## Braves Grab Lead By Percentage Point

By United Press International Milwaukee is back in first place in the National league and Warren Spahn is back on the track toward winning 20 for the 10th time, so what else is new?

Spahn and the Braves threw cold water on a lot of pennant talk around San Francisco when they beat the Giants, 6-1, Tuesday night and knocked them out of first place by one percentage point.

The Braves, apparently over a near-disastrous mid-July slump, have won six of their last seven while Spahn has won four in a row and 15 for the season. He held the Giants to three singles and shut them out until the ninth.

**Five Giant Errors**  
Losing pitcher Mike McCormick made two errors in setting the stage for his own downfall and his teammates chipped in with three more. Del Crandall added a two-run homer for the Braves.

Cincinnati defeated Los Angeles, 4-1; Pittsburgh downed St. Louis, 7-3, and Philadelphia shaded Chicago, 2-1, in other NL games.

The Cleveland Indians moved within two games of first place in the American league and handed the Washington Senators their 17th straight defeat, 8-2; the Baltimore Orioles came from behind to nip the league-leading Chicago White Sox, 3-2; Detroit topped New York, 4-3, and Kansas City won the nightcap of a two-night twin-bill, 8-6, after Boston won the opener, 4-1.

### Title Fight Guarantees Received by Irving Kahn

United Press International The new major domo of boxing already has started the wheels turning for a return heavyweight championship bout.

Irving Kahn says he has received what he terms two "huge guarantees" for the September 22 bout between Champion Ingemar Johansson and Floyd Patterson. Kahn has replaced Bill Rosensohn who promoted the June fight in which Johansson took the title from Patterson. Kahn is now board chairman of Rosensohn Enterprises as well as head of Teleprompter Corporation.

Kahn said one guarantee is a gross of more than \$800,000 at the gate. He added that a deal will be made as soon as those involved deposit the guarantee in a bank.

A national magazine (Sports Illustrated) quotes Bill Rosensohn as saying as he stepped down as boxing promoter against his will.

Rosensohn, in a copyright first person story, tells how he was forced to give up a share of his profits from the June title fight between Ingemar Johansson and Floyd Patterson. The reason, said Rosensohn, was to keep Cus

New York—(UPI)—New York District Attorney Frank Hogan has disclosed that his office has been investigating the promotion of the first Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson fight and the arrangements for the second.

Hogan said Promoter Bill Rosensohn has been called to his office three or four times for questioning and that he would report again today. Hogan stressed that the fight itself is not being investigated, only the promotion.

### Stengel Offers All-Star Plan

New York—(UPI)—Manager of the New York Yankees has offered a plan if baseball intends to keep holding two all-star games each year.

Stengel, who led the American leaguers to a 5-3 win over the national circuit Monday at Los Angeles, suggests the two games be held on consecutive days. This year they were split between July 7 at Pittsburgh and yesterday's game. Stengel said his plan would provide for two games, a day of rest and then the pennant races could be resumed.

As to those pennant races, Stengel has this to say—"Folks insist the Chicago White Sox can't win because they can't hit. But, they seem to be winning" The front running White Sox have a three-game bulge over Cleveland. The defending champion Yankees are fifth—12 games off the pace.

### Two Baseball Players Oppose 2nd Star Fray

United Press International A poll of several players shows only two are against the idea of having two All-Star baseball games in one year.

Infielder Johnny Temple of Cincinnati and pitcher Early Wynn of the Chicago White Sox were the exceptions. Temple called the second game "unnecessary" while Wynn termed it "stupid." The National league won July 7 at Pittsburgh, the American league Monday at Los Angeles.

Yogi Berra of New York was among those favoring the second game. Berra said—"Our Yankees voted for the game. It's for a good cause and we would vote for it again." The receipts go into the players' pension fund.

### Portland Track Put Up for Sale

Portland—(UPI)—The Portland Meadows race track is reported to be up for sale with an asking price of \$2,500,000 dollars or more. The prime stockholder in the Portland Turf association is David Funk of Phoenix, Ariz. He says that the track is up for sale to anyone who will meet that price. He adds that a couple of people have been negotiating but that so far he's not interested in any of the offers they have made.

## 7 Boats Qualified For Gold Cup Race

Seattle—(UPI)—Sunday's 52nd running of the Gold Cup shapes up as a torrid affair in the roostertails of some sizzling qualifying runs. Ten boats tried qualifying runs over the three-mile course on Lake Washington yesterday, and seven made it at speeds of better than 100 miles an hour. The unlimiteds must cruise three laps of the three-mile course in at least 95 miles an hour.

Miss Pay 'N Save of Seattle qualified at 108.216 miles per hour in "sticky" water. Then a breeze blew up that brought on a brisk rain storm but left water conditions on the lake ideal for qualifying attempts and the big hydros poured out to take advantage of it.

Gale Five of Detroit with Bill Cantrell driving qualified at 102.922. Her sister ship, Gale Six with Fred Alter at the helm, made it in 109.928.

Wahoo of Seattle driven by Miro Slovak qualified at 112.971 miles per hour and Breathless TII of the Lake Tahoe Yacht club made it in 104.922.

Hawaii Kai of Bellevue, turned the three laps in 109.607 and Maverick of Lake Mead with Bill Stead driving did it in 111.497.

Eight boats still have to qualify for the big classic Sunday on Lake Washington.

Those still to make it are Kol-Roy, Miss Thriftway and Thriftway Too of Seattle, Coral Reef of Tacoma, Miss Spokane, Nitrogen of Washington, D.C., U.S. One of Detroit and Miss Tri-City, city area in Washington.

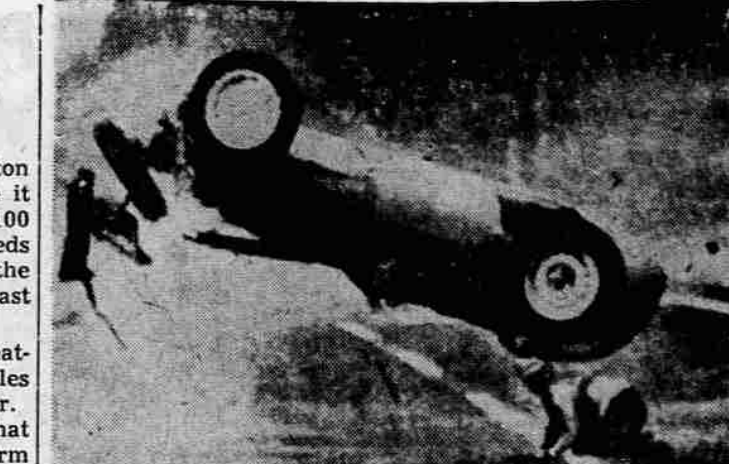
### Jackie Jensen, Boston Agree
