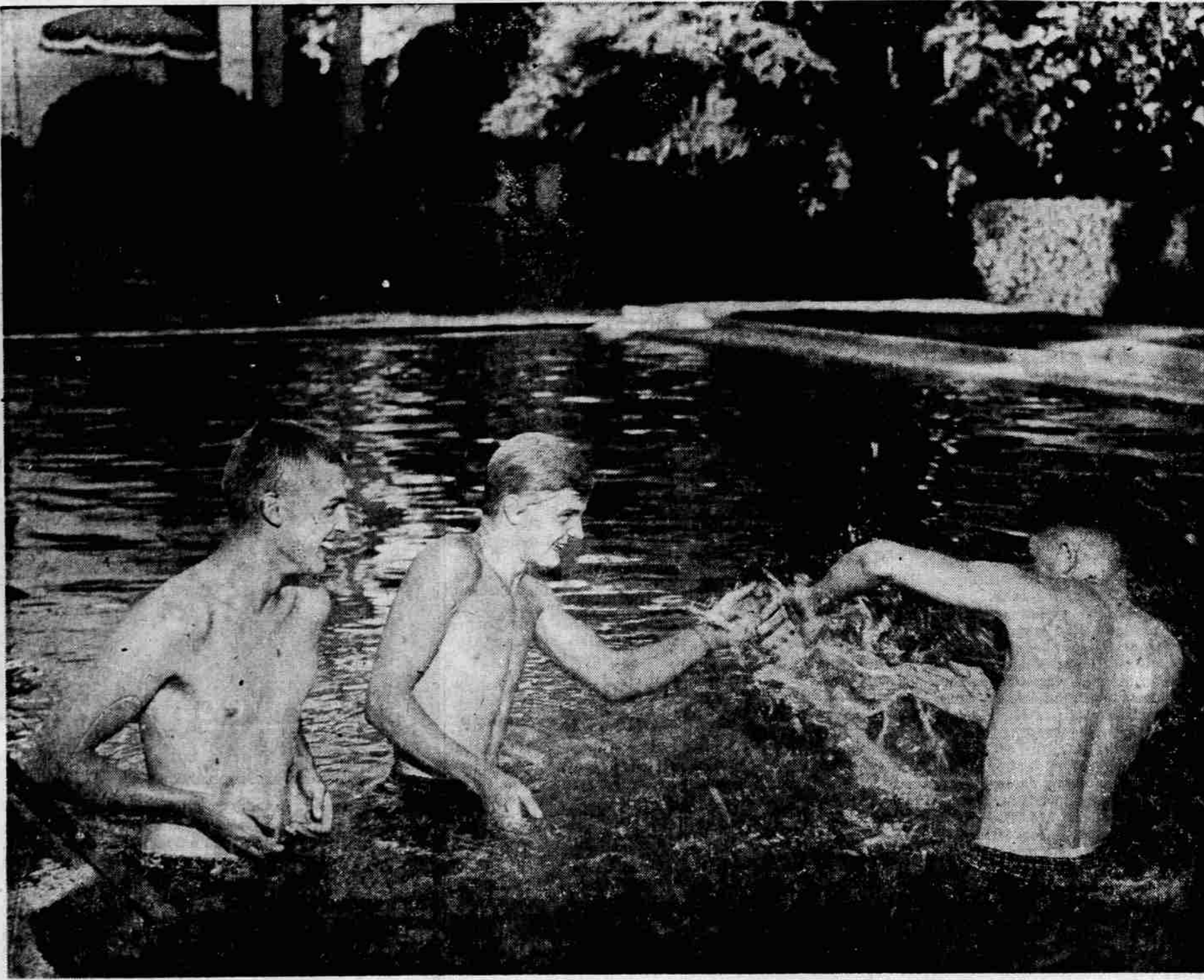


