Sullivan Opens Soviet Tour With Show at Moscow

Moscow - (UP) - Ed "Petrovich" Sullivan, speaking haltingly in Russian instead of English, opened a Soviet tour Monday night with a gala premiere of a variety show staged as part of the American Exhibition here.

The show was approximately the mixture Americans are accustomed to seeing on television-jugglers, pretty singers in tight, low-cut dresses, a contortionist and a magician, among other acts.

Ballerina Nora Kaye and operatic soprano Rise Stevens, singing "Getting To Know You" in Russian, provided a spice of culture to the bill.

An audience of intent, smiling Russians applauded every act, although in some cases it wasn't certain that they got the point. The turns they liked particularly were called back repeatedly for bows.

A critic for the official Tass agency said the audience "accepted the performance in a very warm, friendly manner." Specially Tailored

Sullivan's show, specially tailored for Russian audiences, is scheduled to play two weeks in the outdoor theater in Moscow's Gorky Park. He plans also to play Odess and Tbilisi before returning home.

The TV master of ceremonies, whose father's name was Peter, adopted "Petrovich" (Peterson) as his middle name for the duration of the tour.

A Russian's middle name customarily identifies him as his father's son.

Sullivan delighted the audience by introducing the acts in halting Russian, a language he learned during a recent three-week stay in Las Vegas.

"I was the only person in Las Vegas studying Russian roulette," he quipped Monday night.

In addition to the Misses Kaye and Stevens, hits of the show included dancers Marge and Gower Champion and a team billed as Janik and Arnaut featuring a girl contortionist who coiled around her partner like a snake.

The Barry Sisters, in white dresses so tight they could hardly walk, drew gasps of delight with a jazz version of the Russian song "Dark Eyes."

Library Receives Papers of Pease

Eugene - Personal diaries, books, and papers of Clifton Pease, publicist and writer known in the Puget Sound area, have been presented to the University of Oregon library by his widow, Ida Mick-Leonard Pease of Bainbridge Island, Wash.

The collection "has much literary and historical merit," according to University Librarian Carl W. Hintz.

Pease did public relations work for the American Mail Line and then was the U. S. treasury department's director of special events in the state of Washington during World War II before retiring in 1949.

Among the gifts are two volumes he prepared: "History of the American Mail Line" and "A Billion Potential Customers."

Also included are Pease's magazine articles as early as 1922 urging the use of the airplane to fight forest fires, radio scripts and lecture notes for his travelogues in the Orient, and his diaries during war-time service as an officer in the Canadian army and during his Oriental voyages.

Deputies Make Numerous Arrests

Crocker J. Hunter, 29, of 214 Girard dr., Medford, pleaded innocent to a charge of disorderly conduct Monday in district court, and a jury trial was scheduled for Aug. 26. He was released on \$55 bail.

Hunter was arrested Saturday night by sheriff's deputies in Jacksonville.

Chief Sheriff's Deputy Paul Bettiol said that more than a dozen other persons were arrested over the week end in Jacksonville, mostly on charges of disorderly conduct and drunk. Ten arrests were made by sheriff's officers, two by Jacksonville police, and at least two minors were involved.

County Sheriff Joe Walsh said that the arrests came apparently as a result of "a mixture of beer and wild temperaments."
