

## Walking Grandma Leaves Hood River

Hood River — (UP) — Great-grandmother Mrs. Emma G. A. Wood, 71, Gallipolis, Ohio, who said she is weary of people and not of her 2,000-mile walk from Missouri, marked her arrival here Tuesday by clubbing a photographer in the head with her umbrella.

Mrs. Gatewood, hiking from Independence, Mo., to Portland, for the fun of it, has complained lately of "curiosity seekers" along the way. Photographers especially annoy her.

She arrived here about noon Tuesday. But about four miles east of Hood River, as she plodded along U.S. Highway 30, she encountered Hood River Photographer Bob Hall. When his camera clicked, she bopped him on the forehead with her folded umbrella.

Hall said Mrs. Gatewood apologized right afterward and stopped to talk with him along the highway, then let him take her picture.

Mrs. Gatewood stayed Tuesday night with a Hood River couple, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Oberg and continued the walk to Portland today at 4 a.m. The Obergs first met Grandma Gatewood in Pendleton and invited her to stay with them when she made it here.

She has walked every mile so far of the trip from Missouri to Portland, where she plans to visit the Oregon Centennial Exposition.

## Oregon Gets Grants From Hill Foundation

St. Paul, Minn. — (UP) — The Louis W. and Maud Hill Family Foundation of St. Paul Monday announced four grants to organizations in Oregon totaling \$50,382. Hill's father, James J. Hill, owned the Great Northern railroad which opened the first Midwest-Pacific Northwest rail link.

The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry in Portland received the largest grant, \$16,000.

Oregon State college received a \$12,800 grant for research in forest genetics and the Oregon Historical Society in Portland received \$12,500 to help set up a publication revolving fund.

A \$9,082 grant went to the Forest Products Research Center in Corvallis toward the launching of research into wood lignin's chemical structure. Lignin is a substance that along with cellulose makes up the main part of woody tissue.

## Fewer Lobstering Licenses Are Issued

Portland, Me. — (UP) — The number of lobstering licenses issued to Maine fishermen this year has shown the sharpest season-to-season decline in 11 years. State figures showed 6,068 of the licenses were issued last year and 5,316 this year, a drop of 752.

## Top Astronomers Do Not Agree On Universe Origin, Poll Shows

Washington — (Science Service) — The world's top astronomers do not agree on the origin of the universe.

Of 33 participating in a Science Service Grand Jury on this subject, there was a virtually equal division on whether or not the universe started with a "big bang" several million years ago. To this question, 11 (33.3 per cent) voted "Yes" and 12 (36.4 per cent) voted "No," while 10 (30.3 per cent) were counted as "Not Voting."

Concerning the more recent theory that matter is being continually created and destroyed, opinion was more sharply divided among the 33. More than half of those responding, 18, or 54.5 per cent, said they did not agree. Eight, or 24.2 per cent, replied they did believe matter is being continually created, and seven, or 21.2 per cent did not vote.

Of the 33 experts, 23, or 69.7 per cent, showed high hopes that one or the other of these opposing theories would be proved right within the next 41 years, while three, or 9.1 per cent, thought they would never be solved. Seven, or 21.2 per cent, did not vote.

Concerning a specific year in the future voted on by 23, 14 or 60.9 per cent, were sufficiently optimistic to predict that either the big bang or the steady-state question would be solved by 1975, the other nine, or 27.7 per cent, holding out for the year 2000 A.D. One wrote in a forecast "a solution within five years, as well as voting for 1975."

Concerning the kind of observation most likely to give the answer to the problem, many of the astronomers and cosmologists responding to the poll chose more than one method. (Total percentages therefore equal more than 100 per cent.) Twenty, or 60.6 per cent, said observations of radio waves from far-distant objects would yield the answer, while three, or 9.1 per cent, predicted that radio astronomy would not provide a solution.

A telescope on a satellite would do the job in the opinion of 11, or 33.3 per cent, although seven, or 21.2 per cent, held that it would not. An earthbound telescope, either the 200-inch giant atop Mt. Palomar or others or more than a 100-inch aperture, would give an answer to the origin of the universe, 10 of the 33, or 30.3 per cent, believe.
