

Dairy Maids Split With McCulloch

Memorial stadium, Camp White - Rogue Valley Dairy Maids nudged Eugene McCulloch Chain Saw 2 to 0 here yesterday afternoon to break even in a week end series in the Northwest Women's Major Softball league.

Eugene won 2 to 1 on Saturday night.

The Maids yesterday got both runs in the first inning and held off McCulloch the rest of the distance. Nadine Brood, Ellen Callaghan and Jean Main singled in the inning and Jan Bateman bolstered the cause with a sacrifice.

A big Eugene threat was in the fourth inning when a walk and double put runners on base with no outs. However, Callaghan struck out the rest of the side. McCulloch left nine runners stranded on bases and Rogue Valley just three.

DuPuis Doubles

Callaghan walked seven batters and fanned eight and helped the Maids with two hits. Karen Kirkmire of Eugene walked two and had no strikeouts. Janet Pfaff lashed the other Maid hit. Margaret DuPuis doubled and Pat Jensen and Wanda Conner each singled for Eugene.

Free passes to the bases were a material aid to McCulloch in getting its two runs Saturday night in the fourth inning. A hit batter, a single by DuPuis and a fielder's choice rap by Conner loaded the bases with no one out.

Pitcher Pat Barron fanned one batter but her bad knee gave out on the second pitch to Millie Powell. Shirley Hanson was called in for the chugging rubber from the outfield. She fired a strike and then two balls and one run was walked in. Another free pass to bases permitted the second score. Lois Winn fled out to Nadine Brood in right field and the outfielder fired in the ball to catch Conner at the plate.

Three Hits By Main

Rogue Valley gained its run in the first inning on a walk, a passed ball and a single by Main.

Main hit three for three and was the only Dairy Maid with a safe blow. Carolyn Jones recorded one of the hits for Eugene. Winn struck out six and walked just two in her two-hitter for McCulloch.

Eugene almost got a run on a double steal in the seventh inning. Sharon Knight had walked and gone to third when Nina Edwards got on base on an error. On the steal try, Edwards was ruled out for leaving her base and Knight, who had come home on a miscue, was sent back to third because of the ball being dead on the play.

Rogue Valley wound up its second half of play in the league with a 5-7 record, the same as it had in the first half. Eugene still has games to play.

Rosburg Captures Pro Golf Laurels By Single Stroke

Minneapolis (UPI)—Bob Rosburg, the new PGA champion who finally won "the big one I've been looking for," wasn't sure today whether his triumph came on merit or "little Jerry's mistakes."

Little Jerry is the 43-year-old, five-foot, five-inch, 138-pound Jerry Barber, who blew the PGA championship Sunday when he bogeyed the last two holes.

"I gave the tournament away," Barber said. "When I put my approaches on the last two holes in sand traps, I blew it."

Eastern Nebraska Cleans Up from Heavy Rainfalls

Rain-battered eastern Nebraska cleaned up Monday from a storm that flattened crops, knocked out power and communication lines and blocked highways.

A survey of police and fire officials indicated the violent rains that poured down on the area Sunday caused damage estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Schuyler, Neb., reported 9.30 inches of rain, with more than eight inches falling in little more than three hours. Many business places and homes were damaged by the gushing water.

One utility worker said basement walls had caved in at more than 75 homes in a small area of suburban West Omaha, which also received about nine inches of rain.

At least six bridges in the Omaha area were threatened by the swirling, debris-laden water, but there were no reports of any washouts.

Showers Scattered

The weather bureau said showers and thundershowers were scattered Sunday from the western Great Lakes across the upper Mississippi valley into the Dakotas. Scattered showers also fell from the western portions of Kansas and Nebraska across the central Rockies and into the southern plateau region.

Cool, Canadian air covered the northeast corner of the country from Maine through New York, Pennsylvania and into West Virginia, where temperatures were mostly in the 50s during the night. Westward to the Pacific coast it was warmer.

A general warming trend was expected to accompany scattered showers from the upper Mississippi valley into the Great Lakes area Monday. Elsewhere, skies were expected to be mostly fair with a chance of a few scattered thundershowers.

"When you shoot a 66 like Bob did, you deserve to win," Barber said. "But when it looked like I had frosting on the cake going to the 17th hole, it turned out to be only dough."

Started 6 Strokes Behind

Rosburg, who has been making his living playing golf since he turned professional in 1953, was six strokes behind the leading Barber going into Sunday's final round. But that four-under-par 66 gave him a 72-hole total of 277, one stroke better than Barber and Doug Sanders. Sanders, one stroke behind Barber going into the final round, carded a two-over-par 72 for the second place tie.

Defending champion Dow Finwald was fourth at 280. He shot a fourth round par 70. Tied for fifth at 281 were the favored Mike Souchak, whose putter failed him again, Bob Goalby and Ken Venturi. Next at 282 came Sammy Snead and Cary Middlecoff.

Rosburg's victory was worth \$8,250, giving him a total money winning purse for the year of \$26,098.

Back of Snead and Middlecoff came Gene Littler at 284. Doug Ford, Porky Oliver and Milly Maxwell were at 285 with Arnold Palmer, Paul Harney and Tommy Jacobs at 286.
