

Jerry Barber Leads PGA After 3 Rounds

 Minneapolis — (UP) — Little Jerry Barber of Los Angeles rolled in a 35-foot birdie putt on the final hole yesterday for a 36-35 — 71 and a 205 total which snatched the third round lead in the PGA golf championship away from young Doug Sanders of the "telephone booth backswing."

Sanders, the 26-year-old Georgia-born man with the shortest backswing in golf, was making a big run at Barber for the top spot and they were all even for the lead going to the final hole in a head and head battle at Minneapolis golf club. But when they holed out, Sanders was one shot back with a blazing 35-33-68 and a total of 206.

Major Races Halt For All-Star Game

 Los Angeles — (UP) — The two major leagues interrupt torrid pennant races Monday for the second all-star game of 1959 amid a series of last minute roster changes of questioned popularity.

Gone from the original July 7 game American league rosters were Yankees Bill Skowron and Gil McDougald, along with Detroit's Harvey Kuenn, all out with assorted ills. Missing from the winning National league lineup will be St. Louis' hard hitting Bill White, nursing an injured ankle.

American league Manager Casey Stengel replaced his three injured stars with three Yankees—Elston Howard, Bobby Richardson and Tony Kubek, the latter two named today. And immediately the cry went up that Stengel had weakened a roster originally not strong enough to whip the Nationals in the first game at Pittsburgh.

Replacing White on the National side was Charlie Neal, a change that was at least popular with the hometown Dodger faithful, which raised the roof when Neal was "overlooked" the first time around.

The world of baseball viewed two all-star games in a single season as an experiment. But the clash is for the benefit of the players' pension fund and from a financial standpoint appeared a success.

The Los Angeles Dodgers, acting as representatives of the commissioner's office in staging the second all-star game at 4 p.m. (p.d.t.) tomorrow in the huge Memorial coliseum, predicted a crowd of around 60,000.

With a television network (NBC) paying \$250,000 for the rights to air the game nationally, plus the paid attendance, the total contribution into the pension fund may exceed \$500,000.

The best Centennial single was taken by Fawnda Goodman dressed as an 1859 dance hall girl. The Lions club held the traveling cup for the second year with a double float called Welcome Hawaii. Flowers and costumes were exotic and children danced to Hawaiian music as the float passed through the town. There were more than 20 people on the float which depicted a Hawaiian Kings Court.

Three prizes in the adult float division were taken in order by the Lady Lions auxiliary, Prospect's Classical Hillbilly Band and Skeeters camp.

Senate Committee Listens To Rickey

 Washington (UP) — Leaning forward on his cane and chomping on an unlit cigar, Branch Rickey looked as eager as a rookie about to be sent in to pinch hit.

The old "Maharajah" of baseball was on deck in the Senate caucus room waiting to testify before the anti-trust subcommittee on legislation effecting professional sports.

The witness chair was then occupied by ex-Sen. Edwin C. Johnson of Colorado, a former minor league official who was giving major league club owners a hard time. To this, Rickey obviously was taking umbrage.

Shakespearean Eloquence

When Rickey's turn came, he poured forth in rebuttal to Johnson a discourse on the virtues of baseball men that was almost Shakespearean in its eloquence.

"This is a basically honest game," he would have the subcommittee know, "supported by honest men." And he would not sit idly by and hear them "unfairly maligning."

Hunching over the microphone and hounding something like the late Lionel Barrymore, Rickey sentimentally reeled off great names from the past—Griffith, Mack, Comiskey—who, he said, had invested their "last dollar" to keep baseball going.

"I knew them well," he claimed, in the manner of Hamlet praising poor Yorick.

Organized Farm System

A baseball man himself for more than 50 years, with long experience in the front office, Rickey is credited with originating baseball's farm system. If the system is now bad for baseball, as Johnson claimed, "You are confronted with the culprit," Rickey told the subcommittee.

For the better part of an hour, Rickey held committee members and spectators alike spellbound with his oratory.

Rickey finally stopped himself. He had been told, he said, that a good congressional witness would be interrupted by questions and he had heard none.

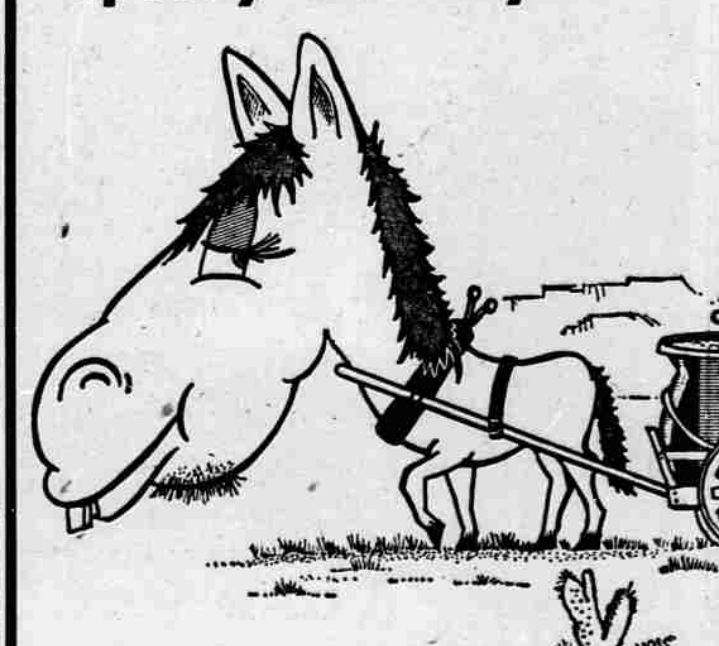