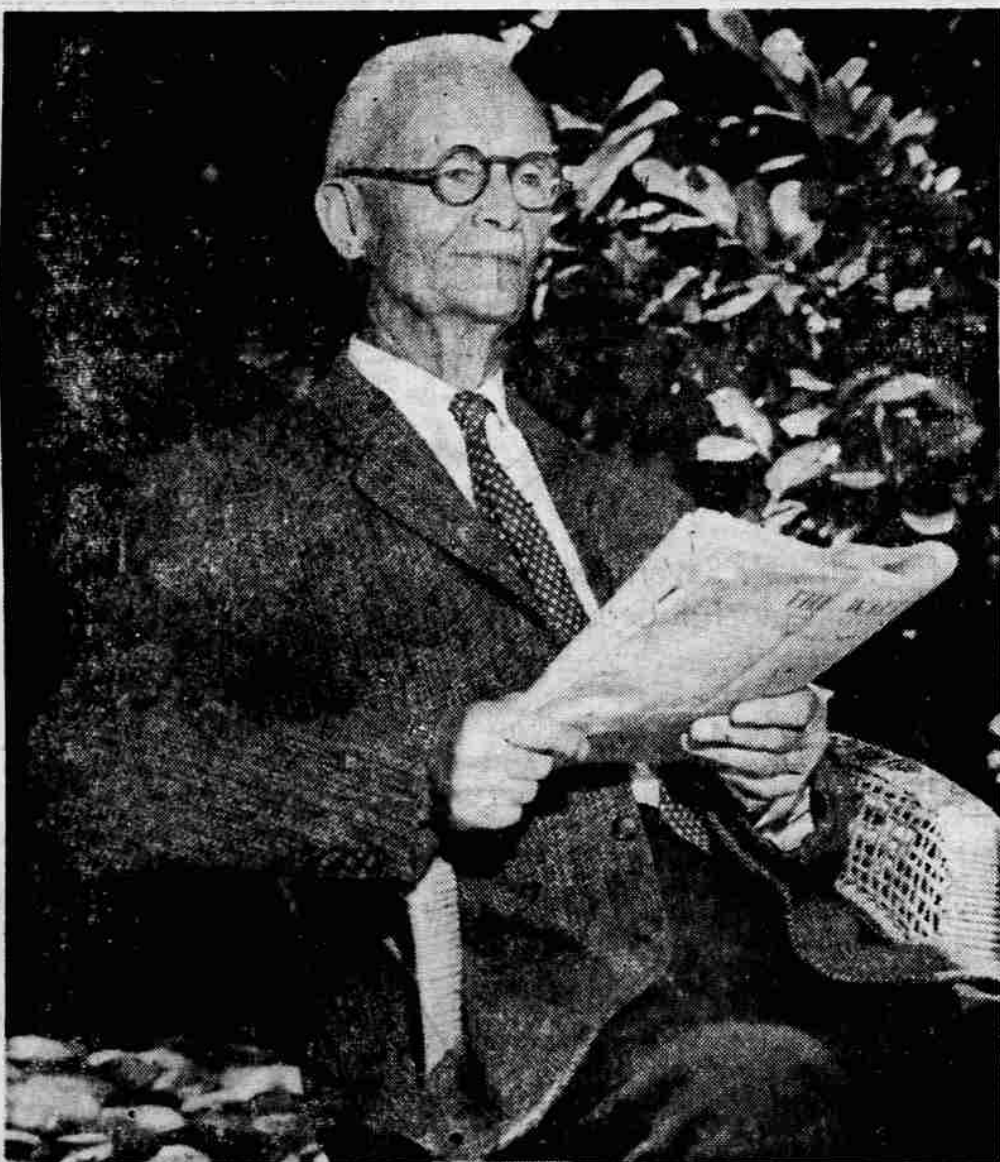
Summer Visitors

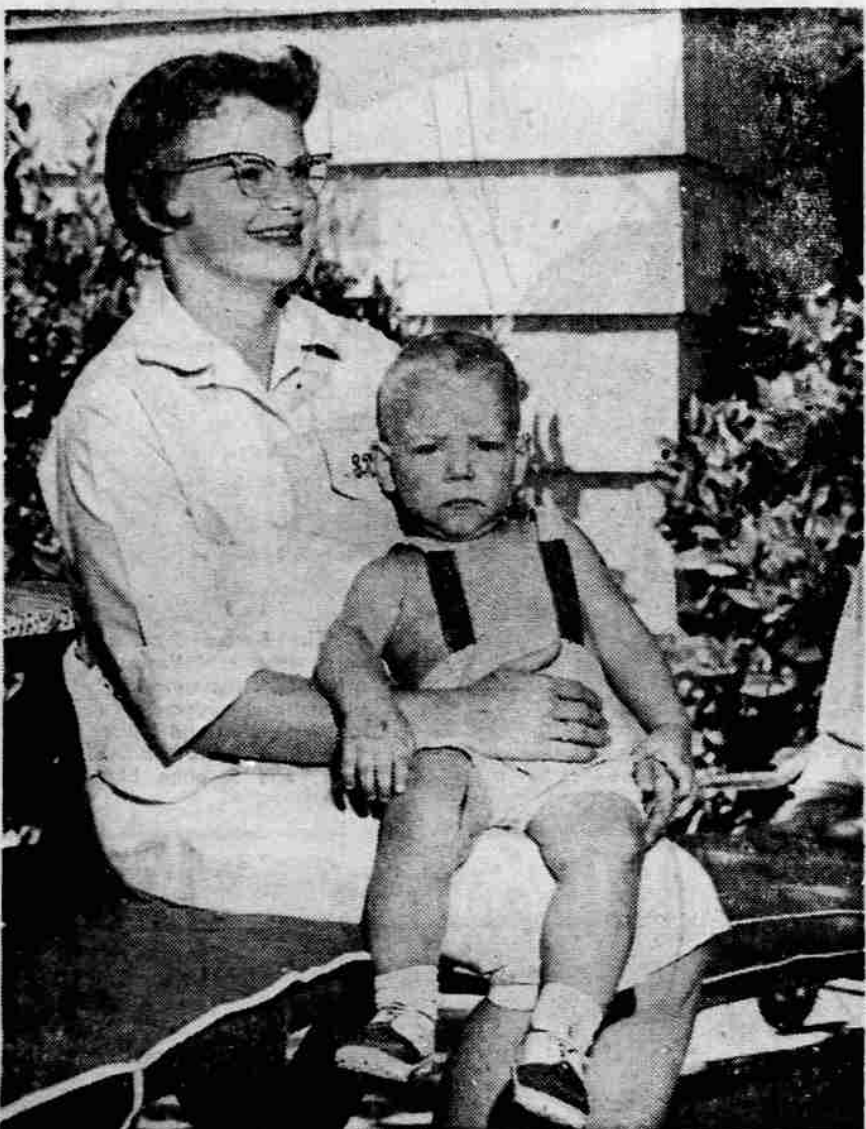

