

Yogi Says It Was a Good One

Editor's Note: Yogi Berra of the Yankees batted out a two-run homer in the third inning to lead the American league All-Stars to a 5-3 victory over the National league and to win the Most Valuable Player Award. In the following dispatch, he gives his views on his part in the game.

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Where the hell's the beer?

I guess that was the first thing I said when I came into the American league dressing room.

But I felt pretty good anyhow after hitting that homer. It was a fast ball, chest-high and the first one Don Drysdale threw to me.

When I caught it I knew it was a good one and gone.

First One
It was the first extra base hit I've made in the 11 All-Star games I've played in. Nellie Fox was on base, and we went ahead, 3-1. It went over the right field fence, but I wasn't trying to hit it there, I was just trying to hit the ball anywhere.

A ball's hard to see here. The clothing and the big blank spots in the Coliseum make it very difficult to follow the ball. And that guy Drysdale throws fast.

Sometimes there's luck in this sort of thing. There have been some luck here—I don't know for sure.

I don't know about how I'd feel if I had to bat against Drysdale all the time. He throws hard enough—I know that. I'd have to get used to him.

Sometimes you hit a ball, and you know you hit it good. Today I knew I'd hit one, and it felt mighty good.

Davis Tops PCL Stats

San Francisco — (UPI) — Tom Davis, of Spokane, with 150 hits in 112 games was at the top of the heap in Pacific Coast league batting averages released today. His price tag was \$334.

Bill Wilson of Phoenix, had the most home runs with 20, now that team-mate Willie McCovey has gone up to the San Francisco Giants after slugging 29 homers.

In the pitching department, Dick Hall, big Salt Lake right-hander, continued to set the pace with an earned run mark of only 1.71.

Chuck Churn, of Spokane, with 11 wins and 2 losses for the season, had an .846 percentage, a little better than Hall's .765 for 13 wins and four losses. Among Hall's victories were six shutouts, the most for any pitcher.

The San Diego Padres' Dick Stigman led in strikeouts, with 124.

AL Takes All-Star Game On Yogi Berra's Home Run

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The second All-Star game of 1959 was a "good production" to "hero" Yogi Berra, the managers, the players and 55,105 fans who saw the American league defeat the National league, 5-3.

The victory reversed the National league's 5-4 win at Pittsburgh last month. National league starting pitcher Don Drysdale, most valuable player of the first All-Star game, was the loser.

Berra got his first extra-base hit—a two-run homer—in 11 All-Star games. It won him the second game's most valuable player award.

Manager Paul Richards of the Baltimore Orioles, who uttered pre-game disgruntled criticism of his rookie hurler, Jerry Walker, being picked to pitch on one day's notice could be proud of the 20-year-old.

Yields Only Two Hits
Walker, the youngest pitcher to start an All-Star game, got out for the win as he gave up but two hits and one run in the three innings.

American league manager Casey Stengel used three Baltimore hurlers despite Rich-

ards' criticism, sending in Hoyt Wilhelm for one inning and Billy O'Dell for one.

The second All-Star game proved a financial success with gross receipts of \$283,120. The net receipts after taxes were \$262,336.47.

In the first All-Star game at Pittsburgh, the crowd of 35,277 paid a gross \$229,636 through the gates with a net of \$194,303.46.

"It was a good game, a well played game," Stengel commented in the clubhouse. "And there is nothing wrong with this park."

To ward off possible criticism of his using three Baltimore hurlers, Stengel explained he carefully asked each pitcher if he felt he was ready to throw and felt good.

But nobody felt any better than Berra who said he caught a chest-high fast ball for his homer in the third with Nellie Fox of the White Sox on base.

"When I caught it I knew it was a good one and gone," the barrel-chested Yankee catcher explained.

Not Too Unhappy
Things were a little quieter in the National league dressing room but manager Fred Haney of the Braves and all

the players did not appear too unhappy about having lost. Haney called the second All-Star game a "good production."

Johnny Temple's leadoff double for the National league led to the game's first run as he was sacrificed home by Hank Aaron of the Braves.

But the lead did not last long. Frank Malzone of the Red Sox tied it up in the second with the first of five homers in the game, blasting one of Drysdale's throws over the

notorious left field screen that starts 251-feet from home plate.

