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Corporation Buys Wholesale Firm

The Southern Oregon branch of Crane company has been purchased by a new, locally owned corporation, the Budget-McHugh Supply company, it was reported this week.

Directors of the new firm are Boyd E. Budge, who came here in 1949 to establish and manage the branch; Kenneth C. McHugh, sales manager for the past 10½ years; George Davis, Portland and Klamath Falls; Ed Feldman, Medford; and Harry Goss, Palo Alto, Calif.

Budge is president and general manager of the new \$150,000 corporation; McHugh, vice president and sales manager, and Ed Branchfield, attorney, secretary. Several employees of the newly formed company are also shareholders.

The wholesale business was formerly company owned.

The new company is franchised to operate as the exclusive Crane company distributor in Lake, Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Curry, Del Norte and Siskiyou counties of Oregon and California.

In addition to the full Crane line of manufactured products, the wholesale firm will also distribute National, Kaiser and Orangeburg items related to the plumbing, air conditioning and water works fields.

Hurricane Moves To Near Honolulu

Honolulu—(UPI)—A massive Pacific hurricane bearing winds up to 140 miles an hour was expected to move within 200 miles of Hilo late today if it maintains its current speed of 7 to 10 miles per hour.

The weather bureau issued gale warnings and set up a hurricane watch along the southwest coast of Hawaii Island Monday night.

A spokesman said it was still too early to issue hurricane warnings to the southwestern part of the island, although a preliminary alert was ordered and residents in the area were told to stand by for further instructions.

Small craft were ordered to seek port, and the island was advised to prepare for heavy rains, strong winds and high tides.

The bureau said it ordered the precautions because the hurricane, which has been moving due west, could veer north and hit the island.

The bureau added that unless the path of the hurricane changes within the next 48 hours, the storm will probably pass within 80 miles of Honolulu, capital city and largest population center of the 50th state.

The weather in Honolulu was balmy Monday, with scattered showers. More of the same was expected today.

Federal Positions Open in Agencies

Applications are now being accepted for several federal positions the U. S. Civil Service commission announced today. These positions include analytical and survey statistician, mathematical statistician, equipment specialist and engineer.

The statistician positions are with various federal agencies located principally in the Washington D. C. area. Equipment specialist positions are in the fields of missile, artillery, rockets and tactical vehicles and are located at Army field installations at various places throughout the United States.

Engineers are needed in a large number of fields at naval installations in the Pacific area.

New Chemicals Kill Common Rose Disease

Beltsville, Md. — (Science Service) — Black spot of roses, the nation's most destructive rose disease, soon may be completely conquered by two new organic chemical fungicides. In tests at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research center here, none of the rose plants sprayed with either Phaltan or Cyprax contracted the disease. Further evaluation will be necessary before scientists can recommend how much of the chemicals should be used, the Department of Agriculture stated. Black spot of roses is most common in the summer months.

'Real Estate' Man Shot, Killed While Getting Money To Build Up Desert Area

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A man shot and killed while holding up a drug store was revealed today to be the real estate man who, it had been hoped, would industrialize a desert community to make it the rival of "Palm Springs, Las Vegas and Reno."

Daniel M. Snyder, 28, cleared at least \$58,000 from two of his robberies and used the money to form a real estate corporation and buy property, fancy clothes and expensive cars, police said.

The handsome "Jekyll and Hyde" was known as the "briefcase bandit" in his life of crime, and as the man who was going to make the desert community of Cabazon, Calif., the "gem of the desert" in his role as a business executive.

Bought Dump Site
"He was a 'Get Rich Quick Wallingford,'" Detective Sgt. Thomas E. Dawson said.

"He was 5-foot-7, but wore elevator shoes to add two inches to his height and wore padded shoulders to give himself a strong-man build. And he dressed like a fashion plate."

Dawson said Snyder recently bought a 10-acre dump site in Cabazon, a desert community near Banning, Calif., and also a large home and two adjoining lots which he planned for use as his mansion.

"He was known in Cabazon as the man who was going to industrialize the community and make it a 'gem of the desert,'" rivaling Palm Springs, Las Vegas and Reno," Dawson said.

Snyder, in his life as a criminal, masqueraded as a Los Angeles police officer to gain employees' trust and then robbed them. He carried a briefcase with the initials of LAPD (Los Angeles Police Department).

He was shot down Sunday night by police officers when he was caught robbing a drug store.

In his briefcase was found a certificate of incorporation issued last week and making him president of the new corporation, "Desert Winds Enterprises, Inc."

Dawson said a 39-year-old woman and mother of two

Wall Street Chatter

New York—(UPI)—Edmund W. Tabell, analyst at Walston and company, expects continued strength in selected issues, but a continued consolidation phase in the averages, followed by an upward penetration in the not too far distant future.

The general business picture as a whole continues to look very solid, and the vigorous first half improvement in earnings of most corporations promises to resume in the fourth quarter of this year after a third quarter interruption due to strikes and vacations, according to Shearson, Hammill and company.

Considering the strength of underlying forces, we would expect no more than a temporary weakness in the production indexes to result from the steel strike, says Investors Advisory Institute. Any stock

market effect this may have in specific areas probably will be offset by price strength in other groups, the service believes.

Standard and Poor's selects commercial credit as the stock of the month. This finance company, specializing in auto paper, is expected to earn \$5.50 a share this year against \$5.29 in 1958. Standard also anticipates it will show a satisfactory gain in earnings in 1960 and 1961.

Three Cab Drivers Arrested in Portland

Portland—(UPI)—Three Portland cab drivers were arrested Monday night and early today on charges of illegally selling alcoholic beverages.

City vice officers and officials of the Federal Bureau of Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Stamps made the arrests. Police said the men made illegal sales of whiskey to city and federal vice officers.

The cabs of the arrested men were confiscated and were held as federal property on grounds that they were used illegally for transporting alcoholic beverages without federal tax stamps.

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Community College To Open in Astoria

Astoria—(UPI)—Oregon's first community college will open here Sept. 8 with registration in the high school building.

R. D. Boss, director of adult and vocational education for Astoria schools, and D. V. Olds, superintendent of city schools, have announced the subjects available and class schedules.

A complete sequence of fundamental liberal arts courses offering full college credit at the freshman and sophomore levels will be available. The credits will be acceptable at senior colleges in the state.

The Astoria school board in cooperation with the state's general extension division is conducting the college program. Instructors will be drawn from the faculty of state colleges.

Basic courses include history, language, literature, science, English and psychology.

Vocational training classes and general adult education course will be offered to those not seeking college credits.