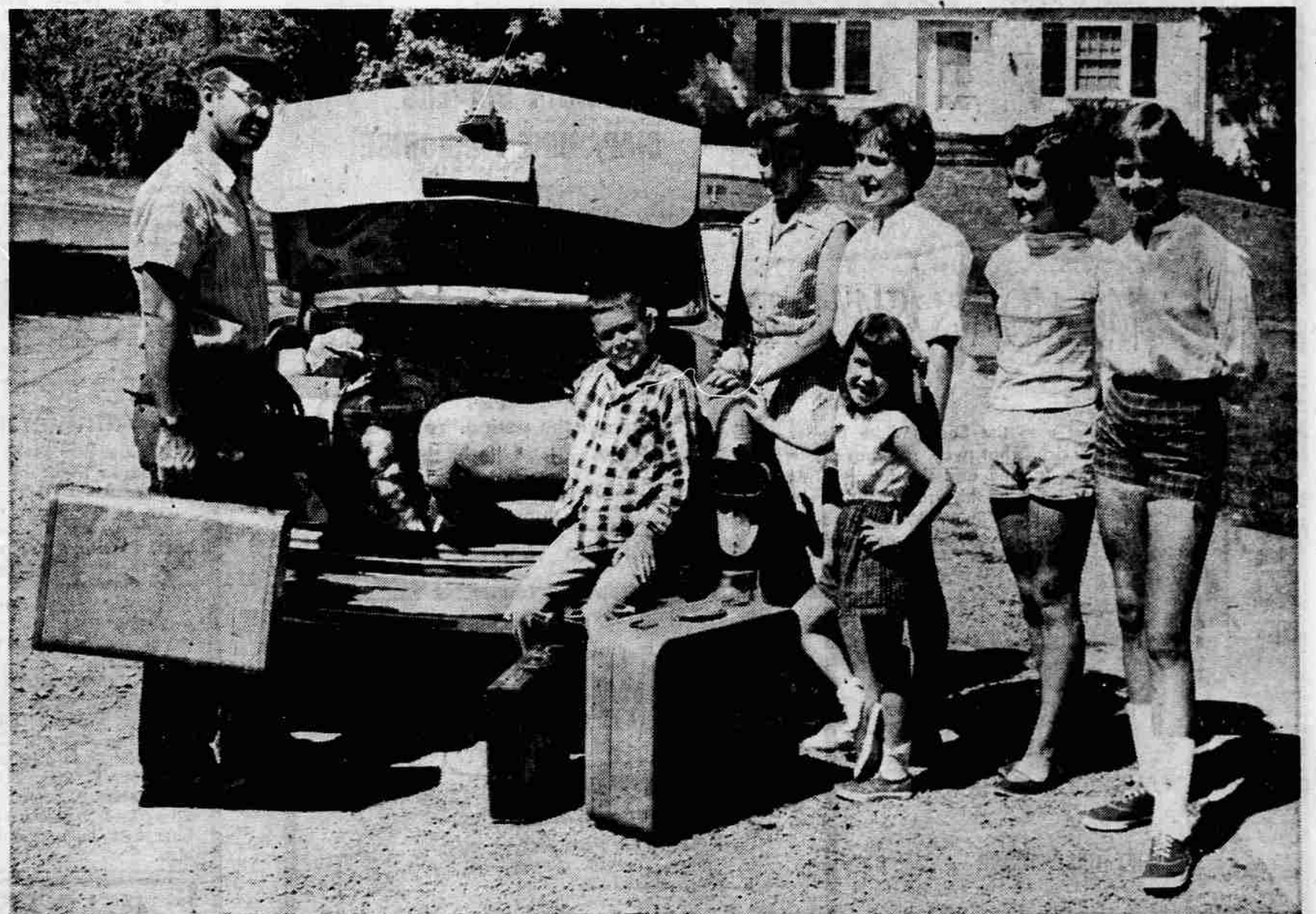