When Berra homered with one aboard in the next inning that all but put the game in the hock shop.

Frank Robinson of Cincinnati might have been the game's hero had the National league won. The Reds' first baseman led off with a homer in the fifth off Early Wynn, getting two more singles for a three-for-three record.

But the Americans increased their lead 4-2 in the seventh when they scored an unearned run as three National leaguers erred, with Nellie Fox driving in Tony Kubek to score.

That was the ball game but Rocky Colavito of the Indians

frosted the Nationals cake with a leadoff homer in the eighth off Pittsburgh's Elroy Face.

Jim Gilliam of the Dodgers scored the third National league run with a homer in the seventh. But in the ninth with two men on base and two away he grounded out to end the game.

Art Claims He'll Take Don Jordan

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Art Aragon said today he would retire if he loses his Aug. 25 non-title bout against welterweight champion Don Jordan.

"If there's one fighter in the world I can lick, he's it," the colorful 31-year-old golden boy said. "If I lose, I'm retiring."

Aragon, for years the top local drawing card, has beaten Jordan twice. He took decisions from him in June and December of 1955. Jordan is now 24.

"This is the most important fight of my life," Aragon said. "They were all important, of course. But this one is it. If I beat this guy, he has to give me a crack at the title—a title fight. If I beat anyone else, so what?"

Hollywood Legion stadium originally asked the California Athletic Commission for approval of a 15-round title fight. The commission turned it down on grounds that Aragon was not a top contender and had not recently beaten a top contender.

The commission then approved the Legion's revised request for approval of the 10-round non-title go, and matchmaker Jackie Leonard, said the bout would be held at Wrigley Field in Los Angeles.

Wightman Cup Woman Named

Pittsburgh — (UPI) — The members of the women's U.S. Wightman Cup team were named today as the Americans hoped to recapture the trophy from the British at the Edgewater Club here Aug. 15 and 16.

Kahn Gets 'Huge Guarantees' For Floyd-Ingo Title Rematch

New York — (UPI) — Irving B. Kahn, new major domo in the Ingemar Johansson Floyd Patterson return-match promotion, said today he was considering two "huge guarantees" for the Sept. 22 fight, in the wake of Bill Rosenzohn's resignation as promoter.

"Those guarantees are from big people in cities interested in getting the fight," Kahn explained. "One of them guarantees a gross gate of more than \$600,000—considerably

more. And, of course, there are lesser offers from other cities."

Rotund, black-haired Kahn—only 41—declined to state whether the big offer was from New Yorkers, hopeful of keeping the fight at Yankee stadium where Rosenzohn had tentatively scheduled it before he withdrew from the promotion Monday.

"A Deal"
Kahn—brand new board chairman of Rosenzohn Enter-

prises, Inc., as well as head of Teleprompter Corp. (theater TV)—said, "If the men making the big offer will put the money in the bank soon, they've got themselves a deal. But this time the money must be in the bank."

He recalled that certain New York millionaires had made a gross-gate guarantee of \$600,000 for the June 26 fight in which Johansson won the title from Patterson; but that they had later withdrawn the guarantee—which had not been banked.

Other developments were:—Milton Pender, Teleprompter accountant, began going over the Rosenzohn Corp.'s books this morning to determine assets and liabilities, preparatory to paying Johansson and Patterson their shares of the June 26 gate.

"Every Quarter"
—Because of Johansson's desire for a quick accounting, Kahn said, "no matter what the books show, Ingemar will get every quarter that's coming to him, even if I have to pay him out of my own pocket."

—Kahn said he expects Johansson to fly to New York before Monday for the settlement of his June 26 fight and to "finalize" arrangements for his Sept. 22 defense.

—Sept. 22 will be kept as the fight date, wherever held, if possible—Kahn stressed, because that is Ingemar's 27th birthday and the 32nd anniversary of the second Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney fight at Chicago, where it drew \$2,658,660—boxing's largest gate.

—Despite Rosenzohn's resignation as president of Rosenzohn Enterprises and his offer to sell his one-third of the corporation's stock, Kahn and Vincent J. Vellella—president of the Rosenzohn Corp. and owner of two-thirds of the stock—still regard Rosenzohn as a member of the corporation until they have given him a waiver of personal liability.
