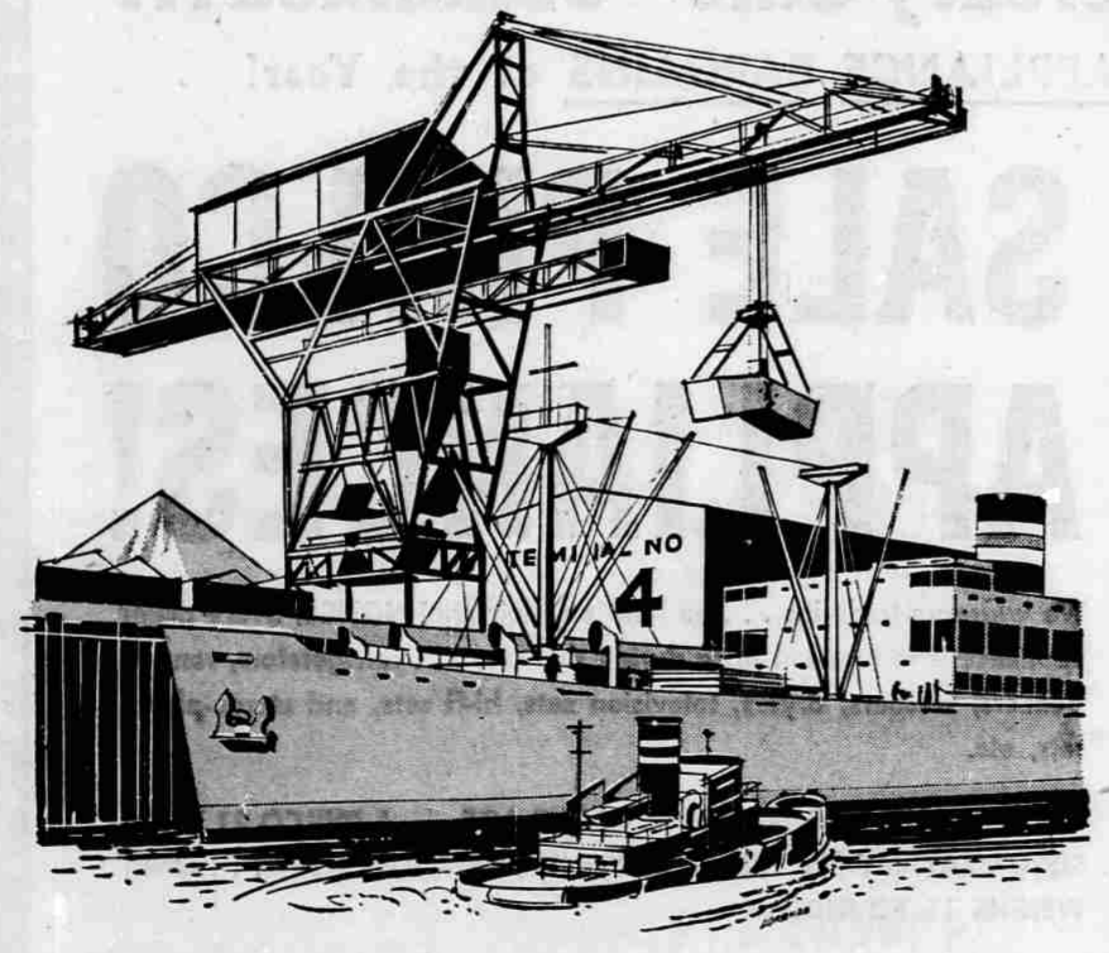

Crosby Brothers Extend Engagement

Las Vegas, Nev. — (UPI)—The four sons of crooner Bing Crosby, who opened their new act to a packed house Tuesday at the Sahara Hotel, will have their engagement extended to 5 1/2 weeks.

The hotel announced it paid \$18,500 for the contracts with two Eastern spots where the boys originally were to have gone following a 3 1/2-week stand here. They were to have played a week each at Steel Pier in Atlantic City and in a Springfield, Mass., club.

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Honey May Be Mixed in Drugs

Washington—(Science Service)—Honey, an oldtime home remedy for coughs and colds, may soon find itself mixed with the newest drugs.

The combination means better tasting tonics and wider use of honey, the U. S. Department of Agriculture here reported.

Ferrous sulfate sirup, a popular iron tonic, was made with honey as the only flavoring agent. It was stable, "exceptionally palatable," and free of the astringent after-taste characterized by most iron medicines. Medicines in honey preparations settle very slowly and moderate shaking will again distribute the drug throughout the liquid. Vitamin B-2, or riboflavin, is especially stable in honey solutions, the researchers found.

The Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science carried out the honey research project under contract to the U. S. D. A.'s Agricultural Research Service.

County Rivers Said Safe for Swimming

The Jackson county health department has been overwhelmed with telephone calls regarding the safety of swimming in rivers and streams in the county, according to Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer.

The doctor said that there have been rumors that many cases of polio, typhoid, and other skin conditions are prevalent in the county.

During the past 15 years the health department has been unable to trace any case of polio or typhoid to such streams as the Applegate or Rogue river, Dr. Merkel said.

The health department is "on the spot" to the extent that they cannot state that it is 100 per cent safe to swim in these streams, the doctor said. He said that the standard they have to use as far as swimming is concerned is the standard used for drinking water.

The doctor added that past experience has shown that it would not be advisable to condemn these streams for swimming purposes.

OFFICIAL CON GAME

New York—(UPI)—Police admitted sheepishly Thursday that "tow away zone" signs on midtown no-parking streets are only good to "intimidate the timid." The city closed down its impounding yards, and stopped towing cars away from no-parking zones a year ago to save money.



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
