Dust-Proofing Helps to Ease Allergy Trouble

Springfield, Mo. — (UPI) — Dust-proofing the home is indicated if anyone in the family has an allergy.

So say the M. G. Grays, a husband and wife team that, because of Mrs. Gray's allergies, started a factory for allergy-free products.

When dust-proofing, start with the bed, the Grays said. Pillows, mattresses, and box springs are the greatest sources of dust. Thoroughly vacuum the bed, from pillows to open springs, and cover with dust-proof bedding covers.

Make sure the bedroom is uncluttered. Remove heavy draperies and rugs which harbor dust. Eliminate quilted robes and slippers. Fuzzy blankets should be covered. Store unused bedding and clothes in special wrappers.

Use hard wax on bare floors, or cover floors with linoleum or vinyl. Treat dust mops and rags with a special product that makes dust form heavy lint which does not float into the air.

Electric air purifiers remove dust and pollen from air. Double-density filters should be used on hot air heating systems and air conditioners. Keep windows and frames in good repair to keep out dust and pollen.

Flour from the kitchen, powder from bath or dressing rooms, dust from cellar and attic will irritate allergies unless the house is kept thoroughly cleaned, the Grays said.

Soup and Summer

For summer mealtime or in-between-time there's a cool new blend of soup and milk to satisfy both thirst and hunger. The smallest to the tallest member of the family will savor a nutritious soup shake. Empty a can of condensed cream of chicken soup into a beverage shaker. Add a soup can of cold milk and the merest suggestion of curry powder. Shake vigorously until thoroughly blended. Chill for at least 4 hours (overnight if possible). Makes 2 or 3 tall glass servings.

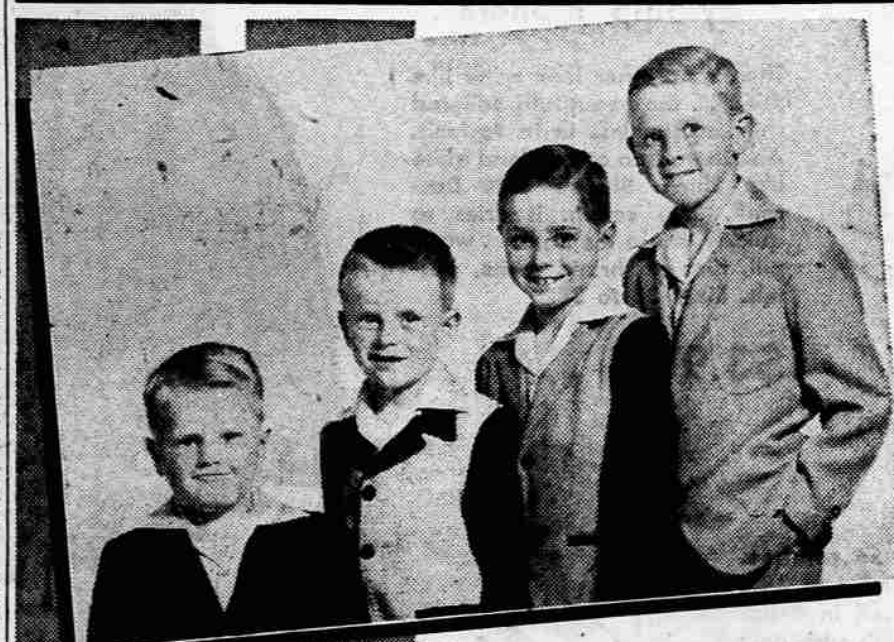
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
